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INFORMATION ON ORAL GABAPENTIN

What is GABAPENTIN?

- This is a type of anti-seizure medication which blocks nerves. It can also reduce itching, pain, burning
- The most common side effects are dizziness, drowsiness and lower extremity swelling

How is GABAPENTIN prescribed?

Please use as follows:

- The medicine is available as 300 mg tablets (although rarely 100 mg tabs are used 3 times daily).
- Check with Dr. Donovan exactly how he would like you to use this medication.
- Frequently, it is used 300 mg at night for three nights then 300 mg twice daily (morning and night) for 3 more days and then 300 mg three times per day for next 8 days. Then starting week 3, go up to 600 mg twice daily and then in week 4 go up to 600 mg three times per day (1800 mg per day total).
- The maximum dose is 3600 mg/ day (or 1200 mg 3 times/ day).
- DO NOT STOP GABAPENTIN SUDDENLY. It needs to be decreased slowly.

What conditions will GABAPENTIN be used for?

 Gabapentin is used for seizure disorders but can also be used for skin and scalp itching, Pain disorders, Pain after shingles, Scalp Burning

Who will not be prescribed GABAPENTIN?

- 1. Someone with allergy to the drug
- 2. Women trying to become pregnant

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What are the side effects of GABAPENTIN?

- SUICIDAL THOUGHTS and BEHAVIOURS are rare but will be discussed.
- dizziness, sleepiness, drowsiness,
- Palpitations, chest tightness, swelling in legs
- nausea (take with food), dry mouth, gastric discomfort diarrhea or constipation
- increased blood pressure, headaches, changes in appetite.
- Blotchy rash
- Increased serum creatinine (CK)

Is any blood work needed while taking GABAPENTIN?

We also recommend a blood test for CK at baseline and month 2

What type of monitoring is needed while taking GABAPENTIN?

A baseline blood test is required. Follow up blood pressure assessments will be needed at the end of month 1, month 2 and month 3. These blood pressure assessments can either be done

- 1) by our nurses or Dr. Donovan by coming into the office for a 1 minute quick follow up (a booked appointment is required)
- 2) by the patient himself or herself at home (using an at home blood pressure machine) with results emailed or called into our office
- 3) by your family doctor with results emailed or called into our office
- 4) at a local pharmacy (using a machine at the pharmacy).
