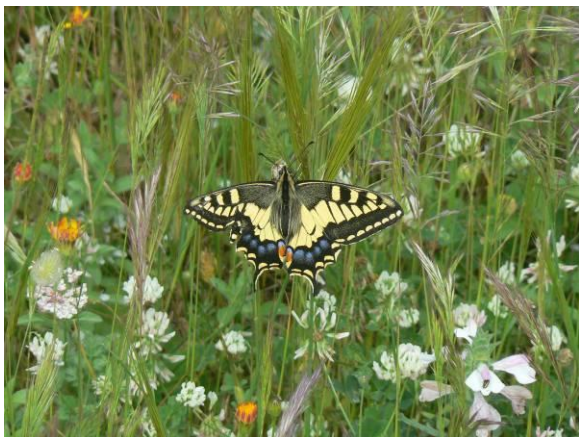

Day 1

Friday 30th April

Weather - Hazy, warm and sunny

The group arrived at Mahon on time and were soon on the way to Matchani Gran. Everyone settled in and were soon tucking into a fine lunch. The afternoon was spent looking around the fields and lanes around Matchani Gran. The flora was well advanced this year with the orchids in this area long over. Birds seen during the afternoon included Red Kite, Booted Eagle, Pied and Spotted Flycatchers, Wood Warbler, Sardinian Warbler, Hoopoe Whinchat and Swift.

Day 2

Saturday 1st May

Weather - overcast with sunny spells. Thundery at times with the odd spot of rain

The early morning walk around Matchani Gran produced Thekla and Short-Toed Larks Tawny Pipit and Spotted Flycatchers. After a fine breakfast we drove to the Tirant Marsh area where we spent the day. The fields were a blaze of colour with Crown Daisies Poppies and Gladiolus. Highlights in the bird world were plenty of Bee Eaters, a Red-footed Falcon, Stone Curlew, Purple Gallinule, Golden Oriole, Hoopoe, Marsh Harrier and Booted Eagles. A couple of Hermann's Tortoises were found during the afternoon and at least one Scops Owl was seen well before everyone turned in for the night.

Day 3

Sunday 2nd May

Weather - after overnight rain the skies cleared to give us a fine sunny and warm day

Pre-breakfast walk gave us much the same as the previous day plus Stone Curlews, and Woodchat Shrike. We were on the road just after 9am and on our way to Cap Cavalleria. In this rocky area of the headland we had plenty of Dragon Arum, and *Senecio Rodriguezii* in flower. Several *Digitalis dubia* were found, but not in flower and off the Cape there was a steady passage of Cory's and Balearic Shearwaters, with a few Audouin's Gulls passing by. Also of note were many Swallows, House Martins and Swifts, moving north, plus a party of Bee Eaters. Blue Rock Thrushes and Tawny Pipits were among the rocks and Booted Eagles and Egyptian Vultures glided above. We then had a short drive to Binimel La Beach where we had lunch.

The afternoon walk along the beach and cliffs gave us more Audouin's Gulls, Little Ringed Plover, Marsh Harriers, Bee-eaters and thousands more hirundines going north. A few Mirror Orchids were found with small flowered Tongue Orchids and large clumps of Sea Knotgrass. A quick stop by Tirant Marsh on the way home produced Marsh Harrier, Purple Heron, Booted Eagle and thousands more Hirundines and a young pond Terrapin.

Day 4

Monday 3rd May

Weather Overcast and Warm. Rain by late afternoon

Early morning gave us 3 Stone Curlews, Hoopoes Woodchat Shrike, Tawny Pipit and the odd Flycatcher. After breakfast we drove to Cala Galdana and were soon having good views of both Pallid and Alpine Swifts from a view point overlooking the cliffs and the bay. A climb up to the top path gave us some nice flowers, ie a few Mirror Orchids, plenty of Pyramidal and *Ophrys balearica*. There were a few small flowered Tongue Orchids, but plenty of gone-over Bumble-Bee, Sawfly and Mirror Orchids. Birds were few but we did see Hoopoes, Woodchat Shrikes Egyptian Vultures, Nightingales and plenty of Sardinian Warblers.

After lunch we walked up the Algendor Gorge to the Egyptian Vulture breeding site and good views were had by most of the group. Other birds seen in the area were Red Kite, Booted Eagles, Little Egrets, Spotted Flycatchers and Wood Warblers. Woodchat Shrike was seen by a few and a Scops Owl was heard calling. By late afternoon rain had set in so we returned to base.

Day 5

Tuesday 4th May

Weather - cool and cloudy

After a violent storm overnight (the worst for twenty years) we woke to a very cool and damp morning. After our breakfast we motored north to the salt pans of Montgofre Nou. Strawberry Tree, Spanish Broom, Rosemary and Myrtle were soon on our plant list, and several bird species were also added. Highlights were Spoonbill, Black-winged Stilt, Temminck's and Little Stints, Red-crested Pochard, Black-crowned Night Heron, Red-rumped Swallow and Marsh Harrier. Hundreds of hirundines were also present.

We then moved into Cape De Favatrix for lunch and during early afternoon we looked around the headland and out to the lighthouse. Heavy seas were crashing onto the coast and many Cory's and Balearic Shearwaters were passing by. The odd Audouin's Gull was seen plus a few migrants like Wood Warbler, and both Spotted and Pied Flycatchers. On our way back to Matchani Gran we stopped off the Albufera Reserve and in a small, rough grassy area we had Azure Lupin and three species of *serapis* (Tongue Orchids)

Day 6

Wednesday 5th May

Weather - cold and cloudy with showers and sunny spells

Due to the cold and wet conditions the early morning walk gave us nothing of note. First stop of the day was at Son Park on the north coast where a short walk brought us out by a freshwater lake with reed beds. Several species of bird were added to our list including Ferruginous Duck, Osprey, Squacco Heron and Hobby. Several Purple Gallinules, Marsh Harriers, Red-crested Pochard, Booted Eagles and Golden Orioles were also seen well.

Then we went onto the top of Mount Toro for a coffee break and had good views over the island, at least until the low cloud came down. We then drove down to the coast for lunch at Son Bou where a walk along a blustery beach was cut short due to rain moving along the coast. At least 200 Cory's Shearwaters were seen off shore, and a few Audouin's Gulls were feeding on the shoreline. We also found the only Yellow Wagtail of the tour. On the way back to base we stopped off at the Torralba Prehistoric Monument for the group to have a look around. Some of the birds seen around this area were Bee-eater, Hoopoe, Tawny Pipit, Marsh Harrier, Booted Eagle and Egyptian Vulture.

Day 7

Thursday 6th May

Weather cool and cloudy with rain at times - drier with sunny spells later

We went for a trip to the north west of the island today out to the headland of Punta Nati. It was dry but cool as we walked around this stony headland. Birds of note were Cattle Egret, Peregrine, Blue Rock Thrush, Marsh Harrier, Stone Curlew, Egyptian Vulture and a steady passage of Cory's and Balearic Shearwaters. The Cattle Egret numbers have increased since last year and many now breed in the clump of pines back towards Ciutadella. Plenty of plants of *Senecio rodriguezii* and Squirting Cucumber were found on the headland and along the roadside.

Next stop was at Naveta Des Tudons, a Prehistoric Burial Chamber where we had more Bee-eaters, Woodchat Shrike, Red Kite, Booted Eagles, and Egyptian Vultures. Plants of note here were Branched Broomrape, Tree-leaved Toadflax and Bug Orchids.

We then moved onto Tirant Marsh for lunch but then it started to rain and very little was seen. After lunch we moved across to the south coast out of the rain and had a walk around Cales Coves. Highlights here were Blue Rock Thrush, Audouin's Gull, Pallid Swift, Common Sandpiper and Woodchat Shrike. Back at Matchani Gran a short walk before the evening meal produced Hoopoe, Marsh Harrier, Golden Oriole and Stone Curlew.

Day 8

Friday 7th May

Weather cool cloudy sunny spells, warmer p.m

A morning walk before we packed our bags gave us the usual Hoopoes, Stone Curlews, Wood Warbler and Flycatchers. We left for the airport on time and departed Menorca at 13-30 arriving at Gatwick 30 minutes early!
