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

Carbon County Fair marks silver anniversary

It's time to celebrate, and the Carbon County Fair committee has a full slate of events for its 25th anniversary.

The fair kicks off Monday, Aug. 5 with a special artist singing the national anthem.

It's 15-year-old Lily Andreas, a sophomore at Lehighton Area High School.

Andreas, who began her musical performances when she was just 8 years old, has sung the national anthem at several high school football and basketball games.

The fair committee will have a 25th anniversary ribbon cutting at 5 p.m., crowning of the fair queen and cake at the conclusion of the ceremony.

All vendors who have been with the fair all 25 years are being honored at the opening ceremony. with fireworks, including silver ones for the special anniversary.

This year, the fair will feature wine, beer and mixed drinks.

Half Barrel Brewery in Franklin Township will be selling draft beers, including Pilsner, Vienna Lager, NEIPA, IPA, Summer Splash (a lemon shanty), blueberry and vanilla.

The brewery has been in business since 2018 and this is the craft brewer's fourth year at the fair.

Holy Ghost Distillery of White Haven will be featuring different drinks every day, with a choice of adult slushies made with vodka, old fashioneds, cosmos, Pocono Rum Punch, Just Jeff, blueberry vodka tonic, rum and Coke, Gin Ricky and Bourbon Ricky.


A daily attraction is the The Globe of Death, a circus and carnival stunt where riders perform motorcycle stunts inside a mesh sphere ball.

Riders in the Globe of Death can loop both vertically and horizontally, and multiple riders can race in different directions at the same time. The forces acting on the riders in the Globe of Death keep them safe inside the ball. When the riders are upside down at the top of the globe, centripetal force is equal to the force of gravity on the rider and motorcycle, plus the normal force exerted by the globe.

Musicians will grace the main stage daily, with nightly attractions including a junk car race, demolition derbies, Palmerton and Lehighton school bands and the return of Micro Wrestling

The fair is located at 3285 Little Gap Road, Palmerton. Hours are 4 to 10 p.m. Monday through Friday and 2 to 10 p.m. Saturday.

Admission is \$7 everyday for everyone 6 years and older. Parking is free.

Celebrating 25 years with a big bang

Pvro Joe will make sure the Carbon County Fair's 25th opening night goes out with a bang.

Joe Pachorkowsky has been putting on fireworks shows professionally for 20 years, but this one is going to be special.

"For us it's a big deal for a number of reasons, Pachorkowsky said. "Literally the first rockets I shot were into the fairgrounds property before it existed.

He grew up on Little Gap Road and his dad worked at Bethlehem Steel. One night his dad came home with a brown Laneco bag and woke him

He could see yellow and blue paper towel-like rolls sticking out of the bag. The equivalent of a salute, they were his first introduction to fireworks.

His dad said, "I don't know what this is but we're going to light it," and they did. It was a big fireball.

"As a kid it shook the earth," Pachorkowsky said. They ran inside as if nothing happened.

He lost his dad in 1997, and in 2003 he decided it was time to become certified so he could shoot off fireworks legally.

On Monday night the Franklin Township resident will shoot off 25 rockets somewhere in the show in honor of the 25th anniversary of the fair and those early years with his dad.

He's been out to fairgrounds measuring and planning for the fallout from the fireworks and making sure all is safe. "It's a lot of planning for something that can literally change in a minute," he said. The wind can shift, the atmosphere can

"It's a yearlong affair," he said.

He plans to shoot a few fireballs, a mixture of gas, black powder and chemicals. He describes it as a mushroom cloud, but on a smaller scale. He figures he'll use 30 gallons of fuel that night.

There will be a lot of willow effects — similar

to a weeping willow tree. He'll have palm trees and tourbillions, a type of whistling star that spins in the sky.

Pachorkowsky said they'll be no shortage of silver fountain fireworks in honor of the fairs silver anniversary.

He buys ready-to-shoot fireworks. "They are getting more and more advanced," he said. And more expensive.

"The costs go up, but budgets stay the same," Pachorkowsky said. "We work with the budget to give people a great show."

Pachorkowsky is retired now and concentrates on his fireworks shows and is also a host for Reading and Northern trains.

Right now he does about 10 shows a year. He does have plans to expand next year but he doesn't want to compromise his competent crew.

On Monday at the fair he'll have 10 people helping, fireworks experts from four different states who've been working together for a few years.

Shooting off fireworks sounds like fun, but Pachorkowsky said

it's kind of miserable. "You're in the field all day baking in the sun, exposed to bug bites, dust and dirt," he said.

When it's time for the show they don hard hats, safety goggles, a long flame retardant coat and boots, no matter how hot the temperatures are

He visits the site ahead of time because Google Earth doesn't give him all the details he needs.

Fireworks are fleeting, but fairgoers can grab some souvenirs.

They'll have a booth at the fair with glow bracelets, other specials and a photo spot. Limited edition fair fireworks posters will be sold at cost.

His wife Mary handles the marketing, the contracts and the booth. He puts in a lot of time with the technical details and says he watches fireworks videos just about every night, which wears on her.

Later this year they are taking the honeymoon they never had and the subject of fireworks is not allowed.

Pachorkowsky said he still looks at swap meets for those vintage fireworks his father introduced him to when he goes to swap meets. He has seen a couple but the colors are not as he remembers them on that first night.

These burgers are sure to be a 'smash' hit

If you like burgers, Bubba's Curbside Cravings is the place to check out at the fair.

But these are not just any old hamburger.

Mike Maacks Sheri Haley, run the Pocono-based food truck.

Maacks said, "These smash burgers are not your regular burgers; they are a different type of burger, meaning that a smash burger is made by smashing the ground beef onto the grill or griddle with a spatula."

Smashing the burger results in a sear on the outside of the meat, which locks in all of the juices and flavor, Maacks explained.

"The ratio of the burger is 80-20, and Bubba's Curbside ensures we have a crisp on every burger because that's the smash burger."

smash burger? One with special sauce.

Bubba's sauce is made with mayonnaise, ketchup, sweet chili sauce, sriracha and spices.

"Bubba's sauce is a little spicy, a little sweet, and a little tangy. It is the perfect balance of flavors for your favorite savory dishes like burgers and chicken."

Originally from Buffalo, New York, Maacks said he always dreamed of owning a food truck, and three years ago he made it happen.

He has a background in fine dining and has recently opened a brick and mortar location at 139 Camelback Road in Tannersville.

Bubba Jay's Smash Burgers and More specializes in smash burgers at both spots.

"We're all about de-What's better than a livering excellence and consistency every gle time," Maacks said. "Whether you visit Bubba's Curbside Food Truck or Bubba Jay's, you can count on getting the same top-notch burger. It's always the best quality.

The Bubba's Double Smasher, for example, is served with two patties on a brioche bun with lettuce, tomato and mavo.

The fair menu is going to feature the four most popular smash burgers, which are the double bacon and mozzarella smasher, the cowboy and smash fries.

The smash fries are a crispy bed of fries covered and layered with cheese, topped with two smash burgers. There will be pickles and onion petals on top.

No wonder the food truck's name includes the

The food truck, by the way, is named after his 6-year-old son, Bubba. And, yes, Maacks hopes he will take over the business one day.

"We want him to be a part of this journey, which is why we named it after him," he said.

His ingredients are always fresh, never frozen.

"Bubba's Curbside will keep you coming back for more, always eager to track us down for your next smash burger fix, Maacks said.



"I have met so many wonderful people and I like to reach out to them with my band," he said. "We are hands-on gladiators raging war with love and peace.

He performed recently at Knoebels, where some of his "greatest fans" enjoyed his original songs as well as sets that included classic rock and music that got his audience singing and dancing.
