Rough Riders buy into the process under new coach

First-year Catasauqua head football coach Joe Henrich is ready to take the first step, and he knows there are more to come.

Henrich has been here before. He took over a Bethlehem Catholic team that had struggled since legendary Bob Stem left. Henrich took over a floundering program in 2011 and built a 67-41 record that included four district title and two state playoff appearances.

With the majority of his 32 Catasauqua players getting inaugural varsity time this fall, Henrich has stated that it will be a true process.

"We're working to create a culture and expectations to be successful," stated Henrich.

"It is a path that begins with the weight room and the offseason workouts. This is something that I have always enjoyed because of the potential for growth.

"We can see the kids are getting into it."

The Rough Rider did lose eight starters from last year's 6-6 team that advanced to the district semifinals. Quarterback Aiden Hess transferred to Northampton, and the rest of the backfield was lost to graduation. Lineman and tackling machine C.J. Beller also is gone.

So, the Roughies will start to restock their cupboard.

Aiden Reilly, who saw limited time last season, will get the start at quarterback.

"Aiden has done a nice job overall," said Henrich. "He is well

capable of running and also has a nice arm. We're excited about his chances."

He'll be joined in the backfield by Ruben Concepcion and Caden Estronza, both of whom will be seeing significant time for their first time.

Jordan Bradshaw, who is currently injured, will head a deep group of wide receivers that includes Manny Bolmer, Jo-Jo LaFond, Tyler Limandri, and Chase Kratochvil.

Up front, Jacob Ramos is back at center and Matt Fotta also returns to provide leadership and experience.

Braeden Smith, Evan Delong, Tavin Ying, and Eli Sandt will see their share of playing time.

Defensively up front, Henrich plans to use a rotation of Ramos, Fotta, Smith, DeLong, and Ying.

In the secondary, Estronza, LaFond, Bradshaw, Limandri, and Bolmer all figure to be in the mix.

Kratochvil, Braden Bartholomew, Chris Wellington, and Juari Wright all will handle

the linebacking corps.

Jon Cordon-Pinto and Jayden Olivencia will handle the kicking duties. The Roughies host Mahanoy Area in their opener, and Henrich is a stranger to the Colonial League.

In a true process, there will be plenty of obstacles to overcome. Catty will have their share. However, Henrich isn't measuring any success on wins and victories. Under former coach Travis Brett, the Roughies were 21-22 in

four years. Before that, they were 12-63 over the previous seven seasons.

"We're young and inexperienced," offered Henrich. "We're learning a new system, and our level of execution needs work."

"I don't know the level of competition in the league and how to compare what we have. We just have to avoid making mental mistakes."

"Our kids will be ready, and we may surprise some people."

The coach has an optimistic and realistic outlook for the season.

"We have some big shoes to fill," offered

Freiler. "But our girls have been working together since winter in tournaments, indoor leagues, and summer leagues to progress.

"They had adjusted and put in the extra work during our off season to make the transition from last year to this year smooth. The

girls are ready to work hard every day, eager to learn, and have created a great team chemistry already. I have a really good feeling about the season.

"Our goal, once again, is to improve on our record from last year and make a district playoff run."

Harth was recently hired as the Rough Riders' head girls' soccer coach, replacing Kayla Cunningham who resigned after three seasons.

His older daughter, Madison, graduated in 2022, and younger daughter, Julia, is a junior on the current roster.

Harth likes the make-up of his club for the fall, as he has six returning seniors back in the fold. Seniors Caroline Rodriguez, Faith Daku, Maya Osorto, and Lily Gacitus; his daughter Julia and other juniors Eva Gomes, and Brooke Barana, and sophomore Ana Ramos-Rodriguez.

Other members are seniors Alicia Avila and Morgan Kessler, juniors Mia Gomes and Eriana Vazquez, sophomore Uyen Li, and freshman Jessica Mankos.

"The girls have worked really hard," stressed Harth. "We weren't too successful scoring last year, but we have a lot of returning seniors.

With some good vibes from their summer workouts, Harth has an initial positive outlook for the season.

"They have responded well to everything we have thrown at them," he said. "We had a good scrimmage, and we expect some good things from them."

For the Catasauqua boys' soccer team, it will be about getting to the postseason.

Last season, the Rough Riders finished with an overall 7-11 record, and they had a postseason berth in their grasp. They won three of their final four regular-season games,

but they had dropped four of their previous five contests.

This season, head coach Josh Inman is confident his team can be in the running for a postseason bid. Inman took over the program before the 2017 season.

"We have a great positive outlook on the season," beamed Inman. "It is mostly because we did

not lose many players from graduation, and believe the newcomers and returnees can fill and improve upon the team. We ended up 0.07 power-ranking points away from a district berth."

Inman likes the core of his seasoned unit.

"I believe we have strong leadership from experienced players and have a good group desire to reach heights that we have not made it to in many years," stressed Inman. "We are working on finding our scoring punch much like in

years past, but we believe we have the group to solve that problem.

"As a team, we believe we are ready to make the step forward and end our program's postseason drought, which has been ongoing since before my coaching tenure."

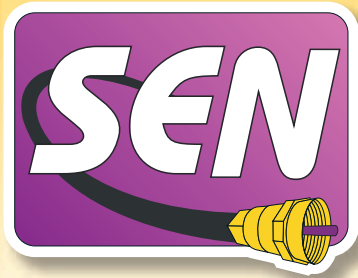
