QUINCY'S EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL PATHWAY

Quincy's Early College High School (ECHS) Pathway is a cohort-based program that provides students the opportunity to earn up to 22 college credits while still in high school, at no cost to families. ECHS students receive robust academic support during their ECHS experience that will better position them to be successful in college and their future career. ECHS begins in grade 10.

The program is made possible by the partnership between Quincy College, Quincy Public Schools, State Street Foundation, and Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.

89 students from Quincy's ECHS Pathway graduated from North Quincy High School and Quincy High School on June 10 and 11. Many of these students enter their post-secondary careers with up to 25 college credits already under the belts – some with over 34 credits thanks to additional opportunities, like the dual enrollment initiative and ECHS Summer Academy, that the program provides.

As the graduation of the Class of 2024 is celebrated, the ECHS staff is filled with immense pride for the seniors. Not only are they the first graduating cohort of Quincy's ECHS Pathway, but they began their high school journey during the height of a global pandemic and faced unprecedented challenges. In their sophomore year, they came together in person, forging new relationships and building a supportive community, many in Quincy's ECHS Pathway. ECHS CRIMINAL JUSTICE CLASS VISITS PRISON



Mr. Edgerly's 10th grade Introduction to Criminal Justice class toured the Old Colony Correctional Facility in Bridgewater in late May. Students learned about the corrections system in Massachusetts and heard from members of *Project Youth*, a staff supervised program in which inmates discuss their personal experiences and consequences that resulted in incarceration. Exposing students to a variety of guest speakers and field trips in the criminal justice field enriches the curriculum of this popular ECHS course.

ECHS SENIORS TAKE THE LEAD ON SERVICE PROJECTS



Early College Seniors at both QHS and NQHS engaged in Capstone Senior Service Projects. From December 2023 to April 2024 students brainstormed, designed, proposed, tweaked and implemented community service projects of their own design in collaboration with Appointed to Lead. ECHS English Composition 2 teachers Mr. Merrigan (NQHS) and Mr. Pratt (QHS) integrated the project within their classes and ECHS College Transition Coaches Mrs. Bobrov (NQHS) and Mr. Stewart (QHS) supported students as they developed and implemented their projects. In total, 18 groups conducted distinct and impactful service projects. On April 26, they presented their service project outcomes, along with reflections on how they had grown as leaders, to a panel of Quincy College judges who selected the most impactful service project from each school. We are extremely proud of the impact all of our ECHS seniors had on their community through this process. Our students served in a variety of ways, from creating and distributing feminine health products to every QPS middle school, to cleaning up local parks and beaches, and even conducting a youth basketball clinic.



COACHES' CORNER

This spring, the ECHS Academic Coaches (Ms. Torres, above left, and Ms. Mason) administered the Accuplacer College Placement Test (CPT) to grade 11 ECHS students. The CPT was used to gauge the students' current college readiness in Math and English. The data collected from the test results will be used as a tool for evaluating the knowledge gaps to help support students in the future to ensure college readiness by graduation. The coaches were proud of all the students and the effort they put into the exam. Test results will be shared with the ECHS Statistics and English teachers to assess any necessary steps that need to be taken next year to support the students' learning.



ECHS STAFF CHANGES



Kara Bobrov will be leaving Quincy's ECHS Pathway in July to take on a new role at Quincy College as Director of Institutional Advancement.

NQHS alum **Dan Gould**, who has been Assistant Athletic Director at NQHS for the past two years, will replace Mrs. Bobrov as ECHS College Transition Coach.

Marianne Collins, Head of the Career & Tech Education Department, will teach the new grade 9 Introduction to Early College course as well as the grade 9 ECHS Introduction to Computers class. She has been teaching at NQHS for ten years.

While she will remain at QHS, Anna
Petcosky will no longer be teaching ECHS
Statistics due to scheduling changes. She
will continue to be involved in the grade
12 ECHS Quincy College visitations where
she will oversee and help facilitate the
curriculum of the Statistics class.

Roger Bacchieri, who has been teaching for 21 years (20 years at QHS) will become the new Statistics teacher for grade 12 ECHS students at QHS. Prior to teaching, he spent six years in the Air Force working with satellites and drones.

Corey Spellman will teach the new grade 9 Introduction to Early College course and the grade 9 ECHS Introduction to Computers class. She has been teaching for ten years, the past two at QHS. She previously taught at Avon Middle High School and Marlborough High School.
