## ALMOST 400 VIDEOS IN ENGLISH, FRENCH, GERMAN, AND SPANISH AVAILABLE



After many months of video production, almost 400 videos in English, French, German, and Spanish have been created by the Babelium team. These videos can be utilised by learners at any level in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages, from A1 to C level, and have been specifically developed to improve oral skills and overall fluency in second language learners. Students and teachers alike are now invited to try out the platform and videos for themselves and provide any feedback they might have.

All of the video exercises have been created under a Creative Commons licence so that they are freely available for use by anyone and can be adapted by teachers if necessary to meet the learning requirements of their students. The project is currently in its piloting phase in which any potential issues will be identified via user feedback and resolved so as to ensure that the learning tools provided are of the highest quality possible. During this piloting phase, which is taking place in France, Latvia and Spain, all of the videos will be available at http://llp.babeliumproject.com

If the use of Babelium is not intended to replace more classic language courses, its users feel that it provides an important complement to such classes.
