YOUR LEGISLATORS' VOTING RECORD ON SMALL BUSINESS ISSUES | 2020 EDITION

2019-2020 Session Roll call votes by your state legislators on key small business issues are listed here. Although this Voting Record does not reflect all elements considered by a lawmaker when voting, nor does it represent a complete profile of a legislator, it can be a guide in evaluating your legislator's attitudes toward small business. Please thank those legislators who supported small business.

BOTH CHAMBERS

- 1. Staged Accidents HB 353 (Rep. Kasey Carpenter):** HB 353 seeks to stop insurance fraud schemes involving staged motor vehicle collisions. HB 353 would make it illegal for individuals to intentionally cause a staged motor vehicle collision for the purpose of filing a civil lawsuit seeking monetary damages or claiming insurance benefits. **A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the House 107-55. Passed the Senate 41-10.
- 2. General Contractor Lien and Contract Legislation SB 315:** This bill clarifies existing state law to allow tradesmen to sue for breach of contract in payment disputes without deference to a waiver of lien. Along with NFIB, this legislation was supported by the Associated General Contractors of Georgia and over 15 other statewide organizations. **A "Yes" supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 53-0. Passed the House 147-0.
- 3. PPE Tax credits HB 846 (Rep. John Corbett):** Allows businesses manufacturing items in Georgia used to shield people from contracting the virus would be eligible for an additional \$1,250 tax credit per job. Those supplies include gloves, masks, hand sanitizer, face shields, helmets, goggles and respirators. It would apply to jobs created in those qualified companies through 2024. Companies that qualify for the state's Quality Job Tax Credit would also be able to count the number of employees they had in 2019 toward claiming their credit for the 2020 and 2021 tax years. **A "Yes vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed Senate 46 - 3. Passed House 110 - 58.

SENATE ONLY

- 4. Seatbelt Non-Use Admissibility Amendment #1 of HB 171 (Sen. William Ligon):** On March 26, during the Senate floor debate on HB 171, Senator William Ligon

(Brunswick) offered an amendment (Amendment 1) which would have removed the provision admitting the non-use of seat belts as evidence in civil court cases. Amendment 1 would have stripped out in its entirety the pro-business language around the admissibility of seat belt usage or non-usage in a civil case which was added to the bill in Senate Public Safety Committee. Georgia law requires front-seat passengers to wear seat belts as a proven method of reducing serious bodily injury or death, yet juries aren't allowed to know whether an individual was or was not complying with the law at the time of an accident. **A "No" vote supports the NFIB position.** Failed the Senate 24-23.

- 5. Civil Practice Litigation SB 415 (Sen. Steve Gooch):** This legislation came out of the senate study committee that looked at the cost of doing business in Georgia related to liability costs. The bill attempts to provide small businesses reasonable protections from frivolous lawsuits and lower the litigation costs that are often passed on to business owners. It was a comprehensive package supported by over 60 business and industry associations including NFIB. **A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill failed to receive the required minimum 29 votes and therefore failed the Senate 27-26.
- 6. Right to Farm Act Senate Amendment #1 of HB 545 (Sen. Jesse Stone):** The bill sought to provide needed updates to protect farmers from frivolous lawsuits and from anti-farm activists imposing their agenda through the courts. The bill faced opposition from personal injury lawyers and environmental activist groups who are currently suing Georgia farmers for nuisance. Unfortunately, Senator Jesse Stone (R-Waynesboro) offered an amendment which not only nullified the protections being sought but would even make farmers more vulnerable than current law. Unfortunately, his Amendment was passed killing the efforts to pass this legislation. **A "No" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 28-21.

- 7. Small Business COVID-19 Liability Protections HB 167:** The Senate passed one of the strongest pro-business bills in the country with a substitute on HB 167. This legislation is a comprehensive pro-business bill necessary to aid in Georgia's recovery from the COVID-19 crisis. To ensure economic recovery, businesses need the assurance that when giving their best efforts to protect employees and the general public, they in turn will be protected from frivolous lawsuits. Our public health officials are learning more about COVID-19 every day and recommendations are ever-changing in response. As businesses adapt to this new economy, they require the support of the legislature to provide a consistent and predictable legal environment. This legislation is narrowly tailored to provide targeted relief against frivolous lawsuits regarding the transmission of COVID-19. **A "Yes" votes supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 31-19.
- 8. Small Business COVID-19 Liability Protections Amendment to HB 167:** Senator Jesse Stone offered an amendment which the Personal Injury Lawyer lobby pushed on the floor would have stripped and effectively killed the bill. **A "No" vote on this amendment supports the NFIB position.** Failed the Senate 24-28.

HOUSE ONLY

- 9. Right to Farm Act HB 545 (Rep. Tom McCall):** HB 545 is an attempt to close loopholes and provide needed clarity to protect farmers from frivolous lawsuits. The bill addresses current ambiguity in the law that Georgia shares with other states whose farmers have fallen victim to frivolous and unwarranted litigation. **A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the House 107-58.
- 10. Agency Deference and Taxpayer Fairness HB 538:** HB 538 levels the playing field for taxpayers and establishes fairness in cases before the Georgia Tax Tribunal. Georgia taxpayers are currently faced with an uneven playing field when challenging tax assessments or refund denials. This year State Rep. Todd Jones (R-South Forsyth) introduced HB 538 to address this question of fairness in Georgia state tax disputes and to fulfill the mission of the Georgia Tax Tribunal which was established by the General Assembly in 2012. Currently, the Tax Tribunal is required to defer to the Department of Revenue's interpretations of ambiguous tax statutes and regulations because of Georgia's adoption of this judicial doctrine stemming from a U.S Supreme Court decision. HB 535 would allow the Tax Tribunal to fulfill its purpose as an independent

and autonomous division within the Office of State Administrative Hearings. Other states including Arizona, Florida, Wisconsin and Mississippi have already acted to eliminate agency deference and HB 538 would further enhance Georgia's status as a fair and equitable place to live and do business. Ending agency deference in tax controversies in Georgia is not just the right thing to do from a legal standpoint, but also from an economic development and fairness perspective. Unfortunately, this bill did not come up for a vote in the Senate after it passed the House. **A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the House 158-8.

- 11. Premises Liability Protections for Healthcare Facilities and Businesses SB 359:** While weaker than HB167, the bill that the senate passed out, SB359 does provide needed protections for businesses. The Act provides legal protections to businesses, healthcare facilities and providers from COVID-19 liability claims for the "transmission, infection, exposure, or potential exposure" of a person to COVID-19 on the premises with the following exception: the Act does not protect facilities against gross negligence, willful and wanton misconduct, reckless infliction of harm, or intentional infliction of harm. In addition to the protections described above, a rebuttable presumption for assumption of the risk by the claimant exists when an individual or entity of certain premises posts a sign at the point of entry using at least one-inch Arial font placed apart from any other text stating the following: Warning Under Georgia law, there is no liability for an injury or death of an individual entering these premises if such injury or death results from the inherent risks of contracting COVID-19. You are assuming this risk by entering these premises. **A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 34-16. Passed the House 104-56.
