


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

Introduction

THE FIRST action relative to the publication of a history of P. E. O. in Iowa was taken in 1951. Helen F. Dryden, president, submitted the question to her board; Luella B. Fatland, first vice president; Hazel F. Bleeker, second vice president; Vesta Ketels, organizer; Florence Myers, recording secretary; Marie Nesler, corresponding secretary; Phyllis Crawford, treasurer.

They gave unanimous approval. The question was then submitted by Mrs. Dryden in her annual letter sent to all Iowa chapters. She enclosed a printed ballot on which the record of the vote taken by the chapter was reported. The vote was overwhelmingly in favor of the publication.

The president appointed a temporary committee, Mabel Duree, chairman, Maude M. Cooper and Winona E. Reeves with instruction to bring a report to the 1951 convention in Ottumwa.

The report of the findings of the committee and of the possibilities and advantages of such a history, was presented by Mrs. Duree. The vote, when taken, was unanimously in favor of the publication.

The temporary committee was by reappointment made a permanent committee, with permission to add additional names, which was done making a committee of five: Mabel Duree, Maude M. Cooper, Winona E. Reeves, Helen F. Dryden, Laura Storms Knapp.

The book, accordingly, has been written and published in the 1951-52 administration.



1. Whence Came P.E.O. Historically

P.E.O. historically had its inception long before the founding of the organization itself. What we are pleased to call its historic inception long antedated January 21, 1869.

The organization of women as such, began in 1830 with the admission of girls to classes of high school grade. Previous to that time women were given no educational training except in elementary schools, where reading, writing, and arithmetic were taught.

The whole system of organized women, which in time, put into the vocabulary of the world the phrase "the feminist move-

ment" was in the beginning an education movement.

In earlier days, in the late 1700's, colleges for men had been established in America, in order that the church might have an educated clergy. Not that every college boy became a clergyman, but the higher education rendered him eligible if he so desired.

College training for women came in 1833 when Oberlin offered advanced classes for women and in 1836 Mt. Holyoke seminary was founded. As you know, in those years seminaries were where females went to school.

Five more years passed, when came the founding of Iowa Wesleyan College in 1841, and chartered in 1842, the first co-educational college west of the Mississippi, and among the first institutions in America to recognize the right of women to college training.

The sorority system of which P. E. O. was a part came as a

natural result of co-educational association.

There had developed in 1776 among men students at William and Mary College, a group of congenial spirits who met off campus in Raleigh tavern in Williamsburg, to talk, to debate and to discuss matters of mutual interest.

They formed a society to which they gave the name "Phi Beta Kappa"; a secret society it was. The Greek words are translated "Philosophy the Guide of Life."

In this first group began the college fraternity system, which, some ninety years later was followed by college groups among women, the sorority system.

The first such organization was the "I.C. Sorosis" founded in Monmouth College (Illinois) in 1867, with a second chapter organized in Iowa Wesleyan College. In 1888, I.C. became Pi Beta Phi, a national sorority.

The second college group of women was founded in 1869 in Iowa Wesleyan College, the "P. E. O. Society."

It maintains its English letters but, having outgrown campus environment, it became a city organization, supporting greatly increased educational projects for women, through a Loan Fund and in the ownership and support of a college, Cottey College.

2. Founders of P.E.O. and the Place of Its Founding

THE INCIDENT of the impulse out of which came the organi-

zation of P. E. O. was seemingly a trivial one.

Two girls sitting on a stile at a corner of the campus of a little western college, suggesting the forming of a society, then impulsively running across the campus to their hearts' best friends to share the plan, seemed a simple incident of a day at school.

And yet out of that has come after 83 years a great organization of approximately 110,000 women who have aided in the promotion of the education of thousands of other women. Thus seeming-

ly trivial incidents come to be events of importance.

The two young girls on the stile, Hattie Briggs and Franc Roads, with Mary Allen, Alice Bird, Alice Virginia Coffin, Suela Pearson and Ella Stewart, met on that very morning, January 21, 1869, in the Music Room in Old Main on the college campus, to discuss their plan.

Out of that informal meeting came organization of the "P. E. O. Society." It was a secret society from the beginning with emphasis on that fact, thus the story of early activities came

as traditions.

Events or happenings that are only remembered by those who lived through them and are passed by word of mouth from one generation to another are traditions. When the narrator dies the stories die with him, unless some of his hearers remember and pass them on; ultimately, however, they die. If a tradition or an event is written and comes to print it lives and, as has been said, "The written word is immortal."

Fortunately for P. E. O., its history and its earliest traditions have been sought out and recorded while the founders and other early members still lived and could verify those early happenings.

The "Original Seven" set the type of membership and the

social and cultural pattern for future membership.

In the beginning they knew not that they were establishing an institution to be handed down to other generations; they but followed the urge of their own personalities, and there developed the P. E. O. Sisterhood. Its growth has been an evolution, as indeed is all life.

Members of that type could not be self-centered, and wherever a chapter was organized, it developed some sort of altruistic work. Finally as it grew numerically and over greater area, a service was sought, a something they might do unitedly. Out of that endeavor, by trial and error, but quite logically, having been born in a college, its educational projects were developed in the establishment and maintenance of an Educational Fund and in the ownership and support of a college, Cottey College.

The biographies of the Founders have been written many times, so the writing of them here is in a more informal way.

When those of us who are here are gone to our reward, whatever that may be, whether a mansion among the blessed or "only a cabin in the sky", we shall be remembered by people, few or many, because of some incident, some characteristic that defines our personality.

It is somewhat like the human interest story, "that part of

the morning paper that is remembered."

And so we shall by some characteristic call to memory seven

girls grown to womanhood, who gave us P. E. O.

In the beginning may we say that in 1869 in college and out of it, in their family and social relationships, they were all somebody. Only those who speak the American language would understand what we mean when we say they were "somebody". They had position then, and every one of them had personality and position to the end of life.

HATTIE BRIGGS (BOUSQUET)

Fittingly enough, we begin with the one who spoke the first words that caused the formation of P. E. O. - Hattie Briggs (Bousquet). She was the daughter of a Methodist preacher and lived up to the part. She could play the organ, start the hymns, pray in public, lead a prayer meeting. She could in time of a revival talk to other students about their "Souls' salvation." not only could, but did all of those things.

She lived only eight years in P. E. O. After she had been gone for a half century, Mrs. Stafford was asked what she remembered particularly about Hattie. She thought a moment and then said, "I think it is her smile that I remember best." In the vernacular of the Methodist class meeting of that time, she would have been called "a radiant Christian."

ELLA STEWART

Ella Stewart was also the daughter of a Methodist minister, the Reverend Mr. I. I. Stewart, who later became a presiding elder. Now to be a Methodist preacher in those days was to lead a rugged life, and so Mr. Stewart "with the burden of his years for a pillow, lay down beside the Pilgrim road to rest."

This tragedy to the family led to the thing by which Ella Stewart shall be remembered, that at the end of her Junior year

she left college to help her mother.

In leaving school she failed to receive her Bachelor's degree but, teaching boys in the State Reform School, she became a pioneer in the great social service movement that seeks to make of bad boys, good citizens of our Republic. Her method differed widely from the modern ones, but who shall say they were not better, in that she taught, in addition to arithmetic and history and spelling, lessons in right living and thinking.

She was always busy and Mrs. Babb said of her, "When you saw Ella coming you felt as if you ought get out your tatting and

go to work."

She gave eight years of her life to that work in the Boys' Industrial School, as it is now called, and she still is remembered there, its first teacher. On the wall of that school in Eldora, there hangs a lovely picture of her. If you were to make inquiry the boys there could tell you about her.

SUELA PEARSON (PENFIELD)

Someone writing in early days of Suela Pearson (Penfield) said that "she was prominent from childhood in whatever adorned and beautified." Always she was selected as the Goddess of Liberty on patriotic occasions or the Spirit of Christmas at holiday times. No one ever doubted or disputed her place in social functions and yet she was ever gracious and very kind. She was one upon whom the spot light fell. Shall we remember Suela as wholly unspoiled by prosperity, equally unspoiled by sorrow, for tragedy comes also to those upon whom the spotlight falls.

ALICE VIRGINIA COFFIN

Alice Virginia Coffin came from a family that had great pride

in ancestry. That pride still holds in all who trace descent back to Tristam Coffin of Mayflower fame, and on the distaff side to Charles Thompson, secretary of the convention that framed the Declaration of Independence of these United States.

Tristam Coffin, the poet, shared in the same ancestry.

We shall not forget these things but to remember Alice Virginia herself is very pleasant. By profession she was a public school teacher. Of course her pupils received academic training, but they remembered more particularly her friendly gracious attitude, her courtesy to all of them — indeed, that is what her friends too remembered. Do you suppose that there can be a relationship between being well born and the quality of friendly courtesy?

ALICE BIRD (BABB)

Alice Bird (Babb) once told what she did during the noon

hour on January 21, 1869.

The girls had met that morning and decided that they would have a society. They further told Allie Bird that she should write a constitution and bring it back with her to college that afternoon,

when they would surely start their society.

Accordingly Allie Bird went home, ate her dinner and, as she said, went into the spare room (guest room to you) and closed the door. She drew a chair up before the window, pushed back the crisp white curtains, took a piece of paper and a pencil from her pocket, looked out of the window and thought for a little while. Then she wrote, not a constitution at all, but wrote the pledge by which you and I and all the others who are P. E. O.'s have come to membership.

She gave it a dramatic touch, a bit of action. She was the

first P. E. O. because she took the pledge first.

She was chosen president that day, the first in the long line of presidents who have served in the thousands of chapters since organized.

FRANC ROADS (ELLIOTT)

It is easy to understand why Franc Roads (Elliott) "fell" for the new society; it was a forward step in the feminist movement, although that word was not so used then.

Perhaps more than any other one of the seven, she sensed its

import.

There are scores of stories that could be told of the outstanding things she did. She worked for the franchise of women along with Susan B. Anthony and Lucy Stone. She spoke and worked

for the abolishment of war, when the rest of the world glorified it. It was she who wrote and worked to have women seated as delegates in the General Conference of the Methodist Church. She was an artist in every impulse. She studied in the Chicago Art Institute and in the galleries of France and Italy. She was highly intelligent in all her undertakings. Hers was an active mind plus, and her eyes saw beauty everywhere.

MARY ALLEN (STAFFORD)

Mary Allen (Stafford) was in all truth one who could be termed a lady. In any company she would be noted and classified as a gentlewoman. Dr. Stafford himself told of the advice given

him in college days by the presiding elder.

He was a country boy studying for the ministry. The presiding elder said "Charley, Mary Allen is not the girl for a poor preacher to marry. She is too fond of parties and fine clothes." But Charley and Mary thought differently and so they were married.

The Methodist Church gave him many honors including a college presidency. Mary Allen gave added honor to every position.

Bishop Edwin Holt Hughes spoke at Dr. Stafford's funeral. His closing words were:

"And now this man of God has gone to join that lovely,

lovely lady who has gone before."

We, too, shall remember a great and gallant lady, Mary Allen Stafford.

THE PLACE OF FOUNDING

Fortunate for its future was the place of the founding of P. E. O.

Mt. Pleasant was settled by families from the east, who were interested in education and in the establishment of a Christian community. It was called "The Athens of Iowa", for it had three schools of higher learning when other communities had only district schools.

Located there was Iowa Weslevan College, one of the oldest colleges in the United States, founded in 1841 and chartered in 1842; Howe's Academy, a pioneer Normal School, and a female seminary, known as "The Young Ladies' Seminary."

Equally fortunate was this P. E. O. Society in the type of

Equally fortunate was this P. E. O. Society in the type of institution from which it came, Iowa Weslevan College. A church school it was, as were all early American Colleges, and it still is

of that pattern. Families of many early members were associated with the college administration in various ways, which gave a certain prestige to the new society.

Iowa Wesleyan has a number of firsts in its history. It was the first college of its rank organized west of the Mississippi River. It was among the first co-educational schools, and perhaps the only

one to admit women on its opening day.

Iowa Wesleyan has the distinction of having been the first of any college of Liberal Arts in the world to give the B.A degree to a woman. To Lucy W. Kilpatrick (Byrkit), the first woman graduate of Iowa Wesleyan, 1859, was bestowed the degree by Dr. Charles Elliott, president.

These are some of the things that P. E. O. today owes to its

earliest members and to the birthplace of the Sisterhood.

3. The College Chapter S

HERE has been confusion concerning Chapter S, Iowa, called also "The College Chapter" or sometimes "The Second College Chapter". This name came into use because it was the second chapter to be organized on the Iowa Wesleyan campus, Chapter A having been the original, organized January 21, 1869. Miss Maisy B. Schreiner, a charter member of Chapter S, lives in Mt. Pleasant and we are indebted to her for part of the information concerning

these early days.

In 1911 Chapter A was officially given the name Original A. In the beginning it was a college chapter, but as the members were graduated they continued to hold their active membership and at the same time college girls were being initiated into the chapter. For many reasons this was not too satisfactory so the college girls asked if they might have a chapter of their own. The petition was granted and Chapter AJ was organized February 4, 1889 by Mrs. Alice Bird Babb and Mrs. Effie Hoffman Rogers. There were 17 on the charter list. When the chapters were relettered by authorization of the 1893 Grand Chapter convention held in Waterloo where Mrs. Jessie Mallory Thayer presided, AJ, the college chapter, became Chapter S.

Iowa Wesleyan authorities had decided that the school enrollment could support four secret societies, two for men and two for women; Phi Delta Theta and Beta Theta Pi for the men and

P. E. O. and I.C., later Pi Beta Phi, for the women.

The P. E. O. law required then as now that a woman should live in a town for a year before she could be invited to membership. The college rules permitted rushing as soon as a young woman arrived on the campus. Under these circumstances it was impossible for the two women's groups to be governed by the same rules. In order to compete with Pi Beta Phi, Chapter AJ needed to issue invitations to membership as soon as the girls entered college. This they did and of course it met with the disapproval of the officers of P. E. O. Mrs. Alice Bird Babb was often called upon to repri-

mand the "wayward chapter." She replied that "if the old college chapter needed a reprimand somebody besides Alice Bird Babb would have to do the scolding as that chapter was dear to the scenes

of my youth."

In 1889 Chapter AJ (later S) brought to the Grand Chapter convention which was held in Mt. Pleasant and presided over by Mrs. Effie Hoffman Rogers a request that they be allowed to "pledge those whom they desired as members until they could be fully initiated." This was approved and the system worked fairly well for a time.

The concessions authorized by the convention were still not sufficient to enable the chapter to compete satisfactorily with other groups on the campus. Later other P. E. O. chapters wished and were granted the same privileges. It became increasingly difficult to administer town and college chapters under the same laws.

In 1902 Chapter S petitioned to disband and the 1903 Iowa Grand Chapter convention meeting in Iowa City, presided over

by Mrs. Mary McDonald Knapp, granted the request.

Since Chapter S was preparing to leave the Iowa Wesleyan campus as an active group it left a vacancy in the number of secret societies the college authorized and Alpha Xi Delta, a Greek letter sorority, organized in 1893 at Lombard College, Galesburg, Illinois, established its Beta chapter on the Iowa Wesleyan campus in 1902.

Miss Schreiner tells that "those of us who had been graduated before this date, but were members of Chapter S were made alumnae members of Beta chapter of Alpha Xi Delta if we wished

and applied within certain limits of time."

The last enrollment number for Chapter S is One Hundred Nine. Each girl retained her individual membership and affiliated later with the chapter in her home community but the college Chapter S was disbanded.

While all regretted giving up the charter of this, our last college chapter, it seemed the only possible procedure since the laws governing town chapters were not adaptable to a college

campus.

To quote *The Story of P. E. O.*, "The truths taught in P. E. O. and the beauty of its ritual must have found lodgment in the hearts of the initiates for some of the most loyal members of P. E. O. belonged to that chapter."

4. Development of Laws and Ceremonies

In THAT first hasty meeting of the seven, on the morning of January 21, 1869, they recognized the need of some sort of document to govern their proposed society. All they did that morning was to decide that they would have a society. As they adjourned to meet again that same afternoon, one said, "Allie Bird, while you are at home, write a constitution and bring it back with you, and we will start the society."

In that noon hour, she wrote as is recorded elsewhere, not a constitution at all, but the pledge by which the seven, and all the other thousands who have followed them, have come to membership.

It was the first ceremony.

After a short time, when others beside the seven had joined the society, the girls worked together on a more extended document which they called the P. E. O. Constitution and By-Laws.

- Art. 1. Sec. 1. Whereas, recognizing it to be the chief duty of every individual to cultivate her powers, physical, mental, moral, and social to their fullest extent, we organize ourselves into a secret society and adopt for our government the following constitution and by-laws.
- Art. 2, Sec. 1. The object of this society shall be general improvement which shall comprehend more especially:

First, Improvement in our charity toward and interest in each other as P. E. O.'s.

Second, Improvement in our charity toward and interest in all with whom we associate.

Third, Improvement in our manners at home and in society.

Fourth, Improvement in our minds by perusing such books and pamphlets as will be proper for P. E. O.'s.

While no constitution nor by-laws could ever develop from this document, however with many changes and revisions there did develop that other set of rules, P. E. O. Objects and Aims.

With the growth of the organization along other lines its

ceremonies have grown in dignity and efficiency.

The first formal constitution was written in 1890 to govern the Grand Chapter. The full text of that document is printed in the Story of P. E.O., Volume 1, page 30.

It is sort of breathlessly written with a desire to get it all in. It gives evidence of having been written before Robert's Rules of

Order became the parliamentarian's bible.

In later years after State Chapters were formed, the several states wrote every one its own constitution, in which also were incorporated the Grand Chapter laws. One state defined its own terms of eligibility — "This society shall be composed of ladies of good standing." Another provided "That the secretary shall correspond at least once during her term of office with all other chapters." She was required also "to send a copy of the constitution to chapters requesting it." Upon the death of a member all of her chapter were required to drape their pins for 21 days.

In 1892 a complete revision of the constitution was made in parliamentary form, divided as it now is, in three parts. All secret work was removed, and for the first time it was printed and distributed to local and state chapters. Thus laws became uniform

throughout the Sisterhood.

The revision was made during the presidency of Mrs. A. R.

Dewey with Mrs. Babb as chairman of the committee.

Since then other revisions have been made, notably the one

in 1939, P. E. O.'s fiftieth year.

At every convention changes are made as the expansion of P. E. O. and its activities require.

5. Organization of the Iowa State Chapter

I OWA Grand Chapter was the second State Chapter to be organized. In the Mt. Pleasant convention in 1889, Nebraska had sought a separate state organization. They were informed that their request would be granted as soon as they had seven chapters in their state. A seventh chapter was immediately organized at Wahoo and the Nebraska Grand Chapter was organized in Omaha in April, 1890.

There was discussion in the 1891 Grand Chapter convention about separating the Iowa chapters from the governing body but

no action was taken at that time.

Chapter G, Ottumwa started the movement for Iowa when the president, Mrs. Alice Spilman, contacted the 22 chapters in Iowa asking them to express their wishes in regard to forming a State Grand Chapter. A large majority favored the plan and the organization was set for Friday, following the close of the 1893 convention of the Grand Chapter in Waterloo. Iowa Grand Chapter was officially created at that time.

According to the minutes of the 1893 convention, the petition which was presented to Supreme Grand Chapter was signed by Mrs. Lulu A. McHenry, Mrs. Ella DeArnold, Mrs. Alice (Bird) Babb, Mrs. C. G. Anderson, Miss Emily McCormick and Mrs. Ollie Gates Pulliam, representing the Iowa chapters which petitioned. The petition was granted and at 9:30 p.m., following the last meeting of Supreme Grand Chapter convention, the organizing convention of Iowa opened. Mrs. Winnie Durland, the first organizer of Supreme Grand Chapter, called the meeting to order and appointed Mrs. Sarah Dewey as secretary. The charter was read by Mrs. McHenry. Mrs. Spilman and Miss McCormick,

appointed as a committee on credentials, found the following members present representing their chapters:

A resolution, presented by Mrs. Lulu McHenry, asking that members be seated in convention, was adopted. Miss Ella Randel was appointed to select two assistants, the three forming a committee to draft by-laws to govern this newly organized Grand Chapter.

The election of officers followed: President, Mrs. Alice S. Spilman, N, Ottumwa; First Vice President, Miss Bertha Morrison, AR, Atlantic; Second Vice President, Miss Emma McCormick, Z, Chariton; Recording Secretary, Miss Flora Wilson, AY,

Ames; Corresponding Secretary, Miss Marie Lyons, AG, Winterset; and Treasurer, Mrs. Lulu McHenry, AC, Des Moines.

The President of Supreme Grand Chapter, Mrs. Alice Briggs of Nebraska, installed the officers. Invitations from Chariton and Ottumwa chapters to hold the next meeting with them were read and the one from the Chariton Chapter was accepted.

The first task confronting this body was the relettering of the Iowa chapters. Mrs. Josie Smith of Centerville and Mrs. Maude Hammond of Oskaloosa were appointed to take over this work.

The time of the next meeting was set for the first Wednesday

after the fifteenth of June, 1894.

At the 1893 meeting it was decided to establish annual Grand Chapter dues of fifty cents per member. Iowa Grand Chapter was instructed not to elect an organizer for the 1893-1894 term as no dispensations to organize were to be granted until the new constitution went into effect. Mrs. Walter Campbell of Oskaloosa was

the first organizer, elected in 1894.

At subsequent conventions many philanthropies were presented which indicated a desire on the part of members of the Iowa Grand Chapter to be of service to others. Some of these plans did not materialize yet the dreams of the early members were realized in the establishment of the Educational Fund, the erection of the Memorial Library on Iowa Wesleyan College campus, the acquisition and promotion of Cottey College and the many other splendid philanthropies of the Sisterhood. Iowa State Chapter has established two projects of her own—the Welfare and Trust Fund and the Sarah Porter Beckwith Home—and has always worked enthusiastically and unselfishly for the projects of Supreme Chapter.

The following quotation testifies to the motivating force which inspired the P. E. O. program of philanthropy and education. statement was made by Mary Allen Stafford in a western convention many years ago: "It has not been, and I hope may never be, ambitions for promotion or notoriety or fame that have actuated us in our activities, but the good of others and so far as possible the good of all others—inspired by the love of the pure, the true, the good in womanhood and through womanhood—which have bound us in our activities. While such motives and such activities shall characterize our Sisterhood, it cannot help but grow and

be great."

6. Iowa Chapters

THE FIRST P. E. O. SOCIETIES

HILE the surface reason for the formation of the first P. E. O. Society was to bind more closely the bonds of friendship which existed among the seven girls who founded it, perhaps there

was a latent dream of something broad and substantial.

If there was any vision of growth and expansion of purpose, that dream has been realized to a great extent in the 15,000 Iowa women who proudly wear the golden star and in their accomplishments for Iowa and for the P. E. O. Sisterhood. Every chapter has had a share in these accomplishments and to them all honor is due.

As this bond of friendship prevailed in the first society, so it was emphasized in the formation of the early societies which followed.

Girl students from other towns were initiated into this first society at Mt. Pleasant and into the one which came into being at The Ladies Seminary in the same town very soon afterwards. Some of these girls were given permission to sponsor groups in their communities and thus P. E. O. began to spread as these societies were formed.

One girl, an initiate of the Mt. Pleasant society, who was given permission to organize a society in her home town, was Maggie Pierson (Young) of Centerville. In relating her experience, which was typical, perhaps, of others in those early days, she says, "In the spring when college closed, I was asked if I thought it possible to have a society in my home town. Of course I was delighted for I knew the fine material there was at home and in the local girls.

"I went home quite proud of the responsibility that had been given me, and felt it would be a very easy affair to accomplish. But I found I had a problem to solve as none of the girls had ever heard of a secret society. Finally after much talking, all obstacles

were removed and there was a fine society formed."

In so far as records are available, the first eleven societies were formed in the following towns:

Some of these groups existed for only a short while because the personnel dispersed to other localities and their societies no longer existed. Again, others grew in membership and because of their efforts and zeal, and with the guidance of the mother society, they began to build our P. E. O. organization which we have today.

It was from these societies then existing, located in Mt. Pleasant, Jacksonville, Illinois, Bloomfield, Fairfield, Burlington, Centerville and Iowa City, that delegates went to Fairfield in October, 1883, and formed the Grand Chapter of the P. E. O. Sisterhood.

Each group was just another P. E. O. society, but as P. E. O. continued to spread, there was a need for some method of designating one group from the other, and so the plan of using the letters of the alphabet was adopted and the name chapter came into use.

EARLY CHAPTERS

Chapters were first lettered in order of organization without relation to location. Since there were chapters in other states, the chapters of Iowa were not lettered in alphabetical sequence.

As soon as Iowa Grand Chapter was formed, these earlier chapters were re-lettered in chronological order. This accounts for all the chapters organized before that time, with the exception of A, Mt. Pleasant, having had two different designating letters.

CHAPTER ORIGINAL A, MT. PLEASANT

The first initiation charge was in October 1870 and roll call by the treasurer was instituted in 1874. Meetings sometimes cancelled, evidenced by words, "Rain, disagreeable on streets. No meeting."

7. Past Presidents of Iowa State Chapter

POR THE first 13 years of P. E. O. existence the Mt. Pleasant chapter was in a large sense the governing authority. Chapter A was the court of last appeal on all questions. Not that Chapter A had ruled with an iron hand, but it had started P. E. O. and the seven founders belonged to that chapter. Therefore it was natural that authority should be vested there.

Mrs. Nellie Ambler Campbell, a member of Chapter A, who was "preceptress and professor of literature" in Iowa Wesleyan College, sensing the need for a more democratic form of government, suggested that a meeting of representatives from the five existing chapters, Mt. Pleasant, Bloomfield, Fairfield, Jacksonville,

Illinois, and Centerville, be called to consider the matter.

Chapter A was willing to relinquish its so-called authority and a meeting was held at Bloomfield on November 1 and 2, 1882. There were two delegates present from each of the five chapters. The meeting was held in the parlor of the Methodist parsonage, the home of Lulu Corkill (Williams). Chapter A brought a proposed "constitution" which was only terms by which a convention could be called. Accordingly, the first convention was called in Fairfield October 10-12, 1883 at which seven chapters were represented. A constitution was adopted, under which "The Grand Chapter of the P. E. O. Sisterhood" was established and judiciary powers passed from Chapter A to the Grand Chapter.

The women who presided over the P. E. O. conventions, prior to the organization of the individual state chapters, were Iowa women and strongly influenced P. E. O. growth and development in Iowa as well as in other states. It seems fitting that these women should be mentioned here since officially during those early

years from 1869 to 1893 P. E. O. history was Iowa history.

*MRS. MARY BERRY PRICE (JOHNSON)

As Mary Berry, she was a charter member of Chapter D (formerly I), Centerville. She served her chapter as its first president and was also the first president of Grand Chapter, 1883-1884. Re-elected to serve as president in 1884-1885, she presided over the conventions held in Centerville and Ottumwa.

Of the pioneer type, retiring but forceful, she gave generously of her time in the first organization days. Under her leadership, P. E. O. grew both in numbers and in anticipated service. Her interest in P. E. O. was constant throughout the years of her life.

During her administrations a charter for chapters was set up, an installation ceremony was prepared and used, and an official pin was adopted, since the ones used previously were not uniform.

The first constitution was adopted and the name Grand Chapter of the P. E. O. Sisterhood was given to the body created by this Constitution. Organization of new chapters was discussed at the 1883 assembly. This 1883 general assembly, at which Mary Berry-Price was elected president, was the first convention and was known as the organizing convention.

*MISS CLARA WEINY

Miss Clara Weiny, a member of Chapter B (formerly F),

Bloomfield, served as president from 1885 to 1886.

During her administration the question of changing the meaning of P. E. O. was discussed and it was voted to retain the original meaning. At the 1886 convention which was held in Washington, the initiation ceremony was presented by Effie Hoffman Rogers. It was adopted and used without change for twentyone years.

This convention also ordered a seal, and from that time all records of conventions, copies of constitutions of Grand Chapter and local chapters, and all P. E. O. documents sent out to the chapters were sealed with the seal of the body, which read on the upper half of the circle: "Issued by Grand Chapter of," with "P. E. O." in star in center, and in the lower half of the circle the words: "Organized January 21st, 1869."

*MRS. EFFIE HOFFMAN ROGERS

Mrs. Effie Hoffman Rogers, initiated into the Seminary Chapter in 1871, was president of the Grand Chapter from 1886-1889. The conventions over which she presided were held in Albia, Keo-

sauqua, and Mt. Pleasant. Mrs. Rogers exerted a lasting influence on the future of P. E. O. in that several notable accomplishments

were achieved during her three years of administration.

Twenty-three chapters were organized during this time. The first state charters were discussed and permission was given to Nebraska to form a state chapter. A burial ritual was adopted. The seal was used for the first time on official papers. Uniform by-laws for local chapters were agreed upon and prepared for distribution to each chapter. The desire for a project whereby they could unite their efforts led up to the resolution to publish a magazine.

*MRS. NANNIE TORRENCE STOCKMAN

Mrs. Nannie Torrence Stockman was a member of Chapter L (old X) Sigourney and was elected president of the Grand Chapter for the term 1889-1890. She presided over the convention held in Burlington, was a member of the committee that established the Record and had the honor of organizing the first state chapter, Nebraska Grand Chapter.

*MISS ORIAN PENDLETON

Miss Pendleton, fifth President of Grand Chapter, served for the term 1890-1891. She was a member of Chapter D (old I), Centerville, at the time of her election but was a charter member of F (old M), Moulton.

She had served six terms as treasurer, being the first president of Grand Chapter who served in another office before she was

elected president.

At the close of her convention, she was presented a jewelled star in recognition of her seven years of faithful service as an

officer of Grand Chapter.

In the convention at Fairfield, over which she presided, there was some discussion about forming the Iowa Chapters into a State Chapter, setting them apart from the Grand Chapter but no action was taken.

*MRS. A. R. DEWEY

Mrs. Dewey was the last President of the Grand Chapter, which held its convention in Des Moines in 1892. She was a member of Chapter J (old Q), Washington.

In her convention, which was one of difficult situations, the name of the highest body of government was changed to Supreme

Grand Chapter. Many social affairs, sponsored by the P. E. O.'s

of Des Moines, gave variety to the busy days of convention.

The question of incorporation and forms for charters for state and local chapters were discussed. Committees were appointed to report on these matters at the next convention.

*MRS. ALICE SELLERS SPILMAN

Mrs. Spilman was initiated into Chapter G, Ottumwa, as a charter member and became the first president of Iowa Grand Chapter. She served from 1893 to 1895 and presided over the conventions held in Chariton and Ottumwa.

Charters were granted to AO, Newton, and AP, Harlan, in 1894 and to Chapters AQ, Brighton; AR, Grundy Center; AS, Manchester; AT, Spencer, and AU, Marengo, during the conven-

tion of 1895.

During her terms of administration; dues of the Iowa Grand Chapter were raised from 50c to 75c per member annually; the ritual was exemplified and a Memorial Hour was held at the conventions honoring the memory of sisters who had died during the current period of time.

Reports of chapter activities were read in convention by delegates from each chapter. Action was taken whereby new charters were granted to chapters organized before the State organization and each chapter was allowed to retain its original charter if it

so desired.

*MRS. LULU McHENRY, Q, DES MOINES

Initiated Chapter Q, Iowa

Organizer 1893-1894

Treasurer 1894-1895

President 1895-1896, Convention held in Winterset.

Charters were granted to Chapters AV, Prairie City; AW, Osage; and AX, Red Oak. There were 82 delegates representing 49 chapters present at this convention. Oral reports of chapter activities were given by delegates.

The proposition that a Home for Aged P. E. O.'s which was presented at the previous convention was "postponed until some future time." Chapter S submitted a plan for P. E. O. to present a music hall to Iowa Wesleyan College to be known as the Iowa Wesleyan University Conservatory of Music and P. E. O. Memorial Hall. The plan received considerable favor but was not adopted. The parliamentary authority was changed in 1896 from Harriett Shattuck to Robert's Rules of Order.

*MRS. FLORA CHESTER HERRING, C, FAIRFIELD

Initiated Chapter C, Iowa

Recording Secretary 1894-1895 and 1895-1896 President 1896-1897, Convention held in Knoxville

Charters were granted to Chapters AY, Esterville; AZ, Creston; BA, Colfax, and BB, Marshalltown. The notable achievements of the 1897 convention were: Establishment of a Reciprocity Bureau among Iowa chapters called State Literary Exchange Bureau; convention minutes of each convention and all officers' supplies were to be printed; the ritual was exemplified in convention by officers of Iowa Grand Chapter; many new by-laws and changes in those already in use were recommended and adopted.

*MRS WALTER CAMPBELL, X, OSKALOOSA

Initiated Chapter X, Iowa

Organizer 1894-1895

First Vice President 1896-1897

President 1897-1898 and 1898-1899, Conventions held in Osceola and Cedar Falls.

Charters were granted to Chapters BC, Waverly; BD, Independence; BE, Spirit Lake; BF, Afton; BG, DeWitt; BH, Monroe; BI, Sac City; BJ, Audubon; BK, Emmetsburg; BL, Rock Valley; BM, Grinnell; BN, Ackley; BO, Lake City; BP, Indianola.



Registration fee for delegates to Iowa State Chapter convention was raised from \$6 to \$8 and because of increased costs the convention voted that Iowa State Chapter pay \$700 instead of \$300 to the hostess chapters for entertaining conventions of Iowa State Chapter.

The committee investigating the need for an Iowa Executive Office did not recommend such an office and the proposed amendment failed for lack of a motion.

Iowa State Chapter complied with the provision adopted by the 1947 convention of Supreme Chapter that each P. E. O. pay \$1 per capita to Cottey College annually and incorporated this requirement into the state by-laws.

A new Standing Rule was put into effect which established four annual scholarships of \$150 each for Cottey College, two to be used for first year students and two for second year students. Prior to this time scholarships had been awarded annually.

A motion was made in this convention that a committee be appointed to revise the State Chapter by-laws for clarification. Mrs. Tressa Tallman, DE; Mrs. Helen Dryden, AE; and Mrs. Luella Fatland, BA, were appointed. In order to separate the administration of the Welfare and Trust Fund and the Sarah Porter Beckwith Home, the following was deleted from Article IX, Sec. 3, of the by-laws of the Sarah Porter Beckwith Home, "This Board also acts as Trustees of the Welfare and Trust Fund."

Mrs. Dryden appointed Mabel Duree, chairman, Maude Cooper and Winona E. Reeves, as a temporary committee to bring a report to the 1951 convention on the advisability of publishing a History of P. E. O. in Iowa. The convention gave approval and the temporary committee was made a permanent one with the privilege of adding members as needed. Helen Dryden and Laura Knapp were added to the committee. Mr. Merril Dryden, husband of Mrs. Dryden, presented Iowa State Chapter with a "Question Box" skillfully executed of walnut with silver fittings, his own workmanship—an heirloom for P. E. O. posterity. Iowa State Chapter voted to grant 10 \$200 scholarships, one for each year for 10 consecutive years, to be known as the Laura Storms Knapp scholarships. This gift was presented in her honor at the 1951 convention held in Philadelphia. All standing committees were made rotating committees with one new member to be appointed each year.

8. Iowa Women in Supreme Chapter Offices

SINCE Iowa was the birthplace of P. E. O., it was natural that Iowa women should play a great part in the early development of the Sisterhood.

With few exceptions, all of the offices of the Grand Chapter

were filled by Iowa women from 1884-1892.

There were two meetings held relative to the organization of the Grand Chapter. A preliminary meeting was held in Bloomfield, Iowa, November 1-2, 1882, presided over by Miss Ione Ambler.

The second meeting, October 10-12, 1883, when the organization was effected, was held in Fairfield, Iowa, with Miss Lillian Bartlett, as the presiding officer, and Miss Ella Albright, as secretary. All of these women were members of Chapter Original A, Mt. Pleasant.

PRESIDENTS OF SUPREME CHAPTER

Sixteen Iowa women have been president of Grand or Supreme Chapter. Fifteen of these held the office during the first twenty-seven years of Supreme Chapter. The sixteenth president held office in the 1949-51 biennium.

From the "Story of P. E. O." and from the pages of The Record, information concerning these sixteen women has been taken.

MRS. MARY BERRY PRICE (JOHNSON)

1883-1885

Mrs. Mary Berry Price (Johnson) was the first of the presidents of Grand Chapter, serving in the office for two years. Her

interest in P. E. O. was a driving force throughout her life. She was born in Wapello County, Iowa, April 23, 1856; educated in the public schools of Moulton, Iowa; taught school for several years; served for two years as postmistress of Centerville, Iowa; married to A. R. Price in 1884; left a widow in 1900; the mother of six children; a Methodist; a successful farm woman; initiated, as a charter member, into Chapter D, Centerville; died December 21, 1946, at her home in Abingdon, Illinois.

MISS CLARA WEINY

1885-1886

Miss Clara Weiny was the second president of Grand Chapter

serving for one year October, 1885, to October, 1886.

She was born in Van Buren County, Iowa, in 1861; given every educational advantage; a talented pianist; supervisor of music in the public schools of Bloomfield, Iowa; a Presbyterian.

Miss Weiny was initiated into P. E. O. in Chapter B, Bloomfield, in 1877 at the age of sixteen. She was an excellent executive; passed away June 25, 1901.

Mrs. Effie Hoffman Rogers, third of the Grand Chapter presi-

dents, served for three terms.

Mrs. Rogers was born May 13, 1853, in Jackson, Ohio; came west when eight years old to Oskaloosa, Iowa; was educated in public schools of Oskaloosa, Penn College, Allegheny College at Meadville, Penn., the Young Ladies' Seminary, Mt. Pleasant, Iowa; was married in 1880 to John F. Rogers; was the mother of two children; passed away February 7, 1918.

Mrs. Rogers was initiated into Chapter "Old B", Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, in 1871. The P. E. O. Record was established during her administration and she was its first editor; presented to the Sisterhood the initiation ceremony which was used for twenty-one years; gathered the material for publishing a P. E. O. directory.

MRS. NANNIE TORRENCE STOCKMAN

1889-1890

The fourth president of the Grand Chapter was Mrs. Nannie Torrence Stockman who served for one term.

Mrs. Stockman was born April 25, 1859, at Fremont, Iowa; a successful teacher; superintendent of schools of Keokuk County; editor of the "Keokuk County Teacher"; member of the State Reading Circle Board; married, March 12, 1890, to David T. Stockman; mother of four children; a Presbyterian; member of the Daughters of the American Revolution; passed away December 24, 1938.

Mrs. Stockman was initiated into P. E. O. in Chapter L, Sigourney, Iowa. She organized the first State Chapter, Nebraska; wrote the prayer which is used in opening chapter meetings; chose the ode used for years to close the P. E. O. meetings; was a member of the committee which established *The P. E. O. Record* in 1888.

MISS ORIAN PENDLETON

1890-1891

After serving for six terms as treasurer of Grand Chapter, Miss Orian Pendleton was elected fifth president of the Sisterhood.

She was born in Linneus, Missouri, August 24, 1859; moved to Moulton, Iowa, following the Civil War; educated in the Moulton schools; kept the home for three brothers and a sister; died August 2, 1894.

Miss Pendleton was initiated into P. E. O., in 1884, in Chapter F, Moulton, Iowa. Later she dimitted to Chapter D, Center-

ville, Iowa.

MRS. A. R. DEWEY 1891-1892

The sixth and last of the Grand Chapter presidents was Mrs.

Sarah Rousseau Dewey. She had also served as vice president.
Mrs. Dewey spent most of her life in Washington, Iowa; was married in 1873 to Judge A. R. Dewey; was the mother of two children; was a Methodist and devoted to the work of the church;

was a prominent club woman and civic leader; died March 25, 1922.

Mrs. Dewey joined P. E. O. in Chapter J, Washington, Iowa;
was twice a member of a constitutional revision committee; was chairman of the committee to prepare the 1903 published *History* of the P. E. O. Sisterhood, known as "The White History."

MRS. JESSIE MALLORY THAYER (O'NEIL) 1892-1893

With the change of name from Grand to Supreme Grand Chapter, Mrs. Jessie Mallory Thayer (O'Neil) was the first to be elected to the presidency under the new name.

She was born in Illinois; came to Iowa as an infant; married in 1914 to W. M. O'Neil of Orlando, Florida; died November 16, 1923. Mrs. O'Neil was initiated into Chapter N, Chariton, Iowa. During her administration as president of Supreme Grand

Chapter, the office of organizer was established; articles of incorporation taken out by the Sisterhood; Iowa Grand Chapter organized; the chapters relettered; the marguerite chosen as the P. E. O. flower.

She was a member of the committees authorized to write the burial ritual; revise the constitution; prepare the first printed constitution; and established P. E. O. headquarters in Chicago for the World's Columbian Exposition.

MRS. ALICE SELLERS SPILMAN

1895-1897

Mrs. Alice S. Spilman was elected to the presidency of Su-

preme Grand Chapter in 1895, in Omaha, Nebraska.

Mrs. Spilman was born in Topeka, Kansas, February 15, 1859; came to Albia, Iowa, at the age of one year; moved to Oskaloosa; taught in the City schools of Albia, Oskaloosa, Ottumwa: married to Dr. S. A. Spilman; the mother of one child; passed away May 13, 1946, in Ottumwa, Iowa.

Mrs. Spilman was initiated into P. E. O. as a charter member of Chapter G, Ottumwa, May 27, 1885; was the first president of Iowa Grand Chapter; is credited, in large measure, with the adjustment in the relations of State Chapters to Supreme Chapter.

MRS. FLORA CHESTER HERRING

1897-1899

After serving Iowa Grand Chapter as recording secretary and president, Mrs. Flora Chester Herring was elected the following year, 1897, to the office of president of Supreme Grand Chapter. She was born in Fairfield, Iowa; educated in those schools

and the State Normal School; taught for nine years; married Charles A. Herring; died February 1, 1950, in Fairfield.

Mrs. Herring was initiated into Chapter C, Fairfield, where

she retained her membership throughout her life.

Her administration as president of Supreme Grand Chapter will be remembered for bringing subordinate chapters into closer relation with the Sisterhood and by fostering organization in subordinate territory. She organized the first chapter in Colorado; was on committees for two constitutional revisions; helped to write the initiation ceremony adopted in 1907.

MRS. WALTER CAMPBELL

1899-1901

Mrs. Mollie Moreland Campbell succeeded Mrs. Herring both as president of Iowa Grand Chapter and as president of Supreme Grand Chapter.

She was born in Oskaloosa, Iowa; married to Walter Campbell; moved to Glendora, California, where she passed away October 7, 1932.

Mrs. Campbell was initiated into Chapter X, Oskaloosa, Iowa, February 22, 1892; served her chapter as president for four years; served her state as organizer and then as president for two years.

During her years as president of Supreme Grand Chapter, all forms, books and ceremonies for all chapters were unified—a tribute to her ability in organizational problems.

MRS. M. LUE WEBER

1903-1905

Following a term as vice president, Mrs. M. Lue Weber served

as president of Supreme Grand Chapter in 1903-1905.

She was born in Elmwood, Illinois; educated at Lenox College, Hopkinton, Iowa; married to H. G. Weber, at Atlantic, Iowa; passed away August 4, 1933.

Mrs. Weber was a charter member of Chapter AF, Atlantic, Iowa, June 6, 1892. She served Iowa Grand Chapter as organizer

and president.

She introduced a simpler form of entertainment for the conventions; was impartial and fair in all judgments; was chairman of the committee for the 1901-1902 revision of the Constitution; was a member of the committee to prepare the initiation ceremony adopted in 1907.

MRS. WINONA EVANS REEVES

1909-1911

Mrs. Winona Evans Reeves, the sixteenth president of Supreme Chapter was born at Big Mound, Iowa, August 14, 1871, daughter of Dr. James M. and Helen (Lusk) Evans.

She was graduated from Iowa Wesleyan College B.S. 1891;

M.S. 1896; L.H.D. 1942.

Married Harry J. Reeves December 23, 1897 (died October 27, 1945); children, Helen Lusk (Mrs. Robert S. Casey); Mrs. Agnes Reeves-Colville.

Mrs. Reeves was initiated into P. E. O. in Original A, the Founders' Chapter in 1889. During the time she attended Iowa

Wesleyan she was a member of College Chapter S. For tyentythree years she was a member of Chapter U, Keokuk, Iowa, now a member of Chapter A, Chicago. She served Iowa Grand Chapter as recording secretary, vice president and president; Supreme Chapter as organizer, vice president and president.

For two years was a member of the Cottey College Board of

Trustees.

Was author of the two volumes of The Story of P. E. O.

covering its history from 1869 to 1936.

She edited The P. E. O. Record from 1918 to 1949. Her activities, official and semi-official, from election as recording secretary of Iowa Grand Chapter, 1901, to her last year 1949 as editor of The P. E. O. Record, covered a span of 48 years.

MRS. EDITH PROUTY PRITCHARD

1913-1915

After serving Supreme Chapter as organizer and vice president, Mrs. Edith Prouty Pritchard became the president in 1913, serving for one biennium. She had previously served Iowa Grand Chapter in the same three offices. Mrs. Pritchard was the first chairman of the Board of Trustees for Cottey College.

Mrs. Pritchard was born in Freeport, Illinois, coming to

Iowa in infancy. She was educated in the Humboldt Schools; the State University of Iowa, B.S. 1890, L.L.B. 1891; practiced law and taught in the law school connected with Humboldt College.

She was married June 25, 1920, to Ira C. Pritchard. They moved to Kansas City, Missouri, where she became a member of Chapter DO. She passed away December 6, 1934.

Mrs. Pritchard was initiated into P. E. O. October 12, 1900,

as a charter member of the Humboldt Chapter, BV.

She was one of the first to advocate the expansion of P. E. O. into British Columbia.

MRS. HELEN DAWSON TOWNSEND

1919-1921

Mrs. Helen Dawson Townsend served P. E. O. in many offices

before becoming the president of Supreme Chapter in 1919.

She was born in Paxton, Illinois, January 17, 1866; educated in the public schools of Ann Arbor, Michigan, and in the University of Michigan. Married August 14, 1889 to Fred Townsend of Albia, Iowa; mother of five children; died November 15, 1942.

Mrs. Townsend was initiated into Chapter H, Albia.

She served Iowa State Chapter as corresponding secretary, vice president and president. She was chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Educational Fund for six years; treasurer of the Educational Fund two years; vice president and president of Su-

preme Chapter.

Mrs. Townsend opened the P. E. O. executive office in the Stevens Building, No. 17 State Street, Chicago; she appointed the first executive secretary. Three state chapters were organized during her administration; the first official jeweler was named. She presided as president of Supreme Chapter at the convention in Kansas City, in 1921.

MRS. OLA B. MILLER

1927-1929

Mrs. Ola Babcock Miller was the twenty-fifth president of

Supreme Chapter.

She was initiated into Chapter J, Washington, Iowa in 1888. She served her chapter in most of the offices: Iowa State Chapter as second vice president, recording secretary and president; the Supreme Chapter as recording secretary, organizer, vice president and president.

The great task of Mrs. Miller's administration as president of Supreme Chapter was to acquaint the Sisterhood with Cottey

College and present its possibilities as a P. E. O. project.

She made the dedicatory address for the Memorial Library.

Ola Babcock was married to Alex Miller; the mother of two daughters; died January 24, 1937.

Mrs. Miller was the Secretary of State in Iowa. As such she will be remembered for her work in highway safety.

MRS. LAURA STORMS KNAPP

1949-1951

Mrs. Laura Storms Knapp was the thirty-sixth president of

She was born in Hudson, Michigan; educated in the public schools of Detroit, Michigan; Madison, Wisconsin; Des Moines and Ames, Iowa, and the Iowa State College; married to Seaman A. Knapp; the mother of two sons; taught Home Economics at Kansas State College, Manhattan, Kansas.

Mrs. Knapp was initiated into P. E. O. in Chapter AA, Ames, Iowa. She served her chapter in several offices; her State Chapter as recording and corresponding secretaries, first and second vice







presidents and president; member of ritual revision committee (1939); served Supreme Chapter as corresponding and recording secretaries, organizer, second and first vice president before being elected to the presidency in 1949.

As organizer, Mrs. Knapp took P. E. O into Alaska; organized 13 chapters in subordinate territory; as first vice president, she organized the overseas aid and sponsored the international scholar-

ship program.

As president, Mrs. Knapp organized the inauguration of Blanche Hinman Dow as president of Cottey College; authorized and assisted the first seminar for state projects chairmen and state presidents on Cottey Campus; authorized procedure of plan for Cottey Chapel; Manitoba Provincial Chapter organized during her administration.

IOWA INITIATES REPRESENTING OTHER STATES IN THE SUPREME CHAPTER PRESIDENCY

Two other women have served as president of Supreme Chapter who were initiates of Iowa Chapters but represented other states in the office. They were: Veda McClement Jones (Mrs. W. F.), past president of Oregon, born in Burlington and initiated in Chapter BW, Algona; Carrie Bonebrake Simpson, (Mrs. H. E.), past president of North Dakota, born in Knoxville and initiated in Chapter M, Knoxville.

During the early years, many women who served but a limited time were elected to the executive boards. This gave a large number of Iowa women opportunity to have a part in the develop-

ment of the Sisterhood.

The second woman to be elected to the office of organizer was Mrs. Julia N. Robinson, Cedar Falls. This was the only office on the board held by her. She served two terms, 1897-99 1899-1901

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY AND FIRST VICE PRESIDENT

Mrs. Walter Irish, Des Moines, served as corresponding secretary 1903-05 and as first vice president 1905-07.

BOARDS OF TRUSTEES

Iowa women who have served as members of the Boards of Trustees:

1. The P. E. O. Record:

The Board of Trustees for The P. E. O. Record was set up in 1911. The first chairman was Mrs. Walter Irish, Des Moines, who served for two years, 1911-13. Others who served were: Mrs. Alice S. Miller, Cedar Rapids, 1913-19; Mrs. Lillian L. Griffith, Harlan, 1921-23.

2. Educational Fund:

Serving as members of the Board of Trustees of the Educational Fund were:

Mrs. Helen Dawson Townsend, Albia, first chairman of the board serving for six years, 1909-1915; Mrs. Stella Porter Kelly, Ottumwa, 1919; Mrs. Louise M. Henely, Grinnell, 1924-29, chairman, 1928-29.

3. Cottey College:

For four years prior to the appointment of the first Board of Trustees for Cottey College, the executive board of Supreme Chapter served in the capacity of a College Board of Trustees. Ola B. Miller, president of Supreme Chapter 1927-1929, served as the first chairman of this advisory board.

The College Board of Trustees was set up in 1932. the first four members were Iowans. They were: Mrs. Edith Prouty Pritchard, Humboldt, chairman, 1932-34; Mrs. Louise M. Henely, Grinnell, 1932-43, chairman, 1934-43; Mrs. Winona E. Reeves, 1934-36.

4. Supply Department:
Mrs. Lucy Beyer Engelbeck served on the Board of Trustees for the Supply Department from 1933-1937.

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Miss Ada Baysoar, Albia, was the first executive secretary. Miss Katherine Mann, executive secretary for many years, was a native of Iowa and initiated into P. E. O. in Chapter AQ, Brighton.

COMMITTEES: THE MEMORIAL LIBRARY

A. The Promotion Committee:

Mrs. Dell P. Glazier, Ft. Madison, was chairman of the com-

mittee of three appointed to promote the Memorial Library project.

B. The Finance Committee:

Mrs. Alice S. Miller, Cedar Rapids, was one of a committee of three appointed to secure funds for the building of the Library.
C. The Building Committee:

Miss Martha McClure, Mt. Pleasant, was chairman of the building committee for the Library for a few months. Upon her resignation, Mrs. Lucy Beyer Engelbeck was appointed as a third member of the committee.

THE COMMITTEE OF ONE

Mrs. Gertrude Campbell Sebern, Fort Dodge, served as the Committee of One for the Memorial Library for ten years.
Mrs. Gracia L. Linder, Mt. Pleasant, succeeded Mrs. Sebern

and is the member of the committee at the time of this publication.

This committee is responsible for the harmony and good taste of all that is placed in the rooms.

THE EDUCATIONAL FUND COMMITTEE

Prior to the appointment of the first Board of Trustees for the Educational Fund, a committee of three was appointed in 1907 to serve in this capacity for two years: Mrs. Mary McDonald Knapp, Ames, was one of this committee.

Mrs. Lulu McHenry, Des Moines, is credited with the suggestion that the money be lent from this "Memorial Fund". This fund was made up of the residue from the P. E. O. Day at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis.

Mrs. Laura Jordan, Ottumwa, designed this Memorial Tablet. Mrs. Annie D. Wilkins, Des Moines, was a member of the

constitutional revision committee of 1893.

Mrs. Maude Mirick Cooper, Boone, was one of the Supreme Chapter committee of two on local chapter treasurer books in 1939-1941.

THE MUSEUM COLLECTION COMMITTEE

Mrs. Gertrude C. Sebern and Mrs. Maude M. Cooper served on the Museum Collection committee of Supreme Chapter.

THE FRANC ROADS ELLIOTT MEMORIAL STONE COMMITTEE

The committee appointed to carry out the Supreme Chapter project to place a memorial stone in the Mt. Pleasant cemetery in memory of Franc Roads Elliott, included three Iowa women, viz:

OTHER NOTABLES IN IOWA P. E. O. HISTORY

Mrs. Lulu McHenry, Mrs. Carrie M. Ogilvie; Mrs. Sarah P. Clark, Mrs. Fannie Kurtz, all of Chapter Q, Des Moines, and Mrs. Daisy A. Green, Mrs. Hortense R. Reynolds, both of Chapter V, Des Moines, were signers of the Articles of Incorporation of the P. E. O. Sisterhood in 1893.

Mrs. Cornelia J. Sawyer designed the Pin of the small star encircled by marguerites for the past presidents of Iowa. P. P. I.

in black letters is enameled on the tiny star. Some of the other

states are using this emblem for their past presidents.

Mrs. Dell P. Glazier was commissioned by Supreme Chapter to check and correct the membership records of the P. E. O. Sisterhood. This was done in 1913.

Many Iowa women have left the State to pioneer in other places for the interests of our Sisterhood. They have served as presidents of many states and in many offices for Supreme Chapter.

9. The P.E.O. Record

ITS ESTABLISHMENT AND THE FOUR EDITORS

THE DECISION to establish a "Society paper" came in the sixth annual convention of the Grand Chapter held in Keosauqua, Iowa, October 17-20, 1888, Effie Hoffman Rogers, presiding.

At the opening meeting of the Grand Chapter convention held in 1884, Mary Berry Price (Johnson), president, presented a recommendation which read as follows, "I would greatly like to see

a little quarterly paper started."

Proceedings of every Grand Chapter convention for the next few years following Mrs. Price's suggestion in 1884 report further discussion concerning a P. E. O. paper; various plans were suggested and always there was the feeling that such a paper was indispensable.

In the 1888 convention held in Keosauqua, October 17-20, it was moved by the delegate from Chapter A that "we publish a monthly paper," then as an afterthought came the motion that "the necessary amount for establishing a paper be taken from the

Grand Chapter treasury."

MRS. EFFIE HOFFMAN ROGERS

A committee of three was elected to make arrangements for the paper; Mrs. Rogers as chairman, Miss Nannie Torrence and Mrs. Carrie Ogilvie were the committee. Instuctions were "that the paper was to be sent out by the beginning of the year." The local chapter corresponding secretaries were instructed to send magazine material suitable for printing to the Grand Chapter corresponding secretary. Mrs. Effie Hoffman Rogers was elected the first editor at a salary of \$40 a month. The subscription price payable in advance was 75 cents a year and the paper was to be called The P. E. O. Record.

Accordingly Volume I Number I of *The P. E. O. Record*, dated January, 1889, was published in Oskaloosa with Mrs. Rogers as Editor.

Mrs. Rogers was serving her second year as president of the Grand Chapter and since much of the responsibility of organization was hers also, she found these busy years. In 1889 she was asked to write about the establishment of the magazine and sent the

following to The Record:

"When I was elected president of the Grand Chapter at Washington, Iowa, there were 19 chapters. During my administration of three years the number increased to 42 chapters. The work of organizing chapters was then wholly the work of the Grand Chapter president. This, with the correspondence and routine work of the office, made the task one of herculean proportions." She was at the time County Superintendent of schools of Mahaska County.

The subscription list grew slowly. In 1889, Mrs. Rogers reported to the convention which was being held in Mt. Pleasant that there were 451 subscriptions. Since the cost of publishing each magazine was 63/4 cents, one can see that the cost exceeded the 75 cents subscription price and there was nothing left for the

editor's salary.

Mrs. Rogers also reported, "I have folded, stitched, covered and mailed 4,850 *Records*. In that work I have never had any assistance. In 10 months I have stitched 26,666 yards of stitchery. We should have a wider circulation. Some chapters do not take the magazine at all."

The plan that every local chapter was required to appoint a journalist, whose responsibility it was to send material to *The Record*, was not too satisfactory and so the procedure was dis-

continued.

The first issue of the magazine was sent to New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, District of Columbia, Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, Oregon, Texas, California, Arkansas and Montana. In the second issue, February, 1889, this note is found, "The January issue of 500 copies was entirely exhausted. Why isn't *The Record* going to be a success, can any one tell?"

Each successive convention battled with the problem of financing *The Record*. In 1890 due to a lack of money in the *Record* fund the editor's salary was reduced from \$40 a month to \$25. In 1891 the editor reported to convention that there were 575 paid subscriptions and there were 4,000 members in P. E. O. and 75

cents was still the subscription price.

Mrs. Rogers was editor for two years and in 1891 refused re-election because of her many other duties and obligations.

MISS MARY OSMOND

Miss Mary Osmond, Osceola, Iowa was not in the 1891 convention at Fairfield when elected Mrs. Rogers' successor as editor of *The Record* and when told of her election was "greatly sur-

prised."

She had been a very successful teacher, had served as Superintendent of schools for Clark County and then gone into editorial work. At the time of her election she had her own newspaper, the Osceola Weekly Gazette, and this was such exacting work that she hesitated to accept additional responsibility. But she assumed the double burden, setting the type for the magazine in the Gazette office.

In telling of her work Miss Osmond reported that no one but she had ever addressed or mailed *The Record*. It was while she was editor that the list of local chapters was carried on the "third cover page." This occupied less than three inches across the page.

Miss Osmond was a colorful individualist, very popular at conventions and throughout the Sisterhood. She was an ardent Suffragist and it is said that at least on one occasion she wrote on the check with which she paid her taxes, "Paid under protest,

Taxation without representation."

The readers were delighted with the magazine, but did not seem to be much concerned over the financial difficulties involved. The Record was not self-supporting yet every convention decided "it could not do without it" and annually re-elected the editor, also annually made up a financial deficit.

The subscription list did not reach 650 until 1892 which

was a high point up to that date.

In the Des Moines convention of 1892, it was recommended that the magazine be provided with an engraved cover plate, but this was not done until 1895 when a cover designed by Miss Jean Girton of Waterloo was used. This cost Supreme Grand Chapter \$13. It was in this same convention that the Grand Chapter was renamed the Supreme Grand Chapter.

During this period of reorganization and the formation of the first state chapters, the Society was fortunate to have an organ where the views of all could be published and discussions could be

carried on intelligently.

Miss Osmond served as editor-in-chief for the years 1891, 1892 and 1893.

MRS. SIDDIE RICHARDS

Mrs. Siddie Richards, Waterloo, Iowa, was elected editor in the convention of Supreme Grand Chapter which was held in Waterloo in 1893.

This convention was concerned with many serious problems, not the least being The P.E.O. Record. Mrs. Richards was elected editor with the following instructions: "To publish The Record 12 times a year, 16 pages, for 75 cents if 600 subscribers are guaranteed. The entire income from subscriptions, advertising and the payment for all State Grand Chapter and official announcements to belong to the individual assuming it, and no salary or responsibility to be assumed by the Supreme Grand Chapter." To Mrs. Richards goes much of the credit for the suggestions which were finally adopted for financing the magazine and which secured its continuance.

Reports made to the convention of Supreme Grand Chapter held at Omaha, October 16, 17, 18, 1895, Mrs. Alice C. Briggs of Nebraska, presiding, told of the failure to maintain the desired number of 600 subscribers and of the continued financial problems of *The Record*.

It was voted in this convention that the Supreme Grand Chapter should furnish the editor a complete list of all active members and these were to constitute the subscription list. The convention also created a Record fund of 25 cents annual per capita tax to cover the expense of The Record. This recommendation was filed by The Record committee of which Mrs. Alice Spilman was chairman. The Record was reduced to 12 pages and the expense this saved was to provide the editor's salary.

Although the magazine was still not self-supporting, the deficit was small and Supreme Grand Chapter took care of this.

MARY OSMOND RE-ELECTED

The membership did not like the reduced size and the Newton convention in 1897 voted to restore the magazine to 16 pages. At this convention Miss Osmond was again elected editor, Mrs. Richards having served for four years.

Beginning with the January, 1898, issue *The Record* was once more published in Osceola. At this time there were published 2,550 copies and the convention voted to raise this to 2,880 copies. In addition to the 25 cents annual per capita tax Supreme Grand Chapter paid \$44 a month for the publishing which included printing, folding, stapling and trimming, cost of paper and all material. The editor's salary was \$16 a month.

Reports made at the 1899 Supreme Grand Chapter convention in Chicago showed that 3500 copies were being printed monthly. A committee consisting of Mrs. Emma Pratt, Mrs. Alice Spilman, Mrs. Lulu McHenry and Mrs. Alberta Fox made recommendations which were adopted and which changed *The Record* mater-

ially. The magazine was to be seven by 10 inches, not less than 24 pages, to have a new cover plate and mailing galleys were to

take the place of the editor's pen to address the magazine.

In the 1901 Des Moines convention Miss Osmond was reelected editor. The new form was so popular that it was to be continued. This convention also ordered that the editor's expenses to state and to Supreme Grand Chapter conventions should be paid from the Supreme Grand Chapter treasury.

In 1903 every active member was receiving her copy and the

number being published was 5,000.

In 1911, Supreme Chapter convention was held in St. Louis, Missouri. Mrs. Winona E. Reeves as president, presented the following recommendations; "We recommend that The P. E. O. Record be placed under the special charge of a board of trustees composed of three P. E. O.'s appointed by the president, no two of whom shall be from the same state. That one of the trustees shall serve for six years, one for four years and one for two years. That the Supreme Chapter president shall select the chairman of the board whose expenses shall be paid to the Supreme Chapter convention where she shall make the report. We further recommend that to this board shall be entrusted the awarding of the contract with the printers of the magazine, instead of having the matter handled by a committee in the convention as has heretofore been done."

This recommendation was adopted and so was inaugurated the system of management which prevails in large part to this day.

The first board of trustees of The P. E. O. Record was Mrs. Walter Irish, Iowa; Miss Ida Johnson, Nebraska; Mrs. Mary D. Lawrence, Missouri. Mrs. Irish served as the chairman.

MRS. WINONA EVANS REEVES

Miss Osmond served as editor until 1913 when Mrs. Rogers was re-elected. Mrs. Rogers served until the time of her death in March, 1918. Miss Margaret Durward, president of Supreme Chapter, appointed Mrs. Winona Evans Reeves to fill the vacancy. Mrs. Reeves served as editor until 1949. She had been re-elected editor in 1947 with the explanation to the executive board that she would not again be a candidate.

Mrs. Reeves, an initiate of the founders' chapter in 1889, probably knows more P. E. O. history from actual experience and contacts, knows more P. E. O.'s than any other living member of the Sisterhood. P. E. O. is grateful for her continued active interest

and participation in Sisterhood affairs.

During her editorship of the magazine the membership of

P. E. O. increased to 100,808. She had been responsible for the prompt issuance of *The P. E. O. Record* every month, for the Directory number which made the thirteenth issue every year, and for the mailing list until the year 1947 when that department was taken over by The Wayside Press, publishers of *The P. E. O. Record*.

And during these 60 years, The Record has had but four editors: Mrs. Rogers and Miss Osmond, each of whom served twice

at different times, Mrs. Richards and Mrs. Reeves.

As the membership of the Sisterhood grew and the income in the *Record* fund increased it was possible to issue a larger magazine. In 1924 it carried 16 pages. Gradually it was increased from 24 to 28 pages and in 1934 it was increased to its present size, 32 pages.

During the years, the cover has been changed, also the format. Since 1931 there has been a monthly change in the cover design.

In an effort to make *The P. E. O. Record* self-supporting, the 1947 convention of Supreme Chapter held in Los Angeles, California, Mrs. Dorothy Weller presiding, accepted a budget allocating 60 cents to the *Record* fund. The 1949 convention of Supreme Chapter meeting in Chicago, Illinois, Mrs. Bessie R. Raney presiding, approved a budget allocating 85c to this fund.

In 1947 the law was passed making the office of editor ap-

pointive rather than elective.

The 1949 Supreme Chapter convention also adopted a constitutional provision which made the members of the subordinate boards convention members. Previous to this time only the chair-

men due to their positions were members of convention.

At the convention held in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in 1951, over which Mrs. Laura Storms Knapp presided, the provision which made the editor a member of convention by virture of that office, was deleted from the constitution. This convention also authorized the appointment of an associate editor. Miss Elsie Irene Shoemaker, Oklahoma, had been appointed to this office in 1949 by action of the executive board.

The by-laws were amended in 1951 to provide that convention expenses of both the editor and the associate editor should be paid.

MRS. EDITH MARKHAM WALLACE

Mrs. Edith Markham Wallace, Washington, and Miss Elsie Irene Shoemaker, Oklahoma, were appointed editor and associate

editor in September, 1949, were re-appointed in 1951.

The P. E. O. Record is a remarkable achievement, growing from the need of our first chapters and officers for a means of communication until today it is delivered to each of the 108,186 active members in the Sisterhood. But the 1951 subscription is larger than that for many who are not members of P. E. O. are on this list. Instead of the 17 states where the copies of the first issue were sent, now our magazine goes not only into every state, but into all the provinces of Canada, Hawaii and Alaska, and to quote from the report of the editor to the 1951 convention of Supreme Chapter, it is sent also to many far away places as Iran, Lebanon, Cairo, Transvaal, India, Arabia, Tokyo, England, France, Germany, Czechoslovakia, Turkey, Netherlands, Belgium, Spain, Peru, Brazil, Chile, Argentine, West Indes, Islands of the Pacific and many other countries. "The Record is the tie that binds P. E. O. around the world."

MINIATURES OF THE EDITORS

In the Memorial Library are four beautiful miniatures painted on ivory by Mrs. Valeria Taussig Leon of New York City. These are of the four Iowa *P. E. O. Record* editors, Mrs. Effie Hoffman Rogers, Miss Mary Osmond, Mrs. Siddie Richards Thummel and Mrs. Winona Evans Reeves.

Mrs. Thummel's miniature was the first. She had moved to New York and the New York State Chapter convention meeting in New York City in 1932 authorized this memorial to one whom they had come to love and appreciate. The committee in charge, Mrs. Lucille Shields and Mrs. Harriet Cartwright, asked Mrs. Leon to paint the miniature.

The artist, Mrs. Leon, was present at the unveiling of Mrs. Thummel's miniature. To quote from the minutes of the 1932 New York State proceedings: "A beautiful tribute by Mrs. Reeves was read, citing Mrs. Thummel's many P. E. O. achievements, her beauty of character and intellectual attainments. . . . Mrs. Thummel sat in the midst of her own Chapter K, holding a huge bouquet of roses, the gift of her son."

Mrs. Thummel's miniature was so delightful that Iowa decided to place in the Library a similar portrait of Mrs. Reeves.

The 1935 convention held in Des Moines, Mrs. Belle Besser, presiding, authorized the appointment of a committee of three to make the necessary arrangements. Mrs. Laura Storms Knapp, Mrs. DeElda Lee and Mrs. Frances Carrell were appointed to serve as the miniature committee.

Mrs. Knapp as chairman reported in the 1936 convention that the committee investigated several artists to paint the miniature of Mrs. Reeves and finally selected Mrs. Leon who had painted the one of Mrs. Thummel. Mrs. Lee who had charge of the finances of the committee reported that the Iowa Chapters had been so enthusiastic about the miniature that a balance of almost \$100 was left in the fund.

Sufficient funds were added to this balance by convention to complete a tuitional scholarship of \$150 at Cottey to be known as the Winona Evans Reeves scholarship.

In presenting the miniature, which was a feature of the eve-

ning program, Mrs. Knapp said in part,

"Mrs. Frisbee, to you, as chairman of the committee in charge of gifts for the Memorial Library, we are happy to present, for the Iowa State Chapter of P. E. O., this miniature of Winona Evans Reeves as a token of our love for her."

Mrs. Frisbee in accepting the gift said, "In behalf of the Memorial Library and the P. E. O. Sisterhood please be assured of our grateful thanks. It gives me very great pleasure to accept this love-gift from the Iowa State Chapter, in honor of the editor of The P. E. O. Record—Winona Evans Reeves."

In the 1938 Iowa State convention held in Sioux City, Mrs. Ada J. Klinger, presiding, it was ordered on recommendation of Mrs. Cornelia J. Sawyer that the State Chapter purchase miniatures of Mrs. Effic Hoffman Rogers and Miss Osmond for the Memorial Library. With the approval of the finance committee the motion was adopted with the additional provision that Mrs. Laura Storms Knapp be appointed to make the arrangements.

During the year the commission was completed and the presentation made at the following convention held in Cedar Rapids,

May 16, 17, 18 over which Mrs. Maude Cooper presided.

In presenting the miniatures Mrs. Knapp said in part, "With the completion of the commission which the last state convention gave to us, we will have in the Library miniatures of the four women who have been editors of The P. E. O. Record. All four have been Iowa women.

"Effie Hoffman Rogers, a member of X, Oskaloosa, was editor

from 1888 to 1891 and again from 1914 to 1918.

"Mary Osmond, a member of K, Osceola, was editor from 1891 to 1893 and from 1897 to 1914.

"Siddie Thummel of Z, Waterloo, was editor from 1893 to 1897.

"Winona Reeves has been editor since 1918.

"The same artist has painted all four miniatures, Valeria

Taussig Leon, of New York City.

"Miniatures painted on ivory—even the words have romance and charm. With these gifts we delight to honor our *Record* editors."

The presentation program closed by convention repeating The

P. E. O. Creed written by Mrs. Effie Hoffman Rogers.

10. P.E.O. Philanthropies

"What Do We Live For,
If Not to Make Life Less Difficult for Others"
—George Eliot

THE WELFARE AND TRUST FUND

S INCE Iowa was the birth state of P. E. O., it was logical that the Iowa State Chapter should be one of the first to take definite action to provide for the care of her own. Two major projects resulted from the thought and planning. These were the Welfare and Trust Fund and the Sarah Porter Beckwith Home. They are often called, "twin projects" since they were established within a relatively brief space of time, (since it was a little over a year) however, the first one to be officially created was the Welfare and Trust Fund.

This fund was the result of many years of wishful thinking. It came to fruition in 1928, in the convention of Iowa State Chapter in Davenport. It was here that the Iowa finance committee for the Memorial Library reported the \$25,000 pledge was over subscribed by \$933.75. The committee composed of Mrs. Cornelia J. Sawyer, DH, Mrs. Alice S. Miller, DK, Mrs. Mabel Duree, D, Mrs. Mary Call, BW, Mrs. Lillian Griffith, AP, recommended that a portrait of Mary Allen Stafford be purchased to hang in the library and that the residue of the surplus from the Library Fund be used as a nucleus for a Welfare and Trust Fund for the needy P. E. O.'s of Iowa.

These recommendations were unanimously adopted. One thousand dollars was added to the fund by vote of the State Chapter.

By authority of this body, the president of Iowa State Chapter, Ellen Sampson White, appointed the following Board of Trustees to formulate rules for the management of the newly-created

fund; Mrs. Lou C. McHenry, Des Moines, chairman, Mrs. Sawyer,

Sioux City, and Miss Lillian F. Kilburn, Oskaloosa.

This board drafted rules establishing, governing and administering the fund and presented them to the 1929 convention in Newton. Upon Mrs. McHenry's motion the following rules for the management of the Welfare and Trust Fund were adopted:

(From 1929 Minutes of convention of Iowa State Chapter)

- Sec. I. Iowa State Chapter shall create and maintain an Iowa P. E. O. Welfare and Trust Fund. The principal and interest of said fund shall be available for the aid and care of all members of the Iowa P. E. O. Sisterhood who are in need of help.
- Sec. II. This fund shall be maintained by voluntary gifts, and by the diversion annually of five per cent of the State dues, this amount to be paid annually on April 1st by the treasurer of Iowa State Chapter to the secretary-treasurer of the Welfare and Trust Fund. The gifts shall be sent to the treasurer of Iowa State Chapter and shall be paid by her to the secretary-treasurer of the Welfare and Trust Fund on the first of each month.
- Sec. III. This fund shall be administered by a board of trustees, consisting of a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary-treasurer, these to be appointed by the retiring president of the Iowa State Chapter. The first board shall hold office for two, three and four years respectively, and at the end of two years the vice-chairman shall become chairman, the secretary-treasurer shall become vice-chairman and the new member appointed by the retiring president shall be the secretary-treasurer. Thereafter the term of office shall be for three years, one member retiring annually.
- Sec. IV. Applications for aid shall be made to the chairman of the fund through recommendations from local chapters, after they have made thorough and conscientious investigation. An Iowa non-resident P. E. O. may apply for aid to a local chapter and such application shall be sent to the chairman of the board, who, in turn, shall refer it to the chapter to which the applicant belongs for their investigation and recommendation.
- Sec. V. All necessary expenses incurred by the board in the administering of the fund shall be paid from the Iowa State Chapter treasury.
- Sec. VI. A printed copy of the rules in regard to this fund shall be sent to each chapter president by April 1st of each year.

Sec. VII. A bond shall be furnished by the secretary-treasurer, such bond to be approved by the president of Iowa State Chapter.

Sec. VIII. The books of the secretary-treasurer shall be audited annually by an accredited accountant appointed by the president of Iowa State Chapter.

Committee. Lou C. McHenry, Cornelia J. Sawyer, Lillian F. Kilburn.

So enthusiastic over their project were the members of the convention that not only did the State Chapter add a second \$1,000 to the fund but there were many gifts made by individuals and chapters. By the end of this session \$3,207.33 was in the newly-created fund. With the hope that this amount would grow to much larger proportions during the year, the decision was made that aid would not be available from it until after the 1930 convention of Iowa State Chapter.

At the close of this convention, Mrs. Lucy B. Engelbeck, Des Moines, was appointed to this committee upon the resignation

of Miss Kilburn.

How well the rules for management of the Welfare and Trust Fund, as drafted by the original board, have stood the test of years is a tribute to the careful thought of those three women. The two major changes have had to do with eligibility for aid and the per cent of the per capita dues paid into the fund by Iowa State Chapter. Originally, the rules provided that any deserving member of Iowa was eligible for assistance. The years and experience made it necessary to limit this first to active members and, then, to active resident members. Whereas five per cent of the annual dues was diverted to the fund originally, the amounts have been changed to six cents and then to eleven cents per capita of the state dues to meet the ever-increasing needs.

While the fund has never reached large proportions, statistics show it is a well-organized, financially sound business. Statistics also show a total of 81 sisters have found help through the years 1930-1951. It is a project which has always been dear to the hearts of the chapters of Iowa. They have been liberal in their gifts which have averaged \$1,225 annually over the 1930-51 period. This has greatly augmented the annual per capita amount from the state dues and made it possible to more nearly meet the re-

quests for aid.

The board of trustees consisting of Mrs. Sawyer, Mrs. McHenry, and Mrs. Engelbeck served continuously through 1942.

Mrs. McHenry, because of other duties, resigned as chairman. Mrs. Sawyer was elected to that position and served in that capacity until 1943. Mrs. Nell Romey, Mason City, was appointed in 1931 and served until her death.

Mrs. Mabel Duree, Centerville, came to the board in 1940. She was chairman for five of the nine years she was on the board.

Mrs. Belle Besser, Newton, became a member of the board in 1942 and served as vice-chairman from 1943 until the close of her second appointment in 1948.

Mrs. Gail Page, Ottumwa, was appointed in 1942 to fill the vacancy of Mrs. Sawyer. Her service continued until 1950, the

last two years of which she was secretary-treasurer.

Mrs. Beatrice L. Thomas, Cedar Rapids, was appointed in

1948 and served as chairman part of the year 1948-1949.

In 1949, a change was made to separate the management of the two philanthropies. A new board was created for the Welfare and Trust Fund with the following personnel: Mrs. Elizabeth Young, Waterloo, three year term; Mrs. De Elda Lee, Davenport,

two year term; Mrs. Mabel Duree, one year term.
In 1950, Mrs. Pearl N. Eby, Cedar Rapids, succeeded Mrs.
Duree but resigned in February 1951. Mrs. Jane E. Stinson,

Mason City, was appointed to fill the unexpired term.

The present board (1952) consists of Mrs. Young, chairman, who has served in this capacity since the appointment of the new board; Mrs. Lee, who served two years as secretary-treasurer, is vice-chairman; Mrs. Stinson, secretary-treasurer.

THE SARAH PORTER BECKWITH HOME

The other of the twin projects, the Sarah Porter Beckwith

Home for the P. E. O.'s of Iowa, was born in 1929.

"Whatever else P. E. O.'s believe," according to the 1930 March Record, "they must believe that dreams do come true, that visions do come to realization." In proof of this, it is interesting to know that a P. E. O. home was suggested to the Iowa Grand Chapter convention held in Ottumwa in 1895 by Chapter V, Des Moines. The suggestion came in the form of a letter signed by Annie L. D. Wilkins, president, Flora Wright, Ella Goodsell and Mrs. H. R. Revnolds. While no formal action was taken at this time, the vision of a P. E. O. Home at a future time had been created.

The "future time" came 33 years later.

Before presenting the rules for management of the Welfare and Trust Fund to the 1929 convention of Iowa State Chapter, Lou C. McHenry took the opportunity to say that a real honor had been conferred upon the committee in this great work. To

the trustees had come a vision—a vision of a P. E. O. Home, a P. E. O. Fireside in Iowa. It was their hope to see the Welfare and Trust Fund grow until it became sufficient to buy and maintain a home.

Later, in this convention, Mrs. Mary W. Begeman, Cedar Falls, moved that a \$2 per capita tax be paid during the next two

years toward the purchase of a P. E. O. home in Iowa.

Mrs. Nancy Torrence Stockman moved that this action be amended to read that the question be referred to the chapters for instruction, to be acted upon at the next convention (1930). The motion carried as amended.

During the summer of 1929, Sarah Porter Beckwith offered the gift of her beautiful residence in Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, to the

Iowa State Chapter as a P. E. O. Home.

Mrs. Beckwith was making her home in La Jolla, California, at this time, returning each year for a short period during the summer. While she hired a caretaker for the Mt. Pleasant home, she wished to dispose of it but had not yet found a possible purchaser to whom she wished to sell. Her niece, Martha McClure, Mt. Pleasant, suggested to her the possibility that the P. E. O.'s of Iowa might be interested in it since they were hoping to establish a home in Iowa. Mrs. Beckwith's reply was, "I will give it to the P. E. O.'s-I would like to know that my old home was a real home once more; giving shelter and happiness to the ones living in it."

Mrs. Beckwith gave the twenty-room house, all of the furniture in it which was hers, three acres of ground beautifully landscaped, and another lot which did not adjoin the home property. She made but one condition, that if the gift were accepted, the work of restoration should begin within the year. She paid for painting the exterior of the house as well as the taxes and insur-

ance for the current year.

The president of Iowa State Chapter, Mrs. Nell Romey, and the Board of Tustees of the Welfare and Trust Fund, to which the offer was made, went to Mt. Pleasant to confer with Mrs. Beckwith and to inspect the property. They were delighted with it and with its possibilities for use as a home.

Mrs. Romey then asked approval of the Iowa chapters to locate the Home in Mt. Pleasant. Since there was now no need for the \$2 per capita to purchase a home, she asked for \$1 per

capita to be used in repairs.

The chapters were enthusiastic in their favorable vote on both. The second dollar was voted for maintenance in the 1930 convention.

On September 24, 1929. the Board of Trustees and Mrs. Romey met in Mt. Pleasant with Miss McClure who held the deed to the home in trust for her aunt until it could be legally accepted by Iowa State Chapter.

Miss McClure approved all that had been done by Mrs. Romey and the trustees. She then presented the deed to the president of Iowa State Chapter who filed it with the recorder of Henry County.

The dream of 33 years had come true.

Mrs. Romey appointed Mrs. McHenry, Mrs. Sawyer, and Mrs. Engelbeck, trustees of the Welfare and Trust Fund, to serve in the same capacity for the Home. They formulated rules governing the Home, admission to it, and the application blanks to be sent to those who desired to be members. These rules were presented to the executive board of the State Chapter and were approved by them. They were then printed and sent to the president of every chapter in Iowa.

As was true with the rules of the Welfare and Trust Fund, so these original rules for the Home have had very few changes,

and those minor ones—during the years 1930-1951.

When the 1930 convention was held in Keokuk in May, Mrs. McHenry reported, "Today, we come to you in this convention, our \$3,207.33 for the Welfare and Trust Fund intact, our home realized, our dreams come true, and we present to you, for your approval, 'Our Home'."

The first guest to arrive was Mrs. Ida May Hall, Chapter DN, who came on April 22, 1930. By the end of May, there were five in the home, Mrs. Nelle Bosworth, AA; Mrs. Alice Cassidy, Q; Mary May Porter, H; and Miss Margaret Gay Dolliver, Original A. The last guest to enter the Home (1952) was the fifty-fifth.

The work of reconditioning the lovely home began at once. "To this board of trustees," wrote Mrs. McHenry, "was given the beginning of the most beautiful work the Iowa P. E. O.'s have ever done." They realized the responsibility of their task for not only was Iowa watching, but Supreme Chapter and many of the other states who were considering a similar project.

A liaison committee, from Chapter Original A, was appointed to facilitate the work of the trustees. Miss Martha McClure, Mrs. Victorine Evans Cook and Mrs. Ella Mackin made up this com-

mittee. They gave devoted service for many years.

To Iowa P. E. O.'s there could have been no more perfect location for a home than in Mt. Pleasant. It is the P. E. O. center, the beautiful and restful place where the Sisterhood was born and the site of the Memorial Library.

Likewise, the atmosphere and the background of the Beck-

with home is representative of the finest traditions of Mt. Pleasant

history.

Mrs. Beckwith was the daughter of Colonel Asbury Porter and Martha Brazelton Porter. She attended the Young Ladies Seminary in Mt. Pleasant. She was a student and enthusiastic traveller, and the author of "A Rambler Abroad". In 1881, she married Captain Warren Beckwith. Three children were born to them, Emily Beckwith Garner, Florence Beckwith, who died in early life, and Warren Jr. The son married Jessie Lincoln, daughter of Robert Todd Lincoln and granddaughter of Abraham Lincoln.

Mrs. Beckwith's sister, Mrs. Jennie Porter Bean, was one of the early P. E. O.'s in Chapter Original A; her daughters, her nieces, Miss McClure, and Mrs. May McClure Kelley of Washington, D.C., and other members of her family were initiated into the

Sisterhood which she had known since its organization.

"She was a gracious, charming woman, well-born and associated all her life with people of culture. She gave bountifully of her interests, time and money. She lived most of her life in Mt. Pleasant where she was loved and honored. Death came to her in La Jolla, California, December 17, 1935, at the age of 90."

As authorized by the State Chapter in convention, Articles of Incorporation of the Sarah Porter Beckwith Home were drawn up and executed in May, 1931, by the committee, Mary Whitworth Begeman, Gertrude Campbell Sebern, Lucy B. Engelbeck, Lou C.

McHenry.

In the beginning the Home was financed by gifts and the per capita tax voted by the Iowa State Chapter. Since 1933, it has

been allotted fifty cents per capita of the State dues.

Chapter gifts have been generous since the Home became a reality. They have averaged \$2,225.00 annually over the 22 year period (1930-1952). At Thanksgiving and Christmas time, there

are generous seasonal gifts to help the holiday cheer.

Many exquisite furnishings beautify the Home. They are the gifts of chapters and individuals. Iowa State Chapter gave the portraits of Mrs. McHenry, Mrs. Sawyer and Mrs. Engelbeck in recognition of their years of devoted service as trustees of the twin projects.

There have been many bequests to the Home. These have included furnishings, real estate and monies. The latter has ranged in value from small amounts to the larger ones in the thousands

of dollars.

All gifts and bequests are placed in the general fund of the Sarah Porter Beckwith Home unless otherwise specified. Whatever amount that can be spared is then put into United States Government bonds.

Limitations have been placed on many of these bequests which have made it necessary to create different accounts in the financial set-up. These include a Savings Account, Endowment Fund and a Building Fund.

SAVINGS ACCOUNT

A gift of \$6,000 specified that it be placed in a savings account, the interest accumulated annually could be used for general expenses.

ENDOWMENT FUND

In 1931, \$1,000 was given as a nucleus for an endowment fund. At the suggestion of T.Q. Records of Glenwood, in 1937, and with the approval of the executive board of Iowa State Chapter, the B. I. L.'s of Iowa were asked for voluntary gifts to this fund. This netted nearly \$1,000. Other gifts added to this now total \$6,105 in endowment fund (1952).

BUILDING FUND

In 1940, an effort was made to encourage the chapters to pledge 25 cents per capita for two years toward a building fund for the Home. This yielded a fair amount. However, several large bequests to be used for the purpose of building or for additions to the Home have made this a fund of sizeable proportions. Because of it, many improvements have been made possible. There is still a residue of approximately \$50,000 in this account (1952).

BUILDINGS AND ADDITIONS

In 1933, a wing of nine rooms was added with extra baths and a first floor lounge which connected the addition to the original home. The furnishings of this lounge were also a gift. A second floor sunroom above this has been added; a new garage replaced the old building which was delapidated and gradually disintegrating.

The latest building project is the addition of a new wing for a kitchen and infirmary (1950). These two rooms are commodious and complete with the best and most modern equipment. This was made possible by a bequest which specified it must be used for an addition to the Home. This addition made it necessary to do much

remodeling.

The Home as it now stands (1952), will accommodate 17 guests, each with her own room, a hostess and a trained nurse. In addition, the staff includes a cook, two maids and a janitor whose living quarters are outside the Home.

Skillful treatment, combining the new with the old, has created a homelike atmosphere of diginity and charm. This is heightened by the beauty of the characters of those who live within its walls.

BOARDS OF DIRECTORS

Originally, three past presidents of Iowa State Chapter were appointed to serve terms of three years. The first board, Mrs. McHenry, Mrs. Sawyer, Mrs. Engelbeck, were reappointed for many years. They served from 1929-1943 with Mrs. McHenry acting as chairman from 1929-1932, Mrs. Sawyer as chairman from 1932-1943 and Mrs. Engelbeck as treasurer for 19 years, from 1929 until 1948. Mrs. Engelbeck is still serving as a member of the board at time of publication. Mrs. Nell Romey served on this board from 1931 until her death three years later. Mrs. Duree served from 1940-1949, as chairman 1943-1948.

The by-laws now provide for the appointment of four directors who may serve only two consecutive terms of four years. The boards for the twin projects were the same until 1949 when they

were placed under separate management.

Other past presidents of Iowa State Chapter who have served

on the Home Board are:

Mrs. Besser (1942-1948), as vice-chairman for five years; Mrs. Page (1943-1950), as secretary-treasurer for two years; Mrs. Thomas appointed in 1948, serving as chairman since the fall board meeting of that year, was reappointed in 1951; Mrs. Loretta H. Jones, Clinton, appointed 1949; Mrs. Maude M. Cooper, Boone appointed 1950.

The present board (1952) consists of Mrs. Thomas, chairman, Mrs. Jones, vice-chairman, Mrs. Cooper, secretary-treasurer, and

Mrs. Engelbeck.

While the Home is governed by a board of directors, it is at all times under the jurisdiction of the Iowa State Chapter.

HOSTESSES

To the hostess of the Home goes much of the credit for the atmosphere of congeniality, cooperation, and spirit of friendliness which is apparent there. She manages the household and is directly responsible to the board of directors. Only the finest type of women have served in this capacity. All have been members of our Sisterhood.

Mrs. Dora Johnson was our first hostess, serving for 12 years. (1930-1942).

Mrs. Florence Mack was there from 1942 until 1949.

Mrs. Jessie Hyland acted as hostess for eight months until the position could be filled by Mrs. Delia Diether, who is the present beloved hostess (1952).

When they come to visit the Memory Room and the Memorial

Library, many P. E. O.'s from other states visit the Home.

The Home is the scene also of many happy occasions when chapters from other cities come to share their meetings with the Home guests, bringing food, interest, joy of companionship and taking with them the happiness and inspiration from the contacts made and from the atmosphere of the Home. They, also, take with them many articles of the handicraft of the guests. The deep freeze unit, installed a few years ago, was the gift to the Home from the guests who had raised the funds from the sale of their needlework, knitting and weaving.

Throughout the years, Chapter Original A, has been of incalculable value to the Iowa State Chapter in the service it has

given to the Home Boards, the hostesses and guests.

Miss Florence Budde, Mrs. Luella Fleenor and Mrs. Florence McLeran constitute the present advisory committee from Chapter Original A for the Home. These women have given devoted service. They followed the original liaison committee.

The annual Christmas party held at the Home, with Chapter

Original A, as hostess, is a festive occasion.

Mt. Pleasant, its citizens, churches, business places take a real and prideful interest in this Home of ours and are most cordial

to it and its family.

To the chapters, individually and collectively, goes the credit for the establishment and maintenance of our Home. To a few was given that further vision necessary for us to care for our own. It was definitely a pioneering adventure for the Iowa State Chapter. The result of this pioneering adventure is Iowa's P. E. O. Home where comfort, companionship and congeniality may be found in a very generous measure.

"The test of an adventure is not only in the length of time it

endures but in the way in which it endures."

Speaking before the Iowa State Chapter in 1931, Mrs. Sawyer said, "Two years ago we tossed a ball into a big yard in Mt. Pleasant; a ball that seemed golden and shining with love and hope. Today, as it comes rolling back to us, we see that it was not a ball, after all, but our hearts that we had tossed."

Dreams do come true. What was only a dream of misty outlines in 1895 has become a reality, shining clear and strong in this substantial edifice, of which Iowa State Chapter is justifiably

proud, our Sarah Porter Beckwith Home.

SUPREME CHAPTER PROJECTS

Iowa State Chapter has always supported the Supreme Chapter in furthering greater service for humanity.

EDUCATIONAL FUND

A vision of a better education for girls was realized in the establishing of the Educational Fund. Almost from the beginning the Educational Fund was administered by a committee of three women appointed by the president of Supreme Chapter.

Mrs. Mary McDonald Knapp, Ames, president of Iowa Grand Chapter in 1902-3, was a member of this first committee which

served for two years.

In 1909, the administering committee was called a board of trustees. Mrs. Helen D. Townsend, president of Iowa Grand Chapter, 1907-8, was the first chairman of this board. She was much in the foreground in the early days of the fund and served as chairman of this board for six years (1909-1915). She was also treasurer of the Educational Fund for two years during the two terms that office existed, (1915-1919).

that office existed, (1915-1919).

Mrs. Louise M. Henely, Grinnell, president of Iowa Grand Chapter 1917-18, served on this board for six years (1924-29), chairman of board (1928-1929). She created much enthusiasm for this fund and its use by her untiring efforts—as a resident of a college community and wife of the superintendent of schools, she had a background which gave her keen awareness of the value of

education.

The first loan from the fund was granted to an Iowa girl, Miss Edna Pickering, Boone, a charter member of Chapter DD.

The total number of Iowa girls granted loans, including 40

sponsored in other states, as of 11-1951 is 1,692.

The total amount represented by loans granted to Iowa girls,

as of November 19, 1951, is \$726,027.

The amount contributed to the Educational Fund, including bequests and special gifts from Iowa, from 1909 until March 1, 1951, is \$128,213.33.

COTTEY COLLEGE

Iowa has had a very special privilege in supporting Cottey College. Among the gifts presented to our Welfare and Trust Fund was one of \$50 given in the 1929 convention, by Virginia Cottey Stockard, in the name of Cottey College. Mrs. Stockard was a guest of the convention and gave an address about the school. Iowa has endeavored to repay this debt of gratitude as well as to

show her vital interest in this project by her splendid support of the College.

Mrs. Louise M. Henely, a member of the first Cottey College Board and its chairman for several years, worked unceasingly to gain support, both moral and financial, for this project. She traveled throughout the United States talking and working for the College interests. Too much credit cannot be given to her for the enthusiasm she created and the financial support she gained. She had an intimate knowledge of the modern girl and her needs in securing a higher education which helped her "sell" the college to girls, parents and P. E. O.'s alike.

In 1936, along with all P. E. O. chapters, Iowa set out upon the 10 year period to build up the college and hoped for \$1 per capita active member, annually. In 1938, at the request of Mrs. Chellie Stevens Wright, president of Supreme Chapter, a state chairman was appointed to the Cottey Emergency Committee. Under the leadership of Mrs. De Elda W. Lee, Davenport, Iowa did well in attaining the necessary goal. The interest in Cottey was greatly stimulated. More girls from Iowa enrolled at the College

and the number of tuitional scholarships increased.

Iowa State Chapter has given a total of 45 of these scholarships. These include three which were the gifts of Laura Storms Knapp and one from Chapter P, Burlington, to honor May A. Frantz. In 1951, Iowa State Chapter granted ten \$200 scholarships for Cottey College to be known as the Laura Storms Knapp scholarships. One of these will be awarded each year for 10 years beginning in 1952. Only girls of the finest type and of the highest scholastic ability are awarded these scholarships granted by the State Chapter.

A total of 116 girls from Iowa have attended Cottey College. In 1939, \$1,000 was given by Iowa State Chapter for the Iowa suite in P. E. O. Hall which was named the Louise M. Henely suite. In 1949, \$2,500 was given in honor of Winona Evans Reeves

to furnish the reception room of Reeves Hall.

The B. I. L.'s contributed generously to the East Hill recreation park. They can be depended upon to do their share with the

proposed (1952) chapel.

Up to the time, when the \$1 per capita for Cottey became obligatory, Iowa had contributed to the College an average of \$7,510 annually over the 1929-1948 period, in gifts from the local chapters and from Iowa State Chapter.

Iowa State Chapter is ever ready to share in the responsibility which must be assumed in order that the present high standards of Cottev College may be maintained.

THE MEMORIAL LIBRARY

In 1912, Miss Martha McClure, Chapter Original A, Mt. Pleasant, made the suggestion that a Memorial be built to honor the birthplace of P. E. O. "Nothing could be more appropriate to the ideals of the Sisterhood", she said, "than a memorial library."

Mrs. Dell Glazier, BS, Ft. Madison, brought out the idea of

the building to be used as a library for the Iowa Wesleyan College

and also house the executive offices of P. E. O.

She formally presented the proposition for the erection of the library to three Supreme Chapter conventions, first in 1921 in Kansas City, in Seattle in 1923, and in Minneapolis in 1925 where the proposition carried unanimously.

Mrs. Glazier was chairman of the promotion committee. Mrs. Alice S. Miller was a member of the finance committee, and Miss McClure and Mrs. Lucy B. Engelbeck were members of the build-

ing committee.

WAR EFFORT. POST-WAR WORK AND PEACE PARTICIPATION

An effort was started in 1942 and later set up by the executive board of Supreme Chapter to meet the demand of state and local chapters for a specific contribution which could be made in war The cooperation of Iowa P. E. O.'s in this program is noteworthy as shown by the reports made to the subsequent State and Supreme Chapter conventions.

War effort chairmen during 1943-1945 were Mrs. Gail Page, Mrs. Elizabeth Young, Mrs. Katherine Hughes and Mrs. Beatrice Thomas. Ninety-seven percent of the Iowa Chapters bought war bonds and stamps. All gave an incalculable number of hours of service to Red Cross and Allied Agencies, United Service Organiza-

tions, and Civilian Defense.

Chairmen of Post-War Work from 1946-1952 have been Mrs. Sara Smythe, Mrs. Lillian Berkley, Mrs. Luella Fatland and Mrs. Hazel Bleeker. Their reports of gifts to the United Victory Fund (approximately \$7,000), overseas families adopted, CARE and other packages sent abroad make an impressive total.

Under the leadership of the State Projects chairman, Iowa is interested in the Peace Participation effort. Local chapters

have appointed leaders for this work.

In her 1949 Post-War Work report to Supreme Chapter convention, Laura Storms Knapp spoke of the active interest shown in the possibility of P. E. O. granting international scholarships. She suggested that the consideration of students be under the supervision of the Peace Participation committee. This was the beginning of P. E. O. active interest in this field. Iowa has contributed generously to this fund and has an increasing awareness of its possibilities.

Two girls are attending school in Iowa on a partial P. E. O. International scholarship. They are: Miss Huda Saba, Palestine, Arabia, at Drake University, Des Moines, (1951-1952); Miss Eugene Trotman, Panama, enrolled at Simpson College, Indianola,

(1951-1952).

Miss Daisy Wain, Rangoon, Burma, received her degree in Dietetics from Iowa State College. Her internship at Cornell Medical Center in New York was made possible by a P. E. O. International Scholarship. While in Iowa she visited many chapters and stimulated enthusiasm for this fund.

11. P.E.O. Memorials

THE MEMORIAL LIBRARY

OVER a period of years there had been now and then a suggestion made in conventions that P. E. O. should erect a building on the campus of Iowa Wesleyan College to commemorate the founding of P. E. O. The suggestions were more or less vague and no definite action resulted.

In the September 1921 issue of The Record there was published a feature "A P. E. O. Vision" written by Miss Martha McClure of Chapter Original A, in which she suggested that since the aim of P. E. O. in its altruistic work had definitely become education, "It seems a fitting time to project plans for a suitable memorial to honor the birthplace of P. E. O. Nothing could be more appropriate to the ideals of the Sisterhood than a memorial library."

Among the first to promote the plan actively was Mrs. Dell Phillips Glazier, Chapter BS, Ft. Madison, Iowa, who added the practical suggestion that the building might serve the college as a library building, and might also house the general offices of P. E. O.

At the next Supreme Chapter convention held in Kanas City in October 1921, Mrs. Glazier presented the library plan and moved that the question be submitted to the local chapters for consideration, and that it be done through a promotion committee of three to be appointed by the president of Supreme Chapter. The motion carried and Mrs. Helen D. Townsend, president, appointed Mrs. Glazier of Iowa; Miss Ellen Ball (Willcox), Washington and Mrs. Clara R. Waterhouse, Nebraska.

In the 1923 convention, Mrs. Bertha Clark Hughes presiding, there was much discussion, largely irrelevant, with the result that the committee was continued upon motion of Mrs. Mary Allen Stafford, and that the proposition be presented again in the 1925 convention, which was done.

At that convention in Minneapolis, Mrs. Vina Ives Bowden presiding, the vote was unanimous, on the motion, again made by Mrs. Clarier, that the Memorial Library he erected

Mrs. Glazier, that the Memorial Library be erected.

The tragedy of the delay was that before the building was dedicated the last of the Founders, in whose honor it was built, had died.

There were formal ceremonies in connection with the ground breaking, the laying of the corner stone and the dedication of the building.

In all of these, representatives of the various states, the college faculty and trustees, alumni and the town people had part.

All of the completion ceremonies were in the biennial in which

Mrs. Alice H. Scott was president.

The building presented to Iowa Wesleyan is one of the Sister-hood's notable achievements.

THE MEMORY ROOM

For this chapter, in which is given the history of the Memory Room, we are indebted to a paper written in 1889 by Mrs. Florence McKibbin, who for many years was college librarian at Iowa Wesleyan.

The room, with its treasures, is an Iowa project, in a large measure a Chapter Original A project, but for its origin we are indebted to Mrs. McKibbin. Associated with her in its develop-

ment was Mrs. May Brooks Snider.

For some 20 years Mrs. McKibbin carried the key to the room

and was curator of its treasures.

As all P. E. O.'s know, The Memory Room is the room in Old Main, in which was held the meeting January 21, 1869, where the

seven girls organized P. E. O.

It was the music room then. Later the music department was moved over to Pioneer and the former music room was used as the girls' cloak room. Today it is furnished as were parlors in the 1860's and 70's even to the carpet on the floor a "body brussels in floral design."

Mrs. McKibbin's paper bears the title Treasures of the Memory

Room from which we quote:

"Cicero says—'memory is the treasury and guardian of all things'. How true this is of the priceless P. E. O. treasures in our Memory Room.

"Great Libraries, such as the Shakespeare Folger Library, and great banks are moved in armored cars from one place to

another. So our treasures received for our Memory Room and our memory cabinets have come armored in one way and another.

"First of all came the Ella Stewart golden star. Mrs. Babb was given this star by Ella Stewart's mother; she in turn sent it to Mount Pleasant, by her husband, Judge W. I. Babb. She wrote me, 'It is too precious to trust to express, and I wanted it as a souvenir for the P. E. O. collection.'

"This pin of Ella Stewart's now rests in the historical department, in the Memorial Library in the beautiful case given by her

brother Harry Stewart.

"While the original pins of which we speak, and the diamond medal were gifts sent to the Memory Room they are now kept for safety in the vault in the historical department of the Memorial

Library.

"The diamond star given to Mrs. Babb on the 33rd anniversary of the founding of P. E. O. at a Harlan House banquet, was an event never to be forgotten. It thrilled Mrs. Babb to be so remembered, and we hold in our possession a letter which abounds in thanks, which scintillates with literary beauty, in her delight and gratitude for the gift; she desired more than anything else that there should be a 'Thesaurus', a treasure house. Mrs. Babb used the Greek word, she loved a Greek or a Latin word, a place where treasures could be preserved.

"Today Mrs. Babb's diamond studded star rests in the case

with Ella's in the historical department.

"Mrs. Babb named our room in Old Main the 'Memory Room'. She wanted it called just that, and so it is Memory Room today.

"This room holds the Memorial Tablet placed by the P. E. O. State Chapter of Iowa in October, 1917; it was unveiled in the Iowa Wesleyan College Chapel (Mrs. Stella McKibbin, then president of Original A, presiding) by Alice Bird Babb's daughter, Alice Ewing, who is a brilliant daughter of a brilliant mother.

"Mrs. Mary Allen Stafford's star was sent to Mrs. William F. Kopp (Clara Bird Kopp), niece of Alice Bird Babb, who placed

it with the other pins.

"Suela Pearson Penfield gave a medal which was worn by the winner of the competing battalions, when Major Dinwiddie was director of the Military Department of Iowa Wesleyan College. This medal has a large yellow diamond in the center and the letters P. E. O. are set in white diamonds. The medal is now a possession of Iowa Wesleyan having been a college award.

"Even more interesting than diamond medals and pins is a letter written by Franc Roads Elliott telling of the resolution, at the twenty-fourth biennial convention of Supreme Chapter which met at Denver September 30-October 3, 1919, having passed the

one half century mark—for war abolishment. Mrs. Elliott believed

that if humanity is to be humanized war is to be abolished.

"In addition to the above items of special interest, there have been added furnishings of the period. A square piano was the gift of Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Williams. There is a small 'stand table', from the home of Senator Harlan, an item of Mrs. Robert Todd Lincoln's possessions.

"True to the parlor ornaments of the time, there are two Roger's Groups, a marble top center table on which rests the photograph album. The room is not crowded unduly, and is scru-

pulously cared for—all in charge of Chapter Original A."

A MEMORIAL STONE

It will be remembered that when Franc Roads Elliott died in 1924, at her request, her ashes were scattered in a cemetery in Chicago, in which city she died. There was therefore no perma-

nent stone to mark her passing.

It was suggested to the Supreme Chapter Board in 1951 that a memorial stone be set up to mark the dates of the birth and death of this P. E. O. Founder. Accordingly Mrs. Laura Storms Knapp, president of Supreme Chapter, with the approval of the Executive Board, appointed a committee to carry out the project.

Thus came the Memorial stone placed in Forest Home Cemetery in Mt. Pleasant, where are buried other P. E. O. Founders. The stone is on the lot upon which stands the tall Scotch granite monument where Dr. Charles Elliott and others of his family are

buried.

On the stone are these words:

In Memory of
Franc Roads Elliott
Wife of Simon Charles Elliott
1852-1924

A Founder of the P. E. O. Sisterhood

On the top of the stone above the first line is the P. E. O. star.

The committee that carried out the project included: Mrs. Enola Carter, president Original A; Bessie R. Raney, junior past president Supreme Chapter; Winona E. Reeves and Gail Page, past presidents, Iowa State Chapter.

12. The Lincoln Tradition in P.E.O.

P.E.O. has a Lincoln tradition in a sort of third generation way. It dates back into the early days when it was largely an Iowa organization, in the years in which James Harlan of Mt. Pleasant served as United States Senator from Iowa.

During those years, he and his family lived in Washington, where he became not only an advisor but a close personal friend of Abraham Lincoln. A short time before his death the President appointed Senator Harlan to his cabinet as Secretary of the Interior.

The intimacy of the two statesmen extended to their families and continued through the years, in the marriage of Robert Todd

Lincoln to Mary Harlan.

To that marriage were born three children, Mary, Abraham (Jack), and Jessie, the last born to the Lincoln name. children with their mother spent many summers at the home of their grandfather Harlan in Mt. Pleasant. One summer while the girls were in their teens, Mary, better known as Mamie, and Jessie were initiated in P. E. O. by Chapter Original A. There are a few P. E. O.'s still living who remember that day, among them "Fannie" Wheeler, whose father was president of Iowa Wesleyan. That long time friend of the Lincoln girls is Mrs. Frances Wheeler Lutz of Beloit, Kansas.

The Lincoln children entered whole heartedly into the social life of the young people of the town and the college. Warren Beckwith Jr. was one of Jessie's frequent escorts. When the romance received family disapproval, the young people eloped to Milwaukee where they were married November 10, 1897.

While the Lincolns and the Harlans and the Beckwiths all

were friends, the families did not approve the marriage because of the youth of the two.

After some years the marriage ended in divorce. There were two children born of the marriage, Mary Harlan Beckwith and Robert Lincoln Beckwith. Both are still living, 1951.

The Lincoln grandson, Abraham (Jack), should be remem-

bered here. He died in London during the time his father was Minister to the Court of St. James. His death came March 5, 1890. His body was returned to the United States and placed in the Lincoln monument in Oak Ridge cemetery in Springfield. Some forty years later the body was removed and buried in Arlington cemetery beside his father, Robert Todd Lincoln.

Mary, the eldest of the three Lincoln grandchildren, was married in London in 1891, to Charles Isham, her father's secretary. Their only son, Lincoln, is one of the three great grandchildren

of Abraham Lincoln, surviving, in 1951.

Since none of the three has children, their passing will end

the line of descent.

On the death of the last of these, the residue of the Lincoln estate is to be divided equally among three organizations: The American Red Cross, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, and Iowa Wesleyan College in Mt. Pleasant. —W.E.R.

13. Stories by the Way

MINIATURE OF MARTHA McCLURE

IN THE French room of the Memorial Library there hangs a miniature of Miss Martha McClure. The plate inside the shadow box carries this legend:

> Martha McClure Whose Vision Brought to Realization theP. E. O. Memorial Library and the Sarah Porter Beckwith Home

The miniature is a gift to the library building from Miss McClure's sister, May McClure Kelley, (Mrs. William Fitch Kelley) whose home is in Washington, D.C.

You will have read in this history, the chapter telling of Miss McClure's part in securing for P. E. O. the Sarah Porter Beckwith Home. Both Supreme Chapter and Iowa State Chapter are debtors to her for visions that came to realization.

THE INVISIBLE LINE THAT JOINS

That invisible line, more than a thousand miles in length which divides, or joins, the United States and Canada, is the greatest demonstration on this earth of the possibility of peace between nations.

At intervals of 45 or 50 miles there are ports of entry and

immigration officers, but no walls, no fortifications.

There are on the Canadian side, here and there Mounties of the Royal Canadian Police, and on the American side, border patrolmen who as has been said "fraternize like fellow lodge brothers."

Then there is the 2,200 acre international peace garden, the largest formal garden on this earth, cultivated on both sides of the invisible border.

At the western end of the line stands the great Peace Arch, the visible symbol of it all.

How easy, as you see, it was for P. E. O. to be one with Sisters in Canada and in the United States.

DIXIE CORNELL GEBHARDT

Among P. E. O.'s who have made outstanding contribution to civic and patriotic history is Dixie Cornell Gebhardt, Chapter M, Knoxville, Iowa, who designed the Iowa State Flag, in celebration of Iowa's centennial year.

After designing the flag and its official recognition by the state, Mrs. Gebhardt took a patent for it, and then signed over to the Iowa Society Daughters of the American Revolution, all rights to the same, provided the income from the sale of all flags should be given to the Red Cross. A later honor came to Mrs. Gebhardt in that the flag design, with the approval of the Iowa Centennial committee and the U. S. Bureau of Engraving and Printing, appeared on a commemorative issue of postage stamps. There was also put into circulation the Iowa Centennial half dollar, on one side of which was a reproduction of the Iowa flag.

The Iowa flag was unfurled in France on New Year's day 1918 by the 168th Regiment, a part of the Rainbow Division, and was their regimental flag to the end of the war.

A ROSE BY ANY OTHER SPELLING

There has been varied spelling of proper names of those who are a part of P. E. O. history. For example, the name Bousquet which is the correct spelling. In early days it was locally spelled Bosquet, and early papers in Iowa spelled it as it is pronounced Busket.

Another name that has been spelled in three different ways is Roads. Mrs. Elliott herself sometimes spelled it Rhodes. On early Iowa documents it is spelled Rhoades.

Mrs. Penfield's baptismal name Suela, has been mispelled many times as Suella and thus mispronounced. Her daughter, Rose Penfield, a Cleveland, Ohio, P. E. O., told us whence came the

name. Dr. Pearson, her father, had read a Spanish novel in which the heroine had the name Suela; when their daughter was born

her parents gave her that lovely unusual name.

One of the nouns in our vocabulary "dimit" is occasion for debate now and then. When P. E. O. began using the word dimit in the transfer of members from one chapter to another, dictionaries gave two spellings for it, dimit and demit, but gave preference to dimit. Modern dictionaries now give demit the preference.

It was Miss Osmond, during her editorship of *The Record*, who made decision for us on the spelling. One day in a convention of the Grand Chapter she said, "I'm driven crazy by having to correct copy again and again on the spelling of that word. I wish the convention would decide which form we shall use." The president said, "Which do you prefer, Miss Osmond?" To which she replied, "The prefix 'de' means down; 'di' means across; when we transfer a member, we do not demote but transfer her. For that reason it seems for us dimit is preferable." And the blanks when printed so spelled it.

EVIDENCES OF GROWTH

In the convention of 1889 held in Mt. Pleasant there were shown evidences that P. E. O. was outgrowing its administrative set up. There came to that Grand Chapter convention a group of delegates from Nebraska chapters: Mrs. Alice Carey Briggs of Superior; Mrs. Jenny Bryant, Omaha; Mrs. Mary Mason Houseworth, Plattsmouth; and Mrs. Florence Wightman, York. They made formal request that Nebraska be allowed to form a state chapter. There was much discussion pro and con but with the final decision to grant the request, began the organization of state chapters.

To that convention there came also a group of girls from the college Chapter S, Maisy Schreiner, Ollie Cole, Eva Gregg,

Anna Williams, Rose Thorn, and perhaps others.

They came to ask for more liberal interpretation of the existing laws on issuing invitation for membership. While some concessions were made, the discussion indicated the inevitable dis-

banding of the chapter, which came a few years later.

While ovations had been made to Chapter S by Greek letter sororities, it was voted by the convention that P. E. O. should hold to its English letters, all of which contributed to its present status as a city and not a campus organization.

THE SEMINARY CHAPTER

One of Iowa's earliest chapters was known as "The Seminary Chapter", its membership made up of girls who attended The Young Ladies Seminary in Mt. Pleasant. It was a boarding school founded in 1863.

John Ely Briggs, from whose history of early Iowa schools we quote, said: "The girls who attended the school were advised to bring an English dictionary, an atlas and a Bible, as well as an umbrella, a pair of thick soled shoes and a part of the furnishing of a room, including a carpet if desired."

Parents were advised "Not to provide expensive jewelry and dresses." The instruction closed with the statement that gentle-

men were not allowed to call without special permission.

SEVEN LOVELY GOLD STARS

When the Founders had decided on a gold star for their emblem, they went to the Crane Jewelry Store in Mt. Pleasant and explained to Mr. Crane their wishes, and he made for them seven lovely gold stars. Two of the originals are in existence today.

Mr. Crane continued to make them as they were ordered by new members. Later, by degrees, our present laws governing the

emblem were developed.

In an editorial written by Miss Osmond in The P. E. O. Record of October 1893, is this interesting item about the original Gold Star, "The first P. E. O. pin ever made was sent by the jeweler as a sample to the young ladies who formed the Society. They were satisfied with it, kept it, and ordered more like it. They voted to allow Alice Bird (Mrs. Babb, now) to have it, and it has the single name Alice on its back."

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P. E. O. ENTERS INDIANA

Between the then of 1869 and the present there have come indefinite changes in procedure but constancy in the essence of P. E. O.

We clip from The P. E. O. Record (Jan. 1949 issue) this story:

Illustrating the speed and the zeal of the early years is the

case of how P. E. O. went to Indiana.

Laura Craven (Rice) visited a P. E. O. in Osceola, Iowa. The girls liked her, so they called a meeting one night, voted her in, sent for her and initiated her all in one session.

She stayed on with her friend long enough to attend the next meeting and then went home to Thorntown and started a chapter with seven members. They met twice a week and grew to 35 members the first year.

Every six months they elected new officers. In those days

P. E. O. had no colors so they adopted lavender and white.

Early in their history they rented a hall for a meeting place, which the men of their families helped to furnish, and, in a large measure, paid the rent. They also split kindling and carried coal, and in the winter started the fire in the coal stove.

The girls had curtains at the windows and a three-ply ingrain carpet on the floor. Every one took a chair from home. They had a hanging lamp with prisms around the edge of the shade.

One of the men furnished a desk, indeed they took a lively

interest in all that the P. E. O.'s did.

In return they shared in many dinners. In 1905 the Thorntown chapter entertained the "Supreme Grand Chapter" convention, a single chapter in subordinate territory.

In 1923 they entertained the convocation from which was

organized the Indiana State Chapter.

Laura did pretty well!

DEDICATORY WREATHS

On the day of the dedication of the P. E. O. Memorial Library—where the Founders were present only in memory—visits

were made to their graves and wreaths placed there.

In Newton, Iowa, members of Chapter AO placed a wreath on the grave of Alice Virginia Coffin; in Knoxville, Iowa, for Hattie Briggs (Bousquet); in Cleveland, Ohio, for Suela Pearson (Penfield); in Mt. Pleasant, for Ella Stewart, Alice Bird (Babb) and Mary Allen (Stafford). For Franc Roads (Elliott) a wreath was placed on the Roads family lot, since Mrs. Elliott's ashes, as she wished, were scattered in Oakwoods Cemetery.

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THE WHITE HISTORY

The first history of P. E. O. to be printed, was published in 1903 by order of the "Supreme Grand Chapter", under the title The History of the P. E. O. Sisterhood. The title page further states "Consisting of compilation of the writings of various past and present officers of the Sisterhood." The committee that com-

piled and issued the comprehensive history did an excellent piece of work. The book itself bound in white, 270 pages on heavy paper stock, generously illustrated with photographs, sold for one dollar a copy. Were it duplicated today it would cost ten or more times that amount.

The book is out of print and is commonly called The White

History.

The history committee included: Mrs. Sarah R. Dewey, chairman; Mrs. Alice B. Babb, Mrs. Sarah Gray Cramer, Mrs. Emma R. Pratt, Mrs. May B. Johnston, Miss Ida B. Johnson, Miss Mary Osmond. The book is highly prized by those who possess a copy of it.

WHEN THE RAINS CAME

When the first chapter was organized in Clarinda, it was in the days when the organizer might be any P. E. O. whom the Grand Chapter president wished to appoint.

Mary Butler Westcott, who is now Chapter AE's only charter

member, tells of their experience.

Elaborate plans were made for entertaining Mrs. Kate Stearns and Miss Isabelle Beer from Garden Grove who had been appointed to organize. They appeared on May 3rd in a driving rain. This rain did not prevent the organization that day but it did, by continuing for two weeks, prevent their going home, so the Butler family was hostess to the visiting appointees, not for one day but for 14 days!

THE CAPE

As you look at the portraits of the Founders, it might seem at first glance, that those of Alice Virginia Coffin and Franc Roads are of the same person. Not at all, it is "the cape"—we use the quotes advisedly, for it was a sort of common possession.

When the committee appointed to choose from the many photographs submitted, which should be reproduced for portraits to be hung in the Memorial Library, the cape appeared more than

once.

To the girls it must have seemed highly photographic, and

more or less common property.

When finally the seven photographs had been selected by the committee, they were submitted to the artist, Marion Dunlap

Harper, who questioned the advisability of the two similarily posed.

However, the tradition of the cape and the girls' fondness for it prevailed and the portraits were painted as you see them.

To one the artist gave to the cape a shade of red and to the other a neutral color which lessened the appearance of duplication, but the cape is one and the same.

The hands that have written it lay it away."

EREIN are recorded some of the things done by pioneer members and others in Iowa officially and by way of organization. But through it all they have done something more vital to the life of P. E. O. in keeping alive the desire with which it began, for a closer bond of friendship among its members.

It is easy to transfer tangible things from one generation to another, but the spirit of a thing is not so easily transmitted.

Do you remember how the Seniors at Vassar are said to pass their songs across the lake on class day night? The older girls carrying lanterns wander through the woods to the lake, and when all have reached the water's edge, they sing their class song to the Juniors, who are massed in the darkness among the trees on the opposite shore.

The under classmen chant them back one by one, and after the Seniors have sent their last, the sacred prized class song across the water, the lanterns are passed in silence from hand to hand, over a bridge to the younger classmen in the woods. Whereupon the Juniors carrying the lights and singing for the first time in their lives, the inherited prize-song, march around the lake, while the Seniors retire into the dark and the stillness.

We like to think that in some such way, all who are here in this generation, will pass on the song and the light of P. E. O.
