Day 1

Friday 2nd May

Weather: Sunny and Warm

This year the group arrived at Mahon at different times of the day, and as a result the group never got together until the evening meal.

Those of us who arrived early had time to look around the area of Matchani Gran, but not before a fine lunch was put before us by Shaun and Jenny.

The afternoon walk around the fields produced several bird species: one Roller, four Hoopoe, at least 10 Booted Eagles, one Red Kite, one Egyptian Vulture, Turtle Doves, Spotted and Pied Flycatchers, Short-toed and Thekla Larks.

Flowers were in short supply this year after a very dry winter and spring. No orchids at all around Matchani Gran, but plants of note were: Tassel Hyacinth, Rosy Garlic, Squirting Cucumber, Bellardia, Yellow Centaury, Evax and *Ornithogalum arabicum* to name but a few.

After a fine evening meal everyone retired early with a few lucky people hearing the distant call of a Scops Owl.

Day 2

Saturday 3rd May

Weather: Sunny and Warm

The Matchani Gran Pre-breakfast walk produced a few birds including four Pied and Spotted Flycatchers, Wood Warbler, 3-4 Hoopoes, Whinchats, Turtle Doves and a Woodchat Shrike.

After breakfast, with both vans loaded, we set off for our first port of call, Tirant Marsh. Just before the marsh we came across a huge flock of Bee-eaters (at least 200) feeding over the fields near the road. We had to tear ourselves away and move a short distance down the road to the marsh. This year there was very little water but nevertheless we had some good birds. A wonderful flock of 22 Red-footed Falcons were hunting dragonflies over the marsh. Two Purple Herons flew past and one Squacco Heron, one Golden Oriole, 22 Cattle Egrets, one Tawny Pipit, 12 Turtle Doves, Booted Eagles, Fan-tailed Warblers, Marsh Harriers and Red Kites were also seen. As we drove away, a Collared Pratincole flew across the road in front of us.

In the wet areas, lots of flowering rush were seen and plenty of Italian Sainfoin with Crown Daisy were by the roadside. At the end of the road overlooking Cala Tirant in a much dried up area we found a few Tongue orchids and Azure Lupins. A couple of Audouin's Gulls were feeding down on the beach.

After lunch we drove out to Cap de Cavalleria where we had good views of Blue Rock Thrushes, an Osprey flew over and Pied Flycatchers were seen in the pine trees. Plants of note were: Dragon Arum, Oyster Plant, and three Endemics *Launaea cervicornis*, the Foxglove *Digitalis dubia*, and *Senecio rodriguezii*.

On our way home to Matchani Gran we stopped off for a short while near Fornells to look at few disused salt pans. The best bird was a Greater Flamingo, a few waders were also present including Curlew Sandpiper and Kentish Plover.

Day 3

Sunday 4th May

Weather: Dry and Warm, haze at times.

An early morning walk gave us at least five Whinchat, two Subalpine Warblers, four Short-toed Larks, four Spotted and three Pied Flycatchers, one Cuckoo, two Woodchat Shrikes, one Marsh Harrier, one Tawny Pipit and a couple of Hoopoes.

First stop of the day was at one of Menorca's many prehistoric monuments, "So na cacana" which gave us a few birds including five Woodchat Shrikes, Hoopoes, Nightingales, Turtle Doves and Quail (heard but not seen), after which we moved on to Son Bou.

The large area of dunes and reed beds produced very little this year as the dunes are under a conservation and regeneration programme, so most of the dunes were a no-go area except on the boardwalks. Birds we did see were Squacco Heron, seven Black-winged Stilts, Audouin's Gulls, Wheatears, Whinchat, Spotted and Pied Flycatchers. On the Shore were two Knot and Kentish Plovers with a few Balearic Shearwaters well out to sea.

Large clumps of the grey leaves of Sea Daffodil could be seen throughout the dunes with Purple Vipers Bugloss, Sea Holly and Reichardia adding a splash of colour.

After lunch we drove back past Tirant marsh where at least 25 Red-footed Falcons were feeding over the damp grassy areas with 2-3 Wood Sandpipers nearby. Woodchat Shrike, Pied Flycatchers, Booted Eagles and Fan-tailed Warblers were also seen and an Osprey drifted over.

Day 4

Monday 5th May

Weather: Sunny and Warm.

Matchani Gran pre-breakfast walk gave us plenty of Hoopoes, Nightingales and Turtle Doves. Also present were Tawny Pipit and Pied Flycatchers with two Wood Warblers.

A trip to the north coast was on the cards for today to an area known as Son Parc. On arriving at the car park by the beach we scrambled over the wall and found a rough path through scrub and trees down alongside a marsh. This later cleared to give us good views of Purple Gallinules, Marsh Harrier, Hoopoes, Woodchat Shrikes, Squacco Heron and Ferruginous Duck while Booted Eagles, Peregrine and Buzzard drifted overhead. After a long walk up through the Pine woods and out to the coast we eventually arrived back at the car park.

The vans were moved back up the road under the shade of trees for lunch where Nightingales sang and showed well, and European Pond Terrapins sat in the sun on an old tree stump in a ditch.

A short drive after lunch brought us to the top of Monte Toro, the highest hill on the island. With clear skies we enjoyed views from one end of the island to the other. A couple of Booted Eagles and Ravens were the only birds of note.

On the way down the rare endemic flower "*Helichrysum ambiguum*" was seen growing out of the rocky hillside.

Day 5

Tuesday 6th May

Weather: Sunny and warm.

Our early morning walk gave us a fine male Red-footed Falcon sat on a fig tree. Also seen were Tawny Pipit, Whinchat, Spotted and Pied Flycatchers, and a Scops Owl and a Stone Curlew were heard at dawn.

Punta Nati at the north-west end of Menorca was our first stop of the day. This barren, stony headland is always good for Larks and Rock Thrushes. There were plenty Short-toed and Thekla Larks as well as good numbers of Blue Rock Thrushes. Pallid Swifts were feeding along the cliffs with the odd Audouin's Gull drifting past. Spotted Flycatchers were seen feeding around the lighthouse buildings, and a Peregrine sat on an outcrop of rock overlooking the sea.

Senecio rodriguezii, Dragon Arum and Dwarf Sea Lavender were the main plants of note.

After a short drive back to the outskirts of Ciutadella we saw a small colony of about 20 Cattle Egrets which appeared to be nesting in a small area of pines.

We then moved on to the prehistoric site of Naveta des Tudons (a prehistoric burial chamber) where we had our lunch. After a short walk we had a look around the area of the large burial chamber. It was very dry compared to last year with little in the way of wild flowers. A few plants of note were *Bellardia*, field Marigold, Small Flowered Catchfly and a couple of Bug Orchid plants. A group of five Ravens, a Red Kite, and a couple of Woodchat Shrikes were the only birds of note.

On the way back to base we stopped off at Tirant marsh for an hour. Red-footed Falcons were now up to 30 or more. A Golden Oriole flew across the road near the vans. Woodchats, two Red Kites, Purple Heron, three Greenshank, three Egyptian Vultures and five Booted Eagles were also noted.

Day 6

Wednesday 7th May

Weather: Sunny periods, warm.

The early morning walk produced fewer birds than of late. A couple of Hoopoes, Stone Curlew (heard), Spotted and Pied Flycatchers, and a Tawny Pipit.

A visit today to Montgofre Nou (private) salt pan proved to be very productive. Waders were in fair numbers with 12 Wood Sandpipers, 10 Black-winged Stilts, one Ruff, seven Curlew Sandpipers, 15 Little Ringed Plovers and two Temminck's Stints. Three Booted Eagles, Marsh Harrier, and Red Kite drifted over while three Ospreys fished the open waters. A few Tongue Orchids were found and Myrtle bushes were in flower with Strawberry trees in fruit nearby.

On then to Cap de Favatrix, where we had lunch on the beach. On the shallow pool in off the headland we had a Sanderling, Little Stint, two Kentish Plover, two Little Ringed Plovers, a Tawny Pipit calling overhead and at least three Blue Rock Thrushes. A few Balearic and Cory's Shearwaters were passing well out to sea. A few plants in this barren area were, Sea Knotgrass, Yellow Horned Poppy, and some of the "Socarrell's" *Launaea cervicornis*, *Anthyllis hystrix* and *Dorycnium fulgurans*. Also just starting to flower were clumps of *Teucrium marum* subsp. *spinescens*.

On the main road from Cap Favaritx to Mahon, six Red-footed Falcons were seen on the wires over a freshly cut hay field.

Day 7

Thursday 8th May

Weather: Cloudy AM. Sunny yet windy PM.

The pre-breakfast walk was very quiet with very little seen, the odd Hoopoe and Turtle Dove being the best sightings.

Over the south coast to Cala Santa Galdana today. A look off the cliffs to the east of the cove gave us many Swifts, Yellow-legged and Audouin's Gulls.

We then drove into Cala Galdana and parked on the west side of the cove below the woods. After a steep climb up the man made steps it was then an easy walk along the top. Bird species were few. Nightingales, Sardinian Warblers, Blackcaps and Spotted Flycatchers were the only species of note.

The flowers were much better. Many Pyramidal Orchids, very few Tongue Orchids and only 2 bits of *Ophrys balearica* left. Other plants seen were, Friars Cowl, Tassel Hyacinth, *Teucrium polium*, Yellow Cytinus and many wild Gladiolus.

On returning to our vans we then drove around the other side of the town to the start of the Gorge D' Algendar where we had our lunch. After refreshments we set off up the gorge. Birds seen in this area were, 15+ Egyptian vultures, four Red Kites, eight plus Booted Eagles, Hoopoe and Peregrine. We also saw Fan-tailed Warbler, Woodchat Shrikes and plenty of Spotted Flycatchers. Plants of note were, Blue Hounds Tongue, Pomegranate, Grass-poly and Pitch Trefoil.

Day 8

Friday 9th May

Weather: Cloudy. Rain at times. Strong Easterly winds.

Due to bad weather no morning walk took place. As the group dispersed at five different times throughout the day, with the last party leaving at 20:15 there was little time to do anything other than transport people to the airport, although some members of the party decided to spend some time in the capital city, Mahon.
