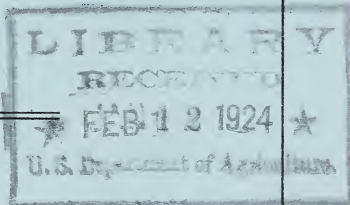

WHEN, HOW AND WHERE TO PLANT.

Any good garden soil, avoiding extremes of dryness or heavy clay, will grow Narcissi. In the house those varieties that are fitted for such culture require only water and stones or moss. The strength is stored in the bulb to produce a flower, but to reproduce blubs, it must have food and water during the fall and spring months. Good drainage is essential. Do not grow them where their "feet" are in standing water. Avoid using fresh manure; it will rot the bulbs.

Early fall is the time for planting. August and the first weeks in September, in the northern part of the United States, is the ideal time. The earlier they are in the ground out of doors the better root system they can have. Later planting, even into early November, may be done, but at the expense of the plant and bloom. The whole secret of success in producing the best, largest, most perfect and richest colored flowers and foliage is maximum root development. (A. M. Kirby.)

"No roots, no flowers; poor roots, poor flowers; good roots, good flowers."

Plant six inches apart and cover the bulbs three inches is a general rule. This should be varied according to the size and variety. Use your discretion. Covering the bulb with soil equal to its largest circumference is a rule used by many.

NATURALIZING NARCISSI.

(Planting like wild flowers in fields and woods.)

By naturalizing is meant to plant them in a natural way or as nature plants. Fill your pockets with bulbs and take a spade with you. As you walk about select places where sunshine and moisture may be had and lift the sod or soil with the spade, leaving the spade in the ground until you have thrown a few bulbs under the spade, then remove it and let the earth cover the bulbs. Press the earth firmly by standing on the turf and tramping it down. If you prefer a staff to a spade, provide anything with which a hole may be made in the earth large enough to allow the bulb to be

placed three or four inches below the surface, put in the bulb, fill the hole with dirt and press firmly down, leaving the place level with the surface. Distribute them as you please. Keep in mind that the bulbs will increase from year to year and form colonies. Imitate nature. In choosing varieties for naturalizing, the smaller and more refined ones will give the greatest satisfaction. Such varieties as *Barrii Conspicuus* and *Poeticus Recurvus* are splendid for naturalizing.

Do not plant where the grass will be mown before the leaves have time to dry on the plant. In order to multiply and produce new bulbs the leaves are necessary. The planting of *Narcissi* on estates in the country where they may bloom by the million will add to the beauty of the country homes, as it has in England. Because they need no care and multiply freely they are the least expensive adornment of the landscape.

No sight is more delightful than the fresh brightness of spring flowers growing freely in grass land or lending color to woodland walks, hedgerows, and ditches, here and there nestling at the foot of trees, or establishing themselves on sloping banks." THE LARGE TRUMPET DAFFODILS.

(Ajax—Narcissus—Yellow.)

EMPEROR 10c each, \$1 per doz., \$7.50 per 100

"A universally admired variety. It is one of the best and largest of all the yellow daffodils, deservedly popular for pot culture, forcing, naturalizing, and for use in borders. The flowers, borne on long stems, are of immense size, firm in substance and of well-balanced form. The broad trumpet is rich golden yellow, and the petals—broad and rounded—are but slightly lighter in tone. It is a strong, healthy grower and free bloomer, doing its best in a strong, rich, well-drained loam." (A. M. Kirby's Description.)

GLORY OF LEIDEN.....

"Dubbed and truly 'The King of the Daffodils.' It is a giant seedling, resembling, but superior to, Emperor, one of its parents.
