Under the editorship of Abraham Cahan, the Jewish Daily Forward has grown and devel oped into the most widely read Tewish newspaper in the world. The secret of the great success of the Jewish Daily Forward lies chiefly in the journalistic genius and the youthful and enterprising spirit of its editor-in-chief, Abraham Cahan, one of the most colorful personalities in American Jewry. Need Only Display Firmness It Has Shown Against Others

LONDON, April 22.—In order to "prevent a raging, tearing anti-Jewish agitation from gaining speed" in Poland the government of that country need display only half the firmness it has shown against the peasants and the Socialists the Manchester Quardian said yesterday in a leading editorial on the newly-founded Polish anti-Semitic, pro-Nazi party.

The party referred to in the editorial was formed by a group, believed to be predominantly academic, which asserts that the Endek (National Democratic) party is not sufficiently anti-Jewish and According anti-government. According to information now available, profes-sionals all over the country are flocking to the ranks of the new group. There are said to be at least three hundred Nazi agents in Poland.

If the Polish government does not take the firm stand necessary, the Manchester Guardian says, "it is taking a terrible risk."

Many 'Non-Aryan' Lawyers Lose Out

Figures Show Alarming De-crease in Prussia for Lost Year

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BERLIN, April 22.—From thirty-nine to seventy-three percent of "non-Aryan" lawyers and notaries in Prussia have been deprived of the right to practice during the past year, figures now available show.

Last year there were in Prussia, 378 "non-Aryan" lawyers. This 3,378 year there are only 2,066. Of last year's quota of 2,046 notaries, there are today 884. In Berlin there are today only 1,227 of both

there are today only 1,227 of both categories.

While the average decrease in the number of "non-Aryan" nota-ries was fitty-nine percent, it amounted to seventy-three percent in the city of Kassel. The general decrease in the number of "non-Aryan" lawyers in Prussia was "thirty-nine percent." thirty-nine percent.

Peer of Collectors Is Directing Vast Show This Week

Gentlemen may prefer bonds but O. C. Lightner, director of the National Hobby Show to be pre-sented at the RCA Building from April 25 to 30, believes that hob-bies are a safer investment.

"Before the depression hobby collectors were known as nuts," declared Mr. Lightner in an interview at his office in the Hotel Taft yesterday. "Now they have the laugh on the other fellows. Their rare treasures have in-creased in value while the hardboiled business men have lost their shirts in the market. That proves that it pays to be whimsical."

The hobby exhibit sims to display collections of all kinds both from amateur and commercial from amateur and commercial sources all over the country. Every type of collector will be represented except bill collectors. There will be displays of the

usual variety of antique furniture coins, books, stamps, firearms, ship models and autographs. Beside such addities as assortments of queer knobs, ancient cow h curious cacti, authentic meteor ites, teeth from animals all over the world, early cigarette cards. harmonicas, dime novels, circus reviews, old lead soldiers, beer labels, street car transfers, cigar bands and matchbox labels

bands and matchbox labels.
"Do you go in for busts?" ask-ed Mr. Lightner. "That is, collect them," he amended lightly.
"If so you will find many interested buyers at the show. The most desirable are rare busts of Abraham Lincoln."

The director of the exhibit, an amiable middle-aged gentleman with a broad kindly face and a boyish smile, insists that his work keeps him perennially youthful. He is the editor of the magazine Hobbies, directed three national hobby shows in Chicago in 1930, 1931 and 1932, and does quite a bit of collecting for himself in the field of ancient lamps. He is well versed in the lore of hobbies and is an authority on the achieve-ments of its numerous devotees.

Jewish Hobby Riders

The reporter asked him to name some notable Jewish collectors. Mr. Lightner gave first place to the world renowned bibliophile, Dr. A. S. W. Rosenbach. He also mentioned I. S. Seidman of New York City, proud possessor of the most valuable collection of early New York historical material; S. L. Curtis of New York City, owner of some of the rarest antique Theodore Steinway of the firm of Steinway Pianos, and Stephen

tion is active in almost every country in the world and that its membership is sufficiently large in those countries to which Germans have emigrated to have considerable political influence.

Pfaus has been a frequent speak-er at affairs of the League of Friends of New Germany in Chicago. He is one of the most bit-ter anti-Semites heard from any rostrum in the city. In one address he dwelt at length on the persecution of Jewry in almost every European country, strove to justify such persecution, and pre-dicted that America in the future would follow the trend adopted by European countries with regard to "punishing" the Jews.

Supports Christians

Pfaus has not confined his anti-Semitic soul within the narrow realm of predicting the arrival of American anti-Jewish pogroms, He has given the support of his group the Crusaders for Economic Liberty, a militant Fascist group under the direction of George W. Christians. This cooperation came about last Fall through the Germanic Alliance chapter in Muscatine, Iowa, a unit said to have more than a thousand adherents under the district leadership of C.

In negotiating the merger of the organizations, Fulliam wrote to George W. Christians stating that his chief in Chicago thought well his chief in Chicago thought well of the Crusaders for Economic Liberty and their "storm troops," the Crusader White Shirts. Ful-liam opined that considerable enlistment could be gained in the Iowa districts in which farmer troubles abounded at the time. He explained that the Germanic Alliance was an international group with a large membership and correspondingly great political influence throughout the world. Offertion, Fulliam expressed the opinion that as the greeting, "Heil Hitler!" is popular in Germany today, "let me salute you as you will be sal-uted in days to come. Hail! Chris-

antly announced that the Crusaders for Economic Liberty were "The American Reds." On the "The American Reds." On the envelopes of his correspondence and on the letterheads of his writpaper he had placed this scription together with a red flag scription together with a red hag crossed with the Stars and Stripes. Shortly after the dispatch of this letter Christians' group changed from "The American Reds" to "The American Fascists." His letterheads and envelope insignia changed accordingly.

While Fulliam admitted that he had fre-quently mailed material bearing full postage, he denied circulating McFadden's speeches under the congressional frank.

In some circles it is believed that Christians is in the best position to rally to his support hundreds of German organizations through-out the country which now adhere to the policies of the League of Friends of New Germany. It is certain that the League of Friends of New Germany can never be re-garded by Americans as anything but an outgrowth of the American branch of the German National Socialist Party and a large group of organized agitators, organized and supported by an alien government. It is becoming quite clear that the Silver Legion, until now closely allied with the Nazis, can not hope to gain the support of patriotic, and mentally sound Americans. As pointed out in preceding articles, the tie-up between the Silver Shirts and Nazis who had reportedly conspired to overthrow American Government, has been

For this technicality, the appellate court reversed, but ordered a new trial on an ominion which ought to leave no doubt as to his being convivted anew.

At present, legislative investigations are being conducted into such un-American racial and religious propaganda, imported from foreign lands. The preliminary report of the Dickstein Sub-Com-mittee of the U. S. House of Representatives Committee on Immi-gration, entitled "Nazi propagan-da by aliens in the United States," led to the appointment of a new committee with broad powers, it will be remembered. The pro-priety of prohibiting such propaganda was vigorously expre National Democratic Platform of 1916, on which Woodrow Wilson was elected during the Great War, but before our entry into it, in the following plank:

following plank:

"There is gathered here in
America the best of the blood,
the industry and the genius of the whole world the elements of a great race and a magnificent society to be welded into a mighty and splendid nation. Whoever, actuated by the purse to promote the interes a foreign power, in disregard of our own country's welfare or to

foreign relations or cripple or destroy its industries at home, and whoever, by arousing prejudices of a racial, religious or othnature, creates discord and strife among our people, so as to obstruct the wholesome process of unification, is faithless to the trust which the privileges of cit izenship repose in him and is disloyal to his country. We there condemn as subversive to this Nation's unity and integrity, and as destructive of its welfare, the activities and designs of every group or organization, political or otherwise, that has for its object the advancement of the interest of a foreign power, whether such object is promoted by intimidating the govern-ment, a political party or representatives of the people, or which is calculated and tends to divide

our people into antagonistic groups, and thus to destroy the complete agreement and solidarity of the people and that unity of sentiment and purpose so essential to the perpetuity of the Nation and its free institutions." (Porter: National Party Platforms, p. 376.)

Foreign Controversies Here Our State Department on March 28, 1981, went on record in vigor-ous opposition to such efforts to transfer to our own shores controversies arising from purely politi-cal differences abroad. The occasion was receipt by President Hoover of resolutions adopted at a meeting of Italian War Veterans in this city on February 15, 1931, sed at a mass meeting in which passed at a mass meeting in which interferences in American affairs had been charged to the Italian Ambassador. The resolutions had been transmitted to the President by Dr. Charles Fama of this city but the State Department ex-pressed itself in above cited letter to him as follows:

By reference from the White House, I acknowledge receipt of the resolutions passed at a mass meeting of Italian war held at Irving Plaza Hall, in the City of New York, on Feb. 15, 1931, and transmitted by you through the good offices of Senator Copeland.

The resolutions have received due consideration by the appro-priate officers of this Govern-ment, who have reached the decision that the Royal Italian Am-bassador at this capital is not involved in the factional controversies among Americans of Italian origin described therein, and that no action by this Gov-ernment is indicated in respect thereto

This Government, as you are undoubtedly aware, has no inter-est in controversies arising within groups of American citize foreign origin, in respect to questions of internal politics in the countries to which they formerly owed allegiance. It reflects, however, the feeling of all true Americans, in looking for-ward to the day when such groups will become so thoroughly identified with the country of their adoption that they will cease to engage in futile contro-versies of that nature. I feel confident that you, and the other gentlemen who signed the resolutions in question, join me in the hope that that day will not be too long delayed, and that you will exert your influence to that end, among the American citizens of Italian origin.

sort to the boycott was initiated practically officially by the Nazi government when the anti-Jewish oycott of April 1, 1933, was ordered in Germany in alleged re-sentment of our natural, proper sentment of our natural, proper and justifiable publicly proclaimed indignation at Germany's "setting the clock back" and resorting to assaults on civilization not heard of assaults on civilization not heard of in an allegedly civilized country since the Middle Ages. Naturally, this German boycott and the outrageous persecutions of which it was an incident, in time gave rise in our own country to a boycott of Germany, participated in by some American Jews and their sympathizers, and by the Ameri-can Federation of Labor as a unit. The absurdity of the claim that we in this country have no right concern ourselves with such harbarous medieval persecutions and discriminations as the Nazi regime is resorting to abroad, I have expressed at length in my pamphlet "The United States and Grman Jewish Persecutions — Precedents for Popular and Governmental Ac. tion." Of course, England, France and Holland and other civilized countries have publicly expresse similar indignation, popular and often governmental, as has also the lished in the American Journal of International Law entitled "The League of Nations officially.

In that pamphlet I showed, more-over, that Germany was thereby directly violating an express inter-national obligation assumed at the Peace Conference to the United States and the other Allies, to treat her Jewish and other minorities exactly on the basis of the same equal rights she accorded to her Christian "Aryan" inhabitants. That such purely retaliatory boycott—organized in reprisal of an anti-Semitic movement—is not a violation of our law was directly adjudged by our New York Court of Appeals in the closely analagous or Appeals in the closely analagous case of People ex rel Burnham vs. Flynn, 189 N. Y. 180. In that case, the defendant Burnham and other Jewish theatrical proprietors were prosecuted for an alleged un-lawful conspiracy for jointly arranging to exclude one James S. Metcalfe from their theatres, and thus "boycotting" him, because Metcalfe had for years published vicious attacks upon them in the-atrical reviews which he wrote, which contained (to quote the Court) "malicious, vile and unjustifiable attacks upon those of the

Jewish faith." A city magistrate found Burnham guilty and sentenced him to imprisonment, whereupon he instituted habeas corpus proceedings to secure his release. The Supreme Court at special term decided the s corpus proceedings against him, but the Appellate Division re-versed, ordering his discharge, in an opinion reported in 114 Appellate Division 578. On appeal to the Court of Appeals, that Court also unanimously ordered defend-ant Burnham's release and reed the action of the City Mag-In the opinion written for the court by Judge Edward T. Bartlett, he said at p. 185:

Hitler has rolled up another victory in the underground warfare between himself and the volatile Goering, Heinrich Himmler, young and brutally efficient, one of Hit-ler's most dependable and valued allies in this conflict has been inspector-general of Prussian political police of which

Goering is nominally the head.

Himmler has been commander of the secret police in all the Reich states except Prussia where Goering, as premier, appointed himself ing, as premier, appointed himself police head. Perhaps Himmler's chief duty has been to get the "dirt" on all the Nazi leaders and keep tabs on them for his master. At any rate, it has been one of the most important tasks he has performed. It is reliably reported that were the contents of the special file he has assembled at Munich made public, the revelations of scandal and duplicity would far exceed anything yet charged by the most violent of anti-Nazia

His appointment must be looked his appointment must be looked upon as a weakening of Goering's position, since, while Goering tech-nically remains head of the Prussian secret police, the reins of power are actually in the hands of this Hitler aide. The Gestapo, hereafter, must be considered as Hitler's personal police arm.

What is constructive criticism? What is constructive criticism.

That is a question that is perplexing Germany's non-Nazi editors.

Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, supreme arbiter of what Germany shall read, see, hear and think, finds his completely coordinated press "mon-otonous." In making his discov-ery, he is some months behind the reading public.

Having found the press mon-otonous because German editors, for some strange reason, prefer conformity to a dictator's rule than loss of jobs and enforced residence in concentration camps, the min-ister for propaganda and public enlightenment blames the news-papermen and tells them he wants "less monotony and more criti-The criticism, however, he warns

them, must be "constructive" with the proviso that it must be sup-ported by a "readiness to assume responsibility."

This responsibility is the rub. What editor will, for instance, criticize the esthetic judgments of the Nazi Jewish policy, or reveal the real state of affairs in Germany's foreign trade or in her employment problem? About the only thing these poor editors can criticize or attack is the Jew.

Trebitsch-Lincoln, of unhallowed fame has returned to the lime-light after years of obscurity. He returned, not as a German spy but as a missionary seeking to convert Canadians to the Buddhism.

In Asiatic costume, with two gleaming bits of jade in the long string of black beads he wore over his black robes, and a black skull cap on his shaven head, he told newspapermen at Vancouver, "I have wiped out the past."

But that is something easier than accomplished and the pious abbott, Chao-Kung, remains to most people, the apostate Jew who became a Presbyterian minister and a curate in the Church of England; the Hungarian who became a British citizen; the British M. P. who became a forger and spy, German monarchist and a mysterious power behind the throne in the attempt to create a new Chinese dynasty.

BERLIN, April 22. — Neither public nor private Jewish schools will be permitted to admit new students this year, the Frankfurter Zeitung said yesterday in its re-port on the new school regulation promulgated on April 16 by Dr. Bernard Rust, Prussian Minister of Education.

It was thought at first that the clause forbidding Jewish high schools and colleges to admit new students applied merely to those schools which were public, but the statement in the Frankfurter Zeitung leaves little doubt that the higher Jewish schools have been condemned by the state to disappearance.

Request Delay Untermyer Hits In Re-Forming RabbinateBody

Agudath Israel Asks Wauchope for Time to Solve Problems

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
FRANKFURT AM MAIN, April -A request for a six weeks' lay before concluding negotiations regarding the reorganization of the rabbinate has been warded to General Sir Arthur Wauchope, High Commissioner for Palestine, by the Executive Council of the Agudath Israel, world Orthodox Jewish organization.

The cabled appeal to Gen. Wau-chope states that the delay re-quested would give the Rabbinical Council of the Agudath Israel time to decide questions reaching outside of Palestine

The Pa'estine government has proposed that the constitution of the Kenesseth Israel (Jewish Con munity), which provides for both lay and religious authorities, re-main unchanged, but that three representatives of the Agudath be established under that constitution and that an Agudist rabbi be add-ed to the Chief Rabbinate.

At present there are in the Rab-binical Council six members, three of them representing the Sephar-dic element in the religious Jewish community of Palestine and three the Ashkenazic. In the Chief Rabbinate, which now consists of two religious leaders, one similar-ly represents the Sephardim and the other the Ashkenazim.

Wherever a government is officially and genuinely opposed to manifestations of race hatred and bigotry, the people soon cease to indulge in these destruc-tive and costly "luxuries."
