

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Native American Heritage Month

In recognition of Native American Heritage Month, the Yaquina View School Gardeners harvested Rainbow Corn from their Three Sisters Garden Bed. This is the third season of using saved seeds from school grown corn. The students planted the corn last spring and harvested the corn in October. Some of the corn kernels have been saved for next year's planting and the rest will be ground by the students for delicious homemade cornbread. This has become such a popular activity with the students that we had to order additional corn from a local mill in Oregon. The Blue Corn we received is beautiful and gives more students the opportunity to experience what was once a normal way of life for the Tribal Nations in many parts of North America. Three Sisters farming is a multi-seasonal gardening project that teaches sustainable growing practices and seed saving for the future.

In the spring, corn, beans, and squash are planted in blocks. The corn acts as a trellis for the beans. The beans fix nitrogen into the soil for future plantings. The squash plants provide shade around the corn and beans. All the plants work together and are good companions.
