understanding carbon capture and storage

Carbon capture and storage (CCS) is a proven technology for reducing greenhouse gas emissions. It takes carbon dioxide (CO_2) from industrial processes and permanently stores it in geological formations deep underground. CCS is critical to a lower-carbon future and essential to achieving the net zero goals of the Paris Agreement.

the gorgon CCS system

Chevron Australia's Gorgon liquefied natural gas (LNG) facility incorporates the world's largest CCS system designed to capture carbon emissions. Naturally occurring CO_2 is taken from offshore gas reservoirs and injected into a giant sandstone formation two kilometres beneath Barrow Island, where it remains permanently trapped.

the gorgon CCS system prevents millions of tonnes of greenhouse gases being vented into the atmosphere





according to the intergovernmental panel on climate change, it is impossible to achieve net zero emissions by 2050 without scaled deployment of technologies such as CCS


