Why Hitler Can't Last

Philip L. Seman, General Director of the Jewish People's Institute, of Chicago, writes me, in part, as follows:

"I have just finished reading once more your editorial in The Jewish Daily Bulletin of Thursday, March 1. It was 'A Purim Forecast.'

"In the light of what has happened in Germany during the last ten days, it occurs to me that a comment on this edi-torial would be timely. Of course, you do not want to set yourself up as a prophet or the son of a prophet, but I feel that you have, without any question of a doubt, as fine an insight into world politics and their machinations as the best in the field.

"I originally thought of writ-ing an article based on your foresightedness for the B'nai Brith Magazine, but I believe that it is due you and The Jewsh Daily Bulletin the first opportunity either to reprint the editorial, or write another, referring in it to the forecast."

I have received numerous re quests for a reprint of that edi-torial. Since the publication of my Open Letter to Dr. Schacht in December, 1933, and my edi-torial, "A Purim Forecast," on March 1, 1934, events in Germany have confirmed my prog-nostication. Even the recent visit of Hitler to Mussolini was an unmistakable evidence of Hit-ler's desperate attempt to save himself and his power, by mak-ing concessions to Il Duce in the matter of the Austro-German Nazi Anschluss.

In my forecast published more than four months ago, I pre-sented my reasons why Hitler cannot last more than two years Now I believe that his end will

come much sooner.
The readers of The Jewish Daily Bulletin may be interested in rereading my analysis of the German situation and the Hitler blunders, as outlined in my edi-torial of March 1:

A Purim Forecast
It is often asked how long Hitlerism — the system of the modern Haman—can last, Many people believe that Hitlerism is people believe that Hitlerism is destined to remain in power for a very long time and to spread also to other lands.

I do not share this view. I know how unwise it is to indulge in prophecies. But I am convinced that Hitlerism cannot last long, for the following rea-

1. Hitlerism came into power as a result of the agitation of demagogues who promised the defeated German people the res-toration of a powerful Germany.

 Hitlerism promised to wipe out the humiliation of the German guilt in the World War. Hitlerism promised the de feated German people a new place in the sun, as an equal (Continued on Page Two)

Iewish Sabbath Alliance Snubs 'Concession' on School Opening

Wants Session to Start Sept. 12; Board Sets Sept. 11

What appears to be a partial concession to the recent request of the Jewish Sabbath Alliance that the Board of Education defer the opening of school in the fall from September 10 to September 12, be-cause the Jewish New Year holy days fall on the tenth and eleventh of that month, has been granted by the school authorities.

A letter to the Alliance, signed by Dr. Harold G. Campbell, Superintendent of Schools, announces that the schools will be opened September 11. The announcement however, is worded in an ambiguous manner which leaves room for doubt as to whether the date set is really a concession. (Continued on Page Eight)

Nazi Paper Demands Ouiz on Their Activities

BERLIN, July 8.—No new
policy regarding the Jews of
Germany has yet crystallized
out of the developments of the past week, which resulted in the execution of at least a dozen Nazi leaders who had been re sponsible for many of the most vicious manifestations of Nazi anti-Semitic policy and in a new realignment of political forces within the Reich

For the moment the Jewish question, which had been of considerable importance be-cause of its reactions on Germany's foreign trade, has been overshadowed by the major questions of the day and the struggle for control of the Reich between the conservative elements and the radical Nazi wing.

One of these major questions, concerning the relations of Germany with the outside world, was brought sharply to the fore in a sensational speech by Rudolf Hess, Chancellor Hitler's "second self," in which he pleaded for an under standing with France, warne standing with France, warned against impending war and dared any foreign nation to cross the Reich's frontiers.

While this speech attracted more attention than any of er develop-ment of the day, the Jews have not been completely forgotten.

It is because I believe in the soundness and sanity of the German people that I believe Hitlerism cannot last long. When the eyes of the German people are opened, and they will see that instead of bread and happiness, they are given cruel, savage diversions of bigotry and hate, the Nazi adventure will ended. When they will realize that Germany under Hitler has lost her friends abroad, and that her internal situation is grov ing ever more desperate, they will turn against their real en-emy, and Hitlerism will be stamped out.

Meanwhile Hitlerism is de-stroying itself. It is fighting on

too many fronts. If Hitler pre cipitates a new war, the end of Hitlerism will come sooner. If despite his efforts, the war is delayed, Hitlerism may carry on a little longer.

But I can hardly believe that But I can hardly believe that within two years the German people will not be aroused against their present leaders who are reducing them to ruin and degradation. Then Hitlerism will be crushed by the Gerthemselves.

The total number of foreign-born Jews was assumedly un-changed from 1920 to 1930. Taking in account, however, the age changed from 1920 to 1930. Tak distribution, we find that in each age period up to and including thirty-five to thirty-nine years old, the number of foreign-born has the number of foreign-born has decreased since 1920. This decrease decreased since 1920. This decrease of persons under the age of forty resulted in a much greater concentration in older age periods within the foreign-born Jewish community (the bulk of which consists of men and women over forty) than occurred either among the Jewish community in America as a whole or the native white population at large.

The foreign-born group, which now forms one-tenth of the nation, is maintained by immigration. At present, however, the immigration policy and economic conditions together are holding the number of immigrants at a very low level. In the pre-war period, on the other and the pre-war period, on the other hand, the influx of newcomers was constant and heavy, and about two-thirds of them were under thirty years, while only ten per cent of the immigrants were older than forty-five years.

Causes of Age Trends
The population in the older
groups of the foreign-born Jews can now continue to show great gains in numbers for several years. This results from the large immi-

gration that took place in the ten years before the World War, when the great majority of the Jewish newcomers were men and women between twenty and thirty years

The numerical changes in the foreign-born age groups, namely, the continuous decline of the numthe continuous decline of the num-ber of immigrant Jews under forty and the steady growth in numbers of the middle-aged, will be a bold feature in the make-up of the American-Jewish commu-nity. Still greater will be the change reflected in the increas-sords only a still greater will be the change renected in the increas-ingly enhanced ration of the older groups in relation to the number of the foreign born Jews as a whole. Here is an example. Population trends, analyzed and

measured, disclose the age compo-sition of the foreign-born whites as a whole in 1950. Fifteen years hence, it has thus been estimated about twenty-six per cent of all the foreign-born whites will be found in the group of sixty-five years and over, whereas in 1930 their proportion was only twelve per cent and in 1910 not more than nine per cent.

It follows that in 1950 one out of every four foreign-born Jews will be sixty-five years or over, while only twenty-five per cent of them will be from twenty to forty-four, and the majority of the remaining fifty per cent will be middle-aged persons (forty-five to

Kosher Group Poultry Strike

Public Welfare Is Cited in Request for United Action

Wholesale and retail poultry dealers, now on strike against a trucking and coop hire monopoly, are seeking the cooperation of the Federation of Kosher Butchers of Greater New York, whom they have asked to join them in a sympathy shut-down.

At a conference between repreentatives of botl. groups, the poultry men argued that simultaneous action would be in the interests of New York's 5,000 kosher butchers New York's 5,000 Rosher butchers and the general public, since it would eliminate many trade abuses and would result in lower prices to retail meat dealers and to consumers.

The Federation board of directors now has the question under advisement. Officials of the butchers' organization pointed out, how ever, that if poultry men and mea! dealers were to be on strike at the same time, the kosher-buying public would find itself deprived of both meat and poultry.

The Federation also is faced with two additional problems. The Federation also is faced with two additional problems. Some time ago it decided to boycott the "Big Four" packing houses in protest against high wholesale meat prices. This decinouses in protest against high wholesale meat prices. This deci-sion was held in abeyance, pend-ing the outcome of a hearing in Washington last week relative to the kosher butchers' request for a separate NRA code. Action on the

Central America

Little Discrimination Found by Dr. Coralnik in That Region

No official anti-Semitism, little discrimination, and generally lib-eral government policies in Mexico, Guatemala and Honduras were re-ported by Dr. Abraham Coralnik, recently returned from a tour of investigation for three Jewish im-migrant societies, in an interview.

Dr. Coralnik, editorial writer for The Day, had been sent to South and Central America by the HIAS. the ICA and the Emigdireckt, the Jewish immigrant aid societies of New York, London and Paris, respectively, to investigate possibili-ties for settlement by Germanish refugees.

Mexico, Guatemala and Honduras would welcome several thou-sand workers whose efforts could aid materially in the development of these countries, Dr. Coralnik asserted, but "it should be clearly un-derstood that a large immigration under the present conditions of the world market is absolutely impossible. It would not be permitted by the respective governments."
"Selected Immigration"

"On the other hand," he pointed it, "a selected immigration of qualified people such as skilled arquanted people such as skilled ar-tisans, agriculturists or industrial-ists could be effected after proper negotiation."

Warburg Announces Sum as Cities Hasten to Reach Quotas

More than \$1,500,000 has al-ready been raised by the Jews of America for their persecuted and stricken co-religionists in Nazi Germany, Felix M. Warburg, na-tional chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, announced yesterday.

The announcement was the first The announcement was the first report since the campaign of the United Jewish Appeal was launched last March. The quota set for the United States is \$3,000,000. The drive is being conducted under the joint auspices of the American Jewish Joint Distribution. Committee and tribution Committee and American Palestine Campaign.

Mr. Warburg said the exact total obtained to date is \$1.554 256 Of this amount the largest share, \$704,000, came from New York City. Three hundred forty-one com-munities in forty-four states par-ticipated in the fund-raising efforts

Additional campaigns are cheduled in at least 200 other cities, including Chicago, Cincin-nati, Baltimore, Dénver, Louisville, Buffalo, Atlanta, New Orleans, Milwaukee, St. Paul, Tulsa, Okla-homa City, Rochester, Wilkes-arre and Des Moines, Mr. Warburg

Philadelphia has come through Financipina has come through with \$150,000 to take a position second only to New York, and Pittsburgh stands third with \$100,000. Of this latter sum a small part is to be distributed among local charities.

An acutely anti-Semitic state of mind, prominent in the Kiev section as well as in other parts of Russia at that time, immediately prompted a revival of an age old prompted a revival of an age old and sporadically recurrent "ritual murder" myth, to the effect that the boy had been killed so that his blood could be used in the preparation of Passover matzoh.

Except for the fact that the Russian government at the time was facing a crisis, the Beiliss case might never have developed.

About a month before the murder was discovered the Duma had evidenced a desire to abolish the Jewish pale and give the Jews the right to enter any Russian city. In this attitude the government saw a somewhat revolutionary trend that had to be checked. It seized on the "ritual murder" charge against the Jews to keep the Duma from executing the change in the "pale" laws and is alleged to have pushed the arrest and trial of Beiliss with all its

Against Beiliss himself there was not a shred of evidence. The was not a shred of evidence. The Kiev Chief of Police, indeed, re-signed his position in protest against the government's arrest of Beiliss over his head. He was convinced, he said, th. the mur-der had been committed by a no-torious woman of the section and her gang in retaliation for the boy's activities in bearing tales to boy's activities in bearing tales to the police about their malefac-tions. The only apparent reason for Beiliss' connection with the case was that he lived near the scene of the crime's discovery. The trial brought newspaper correspondents from all over the world to report its recovery for

world to report its progress for the press. At the trial the gov-ernment's witnesses, including a Kiev University professor and a priest, completely falled to estab-lish a case for the prosecution.

Cincinnati Courses Will Be Tuition-Free to Students

Hebrew Union Conservative Rabbis Took Radical Stand at Tannersville

Self-Named U. S. Fascist Chief Has His Points, McGrady Admits

Christians Can Say 'Oil' Instead of 'Erl' and Has Developed Neat Southern Twang-Held 'Nut' by Some, But He's Shrewd

The following is the second of a series of articles, "This Fascist The following is the second of a series of articles, "The Fuelcest Racket," by Mr. McGrady, exposing, from the inside, the workings of a typical Fascist organization here, and revealing, through pub-Beation of the Fascist "chieftain's" correspondence, how and in what manner these racial rackets are operated. In discussing his projected revolution, the sage of Chattanooga, George W. Christians, once said, "Modern revolutions are based tipon the personality of leaders."

As Hitler, Mussolini, Stalin and others led their forces to success on the strength of their respective personalities, so Christians intends drawing from his reservoir of "It" to gain drawing from his reservoir of "It" power in this country, the rebel chief made clear. To understand the complex maneuvers of

George W. Christians, president of the Crusaders for Economic Liberty, commander in chief of the Crusader White Shirts and leader of the American Fascists and the American Reds, it is well to know something of his

background.

He is about forty years old, married, and has a son about ten years old. He comes from

New York where he gained his education as an engineer at the Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute. Twelve years' residence in his "national capital" at Chattahooga has completely southernized the gentleman. He has attained

a Dixie accent that excels that of a majority of native sons of Tennessee. The "r" as in oil is now a
silent in Christians' diction, and
paly on those few occasions when he momentarily forgets his south-ern adoption does he sound either the legitimate "r" of Webster or the illegitimate "r" of Green Pernt. While Christians has adopted

the mellow tone of "southern talk," he retains the shrewdness of New York and gives a flagrant exhibi-tion of the double-crossing tendencies which, some legends proclaim, abound in this metropolis. A complete assortment of Christians' disloyalties to his well-meaning and evil associates will be placed on display here.

Christians is about five-feet-seven and weighs about 145 pounds. In his poorly fitting suit (which must be three or four years old, because no pants could bag at the knees in the manner bag at the knees in the manner of his without having been used over that period), he is not an impressive figure. Were it not that he bears a striking and, I believe, unaffected, resemblance to Hitler his facial properties would be commonplace and unattractive. He has large blue eyes with bags be-neath which cause his acquaint-ances to wonder at the truth of his protestations of temperate hab-His hair is light brown.

Although the leader of the White Shirts, Christians on the first day of our acquaintance wore a blue shirt with a slightly frayed col-lar. On the second day he wore a white shirt; and on the third day it was a dirty shirt, originally

Works Alone

His "headquarters" are a suite of two office rooms on the seventh floor of the James building. He works alone with Miss Kelly, his secretary, but occasionally re-ceives a "secretary of state," "minister of economics," or some other high official of the Christians cabinet. Some of his officials ride into town on freight trains, but he occasionally sees that they leave on one of the cheaper bus lines for new points of propaganda and agitation.

The headquarters are modestly

six of the eight hours of his working day. His political files, occupying two large compartments of a filing cabinet, contain correspon-dence under four or five hundred listings. His name, without fur-ther title, appears on one of the two doors leading to his office. On the other is the title of his engineering concern; the American Asphalt Grouting Company, Was Successful Engineer

He is generally conceded to have been a successful engineer. His grouting process, which stops leaks in dams and to which he is understood to have full title, is considered successful. Christians claims, and others say, that he lost about \$200,000 in stocks during the crash; and although he has had little work in the last few years he manages to live comfortably. The report among Chattanooga townspeople is that the commander-in-chief married conveniently into an honored and well-to-do old Southern family. He has been advising his mother-in-law, along with almost all his friends and relatives, to refuse to pay taxes

string along with him in his en-terprise to refuse to support the government.

In Words Only

Christians is extravagant only with words, as his files indicate. All his active supporters, as far as I could see, were forever seek ing paltry loans from their chief. Instead of giving cash, he writes consoling letters and refers them to rival Fascist leaders. How he retains their loyalty on subsistence wages of six and seven-page letters from headquarters and whatever contributions they can squeeze out of gullible persons subscribing to the Christians racket Heaven only knows.

On the first day of our acquaintance he took great pleasure in having the "International Jewish Money Bund," which he was sure, subsidized my visit to Chattanoo-ga, pay for his lunch. He reciprocated on the second day, however, and at a still later date he again contributed lunch money to "our cause" due to an unhappy flip of a coin.

Although he has been under ohservation as a candidate for deten-tion in a federal asylum for the insane, Christians in this reporter's opinion is far from being the "nut" opministration being the inter-the is credited as being. He is a clever fellow with a fine appre-ciation of the limits of our broad liberties of speech and action which he strains in promoting his which he strains in promoting his personality and an economic scheme which, if effective, is enough to surrender the rights and properties of the people into the hands of whoever may be strong enough to grasp control of a de-snating nation spairing nation

Christians appears to have scared his fellow townsmen and, as far as can be learned, he receives neither great opposition nor support in Chattanooga. That the Fascist prophet is quite without honor in his home is told with avidity by newspapermen. Despite a steady stream of correspondence with which he floods the local editorial offices, he is given not a line except on those rare occasions when he pulls some ridiculous stunt that sends his name over the press wires of the country. This has happened on two or three occasions, and he gains occasional mention in magazines; hence, can take credit neither for "finding" the Fascist chief nor for doing him any particular great serin granting unearned publicity.

Victim of Persecution

The commander-in-chief is convinced that he is the victim of press persecution. "A campaign of silence," he calls it. He fails to realize that the press might have other subjects than his ego for the other subjects than his ego for the nation's front pages. In this re-spect he is of the crank type so familiar to editors. "I beg to advise you," the letter, addressed to William Rosenberg, executive secretary of the Alliance, reads, "that this matter has been very thoroughly considered by the Rosed of Superiplem. ered by the Board of Superinten-dents, and it was decided that the schools should open on September 11th in accordance with the by-laws of the Board of Education."

According to Mr. Rosenberg, this is interpreted as a concession to the alliance. The by-laws of the board, he maintains, state that school opening should take place or the first Monday after Labor Day in September, which this year falls on the tenth. Further, that was the date of opening announced recently by the Board. Rosenberg's opinion, which could not be verified yesterday because no member of the Board of Education could be reached is that the inal by-laws were amended to take care of the contingency.

cession or not, however, it is un-satisfactory to the Alliance, Rosenberg informed the Jewish Daily Bulletin. A letter protesting the decision will be formulated by Dr. Bernard Drachman, president, and Rosenberg, either today or tomorrow, in which the demand will be made that school opening be de-ferred until the twelfth of the

If this request is not granted, Rosenberg state., a written appeal will be issued by the Alliance to all parents of Jewish children urg-ing them to keep their children from attending school on the sec-ond day of Rosh Hashonah, as well as the first.

Dr. Heinrich Stern, who spoke for the large German Jewish dele-gation, expressed his pride in the presence of the German group and ointed out that Germany was the birthplace of liberal Judaism.

Rabbi Wolff of Dresden, Germany, said in his greeting to the conference that a denial that there existed a characteristic Jewish type would be a sin against life, but making it a fetish would be against the meaning of life. He leclared that Jews throughout their history had been embedded among the peoples of the world. We affirm the historical right of the Jews to live in the land we were born and amid the culture which formed us, remaining Jews because we believe in our particular Jewish life."

Undue Rise in Persecution Rabbi Morris Lazaron of Baltimore described how three successive waves of Jewish emigration

to the United States had brought some 4,000,000 Jews from all corners of the world. He stated that most American Jews were not affiliated officially with the liberal movement in Judaism, but the group numbered several hundred thousand.

Rabbi Jacob Singer of Chicago outlining the misfortunes of Jews, concluded that they had in-Jews, concluded that they had in-creased disproportionately in an age of upheavals. "We see what happens in a world which is los-ing its moral foundations," he de-clared. A grave scarcity of food, for which the Deutsche Wochenschau attempted to blame the Jews, is already seriously disturbing the population of the larger communities. There is a grave shortage of potatoes and rice and the supply grows shorter daily.

Even in Berlin, the capital, long queues are assembled outside the food shops. The scenes are reminiscent of war-time days when the Allied blockade of Germany was

at its most effective point.

Berlin, deprived of accurate information as to what is going on, hummed with rumors and "interpretations" today and read into Hitler's week-end vacation in Ba-varia a forecast of his permanent retirement.

The city was also agitated by reports that storm troopers were planning to avenge the deaths of their leaders and with specula-tions on the fate of the storm troops.
