



The Arroyo Seco ("Dry Stream") is a tributary of the Los Angeles River and runs approximately 25 miles. This seasonal stream carries water from the San Gabriel Mountains to the confluence of the LA River through Pasadena, South Pasadena, and Northeast LA. Historically, the Los Angeles River and its tributaries sustained the Tongva people, providing water and attracting wildlife. Today, the Arroyo Seco continues to be an important resource for the plant, animal, and insect communities of Debs Park.

RED-TAILED HAWK



This bird of prey is a Debs Park favorite - look up and you'll often find pairs soaring through the sky in a circular pattern. Keep your ears open for their trademark call!

CALIFORNIA THRASHER



With their long, curved bill, California Thrashers are easy to identify once you spot them! These unique songbirds are only found in California.

CALIFORNIA SCRUB-JAY



Did you know that the "Blue-Jay" you just saw is actually called a California Scrub-Jay? These charismatic birds can often be seen carrying acorns in their bills.

CALIFORNIA TOWHEE



A Debs Park staple, California Towhees can be seen around the park year round! You'll typically spot them hopping on the ground and scratching among leaves for food.

ALLEN'S HUMMINGBIRD



Small but mighty, Allen's Hummingbirds are an important pollinator here in Debs Park. Keep your eyes peeled for flashes of bright copper and green, and listen for their buzzing bumblebee-like sounds!

NUTTALL'S WOODPECKER

Listen for repetitive tapping sounds and you might spot a Nuttall's Woodpecker searching for insects under tree bark. These birds love the oak woodland habitat found in Debs Park!

COMMON RAVEN



Ravens are commonly found perched in trees around Debs Park or soaring through the sky above. These striking black birds are extremely intelligent and are able to mimic the calls of other birds!
