







received from various quarters about our books has been very encouraging, what is most gratifying for us is the fact that children have loved our books. No matter where we have gone - be it rural India or urban slums we have been asked by children to produce more books or not to return without them!

In spite of all these positive developments, we still believe that we have much more to achieve. With all of our print runs, we give about a million children access to each of our titles. On the downside, that still leaves about 190 million children in the same age group who are left out. It is clear that we have tapped only a miniscule 0.5% of the total market, and we still have a long way to go. To this end, we have set ourselves an ambitious target of a 10% penetration rate, which means reaching out to at least 20 million children in the next two or three years. This calls for innovative methods of creating more channels of distribution.

ASER 2005 - a nationwide survey conducted on the learning levels of children - facilitated - by Pratham, clearly shows that even after several years in primary school, many children still lack proficiency as readers. Furthermore, the study shows that even older children have unacceptable levels of performance.

While humans have been reading for centuries, skill-sets required for reading have been continuously changing over the last few years. To cite an example, the printed book goes through several rounds of editing before it is printed and reaches the reader. The same is not true of content on the Internet today. The Internet has huge volumes of information on any topic under the sun. And it is up to us to ensure that the books children read impart skills such as finding, sorting, interpreting and evaluating information from a diverse range of media - print or otherwise. While much has

been debated and written about the so called Digital Divide, many organizations both in the government and the private domain - are gearing up to wire schools and libraries with access to technology to bridge this divide. For us, it is imperative to foresee ways to leverage these resources and convert Pratham Books into Pratham e-Books. We hope to have some answers on these issues this year.

Some of the subjects under development at Pratham Books right now include folk tales from all over India and around the world, topics on science and nature, and many more. These are being taught through inspiring stories that children would love to read. Of critical importance to early readers is and will continue to be our 'Shishuvachan' series of books. The year gone by has seen us publish a dozen of them and we have another 25 books in this series on the drawing board. We hope this will help steer more children into the habit of reading at a very early age.



Sampurna Murthi, a regional manager for Pratham Books in North India, recounts her experience while distributing books in New Delhi that were donated by Wells Fargo Bank. More than 20,000 copies of Pratham Books were distributed free of cost to children across the country.

On Friday, November 25, 2005, the Pratham Books team from Delhi learnt a lesson about the weight of books and its inverse relationship with the durability of cartons. Says Sampurna Murthi, "We were to go to MCD School, Block O, Dilshad Garden in the east of Delhi to distribute books to the children of classes 1 - 5."

The cartons containing 3,860 copies of books were too heavy to be carried out of our basement office with limited person power and without the possibility of the cartons disintegrating under their own weight! In the end, we opened them up and carried the sets out to stack them up in the vehicle whichever way we could, and set off on our long haul to east Delhi. This effort was part of the donation given by Wells Fargo to distribute books to children in five cities in selected schools to encourage them to read.

When we reached the school, with the help of eager staff and student volunteers, we unloaded our books in record time (quite a different story from how we loaded them). One of the senior teachers welcomed us formally and spoke about the support the school had been getting through the Pratham programme.



The distribution went off without a hitch and the loud 'Thank Yous' and smiles on the faces of the children were most gratifying. We asked them to give us feedback on the books and our other titles as well so that we could continue to create books that added value to the educational journey of children.


BOOKS The Once Upon an India series launched by Pratham Books offers an interesting blend of fact and fiction


