Reflecting on the past 12-18 months, I am grateful for a small but wonderfully important part of the role I have as Executive Director at Riverside. This bittersweet responsibility is not expressly in my job description and was not something I realized would be a part of my position, but it is something that impacts me in important ways. Every time I encounter this calling, I find myself re-focused, re-energized, and reminded of how important the experiences can be that individuals have when they participate in ministry at Riverside.

Throughout my twenty years as Director, I have had the honor and privilege of interacting with the families of those whose loved ones are now safe in the arms of Jesus. To quote precisely from my most recent interaction just a few weeks ago, a family took great comfort in knowing their loved one "is now safe in the arms of her Lord and Savior." Annina Wilson came to Riverside decades ago as a child and teenager because Roma Twist (former Camp Director) believed it was important that she and her eight siblings hear the Gospel of Christ. He picked them up and ensured that they would have an experience here that would last a lifetime.

Often, the interactions I have are with families whose loved ones spoke fondly of their time at Riverside decades ago. Sometimes, as was the case this past year, my interactions are with families whose loved one experienced Riverside as a child only a few short years ago. Those who are called home early make for especially emotional experiences, and I am reminded of the importance of Riverside and the urgency required as we go about the work He has set before us.

Josh's experience at Riverside was primarily as a participant in RSI, our teen summer staff program. Although he had only 24 short years, he spent a portion of five or six of those

summers serving at Riverside.

For years, Todd served alongside us, helping provide family camp experiences. In addition to preaching at many of our events, Todd's passion was Christian bookstore materials, which he supplied to our camp store for many years.

Like Todd, there are Jean, Carol, and Lorraine, to name just a few. They are all wonderful examples of how God orchestrated amazing and impactful experiences at Riverside.



Zarephath


The buildings at Riverside get their names from important historical figures and significant places all found in the Bible. Hebron, Gaza, Ruth, Joseph... some names are more widely recognized than others. Do you know the story associated with Zarephath? It's not one of the more common locations talked about in Sunday school, not like Bethlehem or Nazareth - but God performed miracles in Zarephath too.

In 1 Kings 17, Elijah befriends a widow at the Lord's command during a draught. This widow and her son resided in the city of Zarephath and were very poor when Elijah met them. During his first conversation with her, Elijah learns that they are down to their very last bit of flour and oil and will soon starve. He asks her to make him a small loaf of bread and he delivers God's message that the flour and oil will not run out until God sends rain to end the draught.

When Paul was writing to the Corinthians regarding the money they were collecting for the starving saints in Jerusalem, he said "each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as he may prosper..." And in Acts, we are told that the disciples in Antioch "determined, every one according to his ability, to send relief to the brothers living in Judea."

God doesn't ask us to give what we don't have; He expects us to give in proportion to what we have been given. •



No surprise, God is true to His word and the flour and oil last. Some time later, the son falls gravely ill. Eventually, he stops breathing and Elijah carries him to the upper room of the widow's home. Laying him on the bed, Elijah cries out to God to return the boy's life. Then, the widow watches Elijah carry her son back down the stairs and proclaim that he is again alive. She praises God and trusts the word spoken by Elijah as God's

The account of the widow in Zarephath is a powerful example of God's provision. Whether it's manna, loaves & fishes, or oil & flour, our God provides. And it is still true today! No matter the bumps along the road, God continues to provide for the construction of Zarephath. There is still much work to be done, but we are grateful for and overjoyed by the progress so far!



Sharing what God has done for us in our specific circumstances and what He did on the cross for all are extremely powerful tools to minister to and disciple others.

There were also some fun and creative activities for families to participate in. These included a beautiful craft to take home with their family portrait in it, fun games each night (like 'counselor hunt'), and a pumpkin boat building and racing competition! The pumpkin boats were especially engaging because families got to carve a pumpkin or two into whatever type of boat or boat-like creation they could imagine. Some boats resembled Viking ships and others were beyond comparison to any sailing vessels made before. Many boats sailed and many boats were sunk in the Tomorrow River that Saturday, but there was no lack of excitement as kids and parents proudly watched their creations float down the river. Some families even took their ships home to display, whether

they won their race or not!

It's always heartwarming to see that families don't want to leave when check out time comes on Sunday, parents chatting away while kids run off to play. We are so grateful to have been able to serve them through this fun fall weekend!
