Water-Boats and Water Supply to Ships in Port.

The water-boats, 20 in number, have been examined as usual, and the tanks found in good condition.

In 53 cases the *drinking water* of ships, which came from Ports infected, or suspected to be infected, with Cholera, has been changed, and the purification of the tanks has been seen to by the Inspector, acting under the direction of the Medical Officer of Health.

Advices as to Sickness.

on shipboard, and other matters, continued to be received from and forwarded to the Health Departments of other British Port Sanitary Authorities.

Clothing and Bedding.

39 vessels and several lots of clothing or bedding have been disinfected. 180 old beds have been burnt, and 10 lots of filthy clothing has been destroyed, on account of infection.

Passenger Steamers.

The Passenger Steamers arriving continue to be regularly visited and examined.

Fishing Boats.

The total arrival of fishing vessels at the Quay, North Shields, steam and sailing, is 13,424* (6,172 Trawlers and 7,252 Herring Boats), as compared with a total of 13,871 in the previous year. 64 of these, in foul condition, were cleansed and deodorized on notice from the Inspector. The rest were in good order.

Foul Cattle Ships.

The Inspector reports that 3 Cattle Ships arrived in the Port direct with cattle, and 2 after having landed cattle elsewhere. They were cleansed under his supervision.

Regulations.

Copies of Regulations issued have, as usual, been posted on all gangways, and delivered on board of vessels in the port.

Precautions taken against the Importation of Cholera.

On August 31st a case of cholera was reported from the Port of Hamburg. From Russia the disease was introduced into Prussia and Germany. On September 8th the Authority, at a special meeting, resolved to medically inspect all arrivals from foreign; in order to detect, at the earliest opportunity, any case of the disease that might be imported by reason of the large and regular traffic between the Continent and the Tyne Ports.

On September 11th, Drs. Hutchins, Hume, and Waters were appointed to take eight hour watches, and these gentlemen medically examined all crews and passengers from Foreign Ports on arrival. For this special work the steam launch "John Forster Spence" was used continuously night and day from September 11th to November 12th. During that time the following table shews the number of vessels, crews, and passengers dealt with. Fortunately no cases of cholera were imported into the Tyne.
