




Note from the Chairperson

As Pratham Books enters into its second decade, the need for large-scale availability of children's books in mother tongue languages has never been so urgent. Reading skills among children in India are still languishing. The latest ASER report shows that reading skills have declined over a four-year period from 2010 to 2014. It also shows that after the first few years of school, the learning curve remains flat. It is, therefore, absolutely critical to invest in the early grades, when children should be encouraged to read, discuss, and express their thoughts. For this to happen, children need to have lots of engaging, enjoyable supplementary books to read in their own languages. Storybooks help develop children's imagination by introducing new ideas into their world. They foster curiosity, expand their horizons and help children become autonomous learners. This is the single idea upon which Pratham Books was founded.





In our decade-long journey to help stories reach children, we have been fortunate to work with like-minded individuals and organisations. We learnt that with collaboration, we could run the distance we earlier struggled to walk. So, we worked with writers and artists, translators and reviewers, with other publishers and partners, with volunteers and educators – with anyone, actually, who would help us share the magic of reading with children.

This year, we had a range of partnerships that took us further on that path. Ignus ERG, a stellar partner, helped us create a set of primary readers, Adikahani, in four different tribal languages of Odisha. Their on-ground work with tribal communities helped us tap into an age-old oral tradition, and uncover stories that will now travel the length and breadth of the country, perhaps even the world.

ChildFund India reached out to us to help select and distribute half a million books to 38,500 children in 14 states. It was an honour and a delight to be part of a project that created a little home library for each of these children, and started them on their very own reading journey.



Our openly licensed stories, all 450 of them, carved out a path of their own, embarking on journeys to Malaysia, Pakistan and South Africa through partner organisations. New language versions include Sanskrit, Swahili, Dutch, French and Spanish. A couple of American colleges are converting our stories into sign language. And in a breakthrough of sorts, our stories have found their way into ICSE textbooks.

One of our favourite ways of connecting with children has always been through storytelling. Nothing matches the joy of seeing kids lean forward with attention as Takloo tries to solve his mother's problem, or the way their eyes light up when the auto rickshaw begins to fly in Ken Spillman's delightful book. At literature festivals, book fairs and cultural events, we've always enjoyed bringing readers and writers together, and watching the magic take place.

Our flagship community event, 'One Day, One Story' is now a 1300 volunteer-strong movement across India. Hundreds of committed volunteers read a single story to thousands of children on one day, and we're deeply grateful to the storytelling champions of Pratham Books. We were delighted when Madhuri Purandare and Subhadra Sen Gupta, received this year's Bal Sahitya Puraskar awards for their invaluable contribution to children's literature. We are privileged to have had them write stories for Pratham Books over the years.

We are grateful to all our donors who have supported our work and the wonderful team at Pratham Books who has made all this possible.

As you can see, our collaborations have made light work of reaching millions of children. Creative Commons licenses, and the power of technology will only propel us further on the path of collaboration to create more stories, and share their magic with more children and take us further in our mission of seeing "a book in every child's hand".

Original Indian content was the path that Pratham Books chose to reach the millions of children across India who had never read a book for pleasure. Last year, we completed a decade of creating and producing storybooks, and collaborating with partners to share it across the country in pursuit of our mission to place "a book in every child's hand."

The Adikahani Series


In a bid to reach the most disadvantaged children, Pratham Books made its first foray into publishing in tribal languages. In our series for tribal children called Adikahani, we published 10 books and 4 song cards for beginner readers. Odisha, a state with over 62 tribes is paying serious attention to mother tongue education as large numbers of tribal children are coming to formal schools for the first time. Pratham Books, along with content partner Ignus ERG, held an author workshop in Bhubaneswar with tribal communities who spoke Munda, Saura, Kui and Juanga languages and were involved with early childhood education. The stories were illustrated in the Saura mural style in an illustrator's workshop of tribal artists guided by a professional designer. This truly marked a milestone in Pratham Books' journey to reach the last child. The fact that we won the Publishing Innovation of the Year award at the Publishing Next Industry Awards for Adikahani and we got very favourable reviews in the mainstream press were incidental joys. What warmed our hearts to the core was the joy of seeing tribal children read these books.



New genres

We forayed into another new area with our first comic book, *Freedom Run*, which sensitively deals with the issue of child labour. This wonderful story is written by Subhadra Sen Gupta, who won the Bal Sahitya Akademi award for children's literature this year, and is illustrated by Tapas Guha.

We added a pinch of drama with our first ever play for children, *The Boy and the Drum*, based on a folktale, written by Umesh PN and illustrated by Rajiv Eipe. This wonderful play can be performed by children anywhere, anytime and we hope it inspires children and educators alike.






This year, our partners helped us reach newer districts, and provide young readers there with access to a world of books.

ChildFund India

Pratham Books was delighted to be a part of the cause of distributing books to spread the joy of reading and we certainly reinforced our credentials as a publisher with a mission. We worked on an exciting project with ChildFund India where we were the content partner for their project 'Books, my Friends'. Under this program, 38,500 children in 14 states received a mini home library.




A slew of rewarding partnerships:

- Team Everest donated 120 Library-in-a-Classroom kits to government schools in Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Delhi and Jammu & Kashmir.
- · WNS enabled libraries in 107 schools across 5 states.
- Varthana built 250 libraries in schools that they support.
- Swades Foundation set up a library network in Raigad district, Maharashtra, serving 20,000 young readers from 75 government schools.
- World Vision India's 'Support My School' campaign distributed library kits to 8,000 children in Vishakhapatnam, Chittor, Pallakad, Jaipur, Nagpur, Bellary, Jorhat, Gurgaon, and Agra.

Newer horizons

- Idara-e-Talim-O-Agohi (ITA) Pakistan helped our Urdu and English books reach young readers in Pakistan
- We had a special focus on Odisha with the Adikahani project, where 10,000 books were given away to tribal children in Odisha. This project was supported by the Bernard van Leer Foundation.
- Reached another 5,000 children in Odisha through Lokadrishti and the America India Foundation.
- Special A3-sized story cards were created for preschoolers in Sitamarhi, Munger, West Champaran and Kishanganj in Bihar.







PUSHING BOUNDARIES, REACHING OUT TO THE WORLD!

Pratham Books has been actively involved in events and has been an active outreach partner for leading literature festivals in India. We have infused the enthusiasm of literature festivals into schools. Taking authors, illustrators and experts in various fields to schools, we witnessed how the classrooms melted into fun-filled rooms echoing giggles and cheer. We have brought our community closer to our books with author-illustrator meets and storytelling sessions across different cities.

Taking The Bangalore Literature Festival to Classrooms

Pratham Books was the outreach partner for The Bangalore Literature Festival, extending its impact to the classrooms of Bangalore schools. Kids were taken to a different world with captivating storytelling sessions by our authors, Paro Anand, Vijaylakshmi Nagaraj, Mala Kumar. And not just stories, beautiful artworks flooded classrooms through art workshops conducted by well-known illustrators, Soumya Menon and Sangeetha Kadur.

Former Chief Justice Leila Seth at the Bangalore Literature Festival

At the Bangalore Literature Festival, we organized a reading session by Former Chief Justice Leila Seth of the Hindi version of her book – *Hum Bharat ke Bache*, illustrated by the late Bindia Thapar. The book explores the idea of citizenship through the Preamble of the Constitution. Children from two schools and many visitors to BLF listened attentively as Justice Seth went about her session with a generous splattering of stories, both funny and insightful. She also answered questions from the young audience present.



Partnering with the Jaipur Literature festival

Pratham Books has been the outreach partner for the well-known Jaipur Literature Festival, for a few years now. Every year, we expand the boundaries of the festival by taking the magic of books into classrooms in Jaipur. This year, over 43 sessions delighted hundreds of children from government schools, budget private schools and institutions working with special needs children. The sessions included interactive sessions with Pulitzer Prize winning authors, graphic designers and animators, poets, journalists and non-fiction writers, filmmakers and wildlife experts.


Celebrating Daan Utsav with iGate

With full vigour, once again we celebrated 'Daan Utsav' (earlier known as Joy of Giving Week) - a festival of philanthropy with the employees of the IT company, iGate. We conducted an online and offline pledge activity for its employees across various locations of India - Pune, Bengaluru, Chennai, Gandhinagar, Hyderabad, Mumbai and Noida. With the pledge activity held in Mumbai, we were delighted to send out 600 books to two of Mumbai's schools.

Coffee Chat with Sahitya Akademi Award winning authors

This year's Bal Sahitya Puraskar was awarded to two of our authors - Subhadra Sen Gupta and Madhuri Purandare - for their invaluable contribution to children's literature for English and Marathi respectively. To celebrate this, we hosted a coffee chat with the authors, where they shared their views on literature and a Q&A session on writing for children. Our online community was engaged through an online contest where winners were given autographed copies of *Freedom Run* and *Daddy's Mo*.







Today, we are absolutely overwhelmed and proud to witness a community that has grown in leaps and bounds around the reading movement, the seeds for which were sown a decade back.

Our Social Media presence

Our popular blogs www.blog.prathambooks.org and www.champions.prathambooks.org aim at providing insights into the world of publishing, a lens into the world of Pratham Books, and also celebrate our awesome community. We crossed the 10k follower mark on Twitter. Twitter is one of our favourite playgrounds, as we get a chance to discuss ideas with the community, seek help as well as provide support to their work. With an increasing number of followers, we hope to expand our circle of reach to spread the joy of reading to many more children. Facebook acts like a blackboard of sorts - allowing us to showcase the work we do as well as share what we love with an interactive community. A unique contest for content generation by the Community

This was a great year to see community generated content. Our annual *Retell, Remix and Rejoice* contest received 40 new remixed stories. The #6FrameStoryChallenge was our first trial with the community of illustrators. We invited them to create a wordless narrative with 6 illustrations and we were simply spellbound with the response - over 76 wordless stories with 456 unique illustrations!



One Day, One Story

Like every year, this year too we celebrated International Literacy Day, with our 'One Day, One Story' campaign. Over 1300 storytelling champions signed up to conduct 1500+ storytelling sessions across India and the world. *Takloo the little Salt Seller* travelled to over 10 countries and spread smiles among kids - with some help from our Champions.



Remixing - the Creative Commons Way


Our openly licensed books travelled far and wide to reach newer audiences.

- 15,000 books were printed locally in Malaysia and were distributed to the kids by One for One Books. These books also later travelled to Cambodia.
- 4 of our books were translated into Sanskrit by volunteers and they were published by Samskrita Bharati.
- · Many of our books were translated into numerous African languages by the African Storybook Project.
- Our books are part of the National Repository of Open Education Resources.
- Gallaudet University and Swarthmore College are in the process of converting our books into sign language books.
- · Room to Read, South Africa translated one of our books into Swahili and distributed 1000 copies of it.
- Radio Mirchi recorded all language versions of *Takloo, the little Salt Seller* for International Literacy Day and is in the process of recording 19 other books in various languages.
- ReadmyStori and Kartindo used our content to offer e-books to their audience.
- · Bookbox animated our books and made them available in Dutch, Marathi, French and Spanish.
- · Frank Educational Aids used our stories in their ICSE textbooks


Reviews and Media


