

PLANNING A FUNERAL AT EMMANUEL

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INTRODUCTION

This customary is intended as a guide to planning for the Burial of the Dead as it is prescribed in The Book of Common Prayer. The Prayer Book allows several options for the shape of the burial office. Planning for the service beforehand will allow you to express your wishes, will give you a sense of peace in knowing that the end of your mortal life will marked by an observance you have helped to shape, and it will give your family and loved ones the assurance that they are offering an act of care and love for you by carrying out your wishes. This booklet is intended to be used in consultation with your parish clergy, your family and loved ones.

THE CHURCH IS HERE TO HELP

The Book of Common Prayer counsels, "When a person is near death, the Minister of the Congregation should be notified, in order that the ministrations of the Church may be provided" (BCP 462). The Prayer Book also teaches us that baptized Christians are properly buried from the church, and the service should be held at a time when the congregation can be present (BCP 468). We also read that, "The death of a member of the Church should be reported as soon as possible" (BCP 468).

In times of serious illness, when death seems near, or when a death has occurred, please contact the Rector of Emmanuel, the Rev. Matthew Rowe, at any time of day or night. He may most easily be reached by mobile phone (the number is in the church directory) or by email. The parish office phone number is (325) 653-2446, and his extension is 1001.

MINISTRIES THE CHURCH PROVIDES

- ❖ BCP 453 Ministration to the Sick: readings from Holy Scripture, prayer, anointing with oil and Holy Communion.
- ❖ BCP 462 Ministration at the Time of Death: prayer for a person near death, Litany at the Time of Death, and a Commendation at the Time of Death.
- ❖ BCP 465 Prayers for a Vigil: a time for family and friends to gather for prayers prior to the funeral. In some places this is called the Wake, and is a time for offering sympathy and solace to the bereaved by being present with them, sharing stories of witness to the good the deceased contributed to the world in this life, and even for the raising of a glass in memory of the departed.
- ❖ BCP 469ff The Burial Office: the service can be in the traditional language of Rite I or the contemporary language of Rite II. Holy Communion is appropriate for those who in life were active Communicants of the parish.

Fees and Honoraria

- Columbarium niche for the interment of cremated remains is \$350 in the bell tower or \$390 in the Memorial Garden.. Arrangements for a niche must be made in advance by contacting the church office.
- Sexton fee: \$100 to open, clean, and close the church. \$50 to open and close the columbarium.
- Altar flowers are generally provided by the family. The florist who knows Emmanuel the best is Stemmed Design, 135 W. Twohig Ave., Ste. E, San Angelo, TX 76903. 325.656.3889.

- ❖ The family may wish to have the floor candelabra to flank the altar. The cost for this is \$100, to cover the cost of the 42 candles needed and set up time for the Sexton.
- ❖ The family may wish to have votive candles in the window sills of the church. The cost for this is \$50, to cover the cost of candles and set up time for the Sexton.

- ❖ If the choir presents music at the service, there is a fee of \$40 for each of the student choral scholars who participate.
- Suggested Honoraria
 - ➤ Organist \$150
 - Choir Fund (if the choir sings for the service) \$100
 - ➤ Live Stream Video (if utilized)-\$100
 - > Operating Fund (for printing of service leaflets) \$50
 - > Funeral Guild (for a church reception) \$100
 - > Altar Guild (for setting the altar) \$100
 - ➤ Officiating Clergy (at the family's discretion. Clergy honoraria go to the Discretionary Fund and are used for benevolent purposes)

Checks for fees and honoraria should be addressed to Emmanuel Episcopal Church, with the intention noted on the memo line. When advising family and friends about memorial offerings, the Memorial Fund is an appropriate designation for such gifts.

OFFICIATING CLERGY

The Rector of Emmanuel is in charge of all funeral arrangements, and is considered to be the Officiant or Celebrant of the liturgy. If the family wishes to invite another member of the clergy to assist, the Rector must grant permission. If the family wishes another member of the clergy to officiate, the Rector must grant permission.

Military Honors

Those who have served our nation in the military are entitled to military honors as part of the funeral service. The church is happy and honored to include such ceremonies in the funeral. The funeral director typically makes the arrangements to have the honor guard present.

THEOLOGY OF CHRISTIAN BURIAL

In our particular expression of the Christian faith, we observe the liturgy for one who has died as an Easter event, finding all its meaning in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Because he was raised from the dead, we, too, shall be raised (BCP 507). The liturgical color of the burial office is

therefore white, or the festive tapestry altar paraments. The Easter emphasis is also supported by the bearing of the lighted Paschal Candle, the symbol of our Lord's Easter triumph over the powers of death, as the body is borne into and out of the church.

The Book of Common prayer teaches us that, "While the liturgy is characterized by joy, in the certainty that 'neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord' (Romans 8:38-39). This joy, however, does not make human grief unchristian. The very love we have for each other in Christ brings deep sorrow when we are parted by death. Jesus himself wept at the grave of his friend. So, while we rejoice that one we love has entered into the nearer presence of our Lord, we sorrow in sympathy with those who mourn" (BCP 507).

DECORATING THE CHURCH

- Candles the only candles permitted are those normally used for worship services at Emmanuel. These include the altar candles, the 42 candle candelabra, votive lights in the windows. The Paschal Candle is always used for a funeral. No other candle displays are permitted.
- ❖ Altar Paraments the normal color for the altar paraments is white or festive tapestry, to emphasize the Easter faith that is central to the theology of Christian burial.
- ❖ Flowers The family is usually responsible for the altar flowers, which can be arranged through the Stemmed Design florist shop. A floral spray may be placed on the floor in front of the table that holds the cremated remains. A floral spray may also be placed on the casket at the graveside, but the casket will be covered by a pall, or if desired, the U.S. flag for military veterans, during the service in the church. Other flowers sent in sympathy will be placed in the narthex or may be brought to the reception.
- Secular symbols that may have been important to the departed may not be placed in the church, and are better suited to be displayed at the Vigil or the reception that follows the service.

CHOOSING THE APPROPRIATE SERVICE

The choice to use the traditional language of Rite I or the contemporary language of Rite II is offered at Emmanuel. Either is acceptable. On occasions when neither order is deemed appropriate for pastoral reasons, The Book of Common Prayer provides *An Order for Burial* that begins on page 506. The service requires careful planning with the Rector or the Minister who is to officiate, and a sufficient pastoral reason why one of the rites provided in the prayer book must be demonstrated.

Holy Communion is especially appropriate for those who have been active communicants of the church. As they were regularly nourished by the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood, so the church should partake of that most heavenly food at the funeral of an active member, for it is a foretaste of the banquet being prepared for us in God's eternal and everlasting kingdom. When Holy Communion is celebrated at a funeral, it is for the entire congregation, and all baptized Christians, regardless of denomination, are invited to receive it.

The homily is a theological reflection on the life of the deceased and on the meaning of life and death in light of the death and resurrection of Jesus. It is most appropriately offered by the Celebrant, or another member of the clergy. It is not intended to be a "eulogy" with the sharing of anecdotes about the life of the deceased. Those are best shared at the Vigil, described in the list of ministries the Church provides. The Rite II burial office allows for a family member or friend to offer the homily, but this can only be done in careful consultation with the Minister who is to officiate.

THE RECEPTION OF THE BODY

❖ With a casket The funeral car arrives at the main church entrance. The funeral director waits to remove the coffin from the car until the following have arrived: members of the family, clergy, and pallbearers. Once all is in readiness, the casket is removed from the car and borne by the pallbearers to the main landing of the church steps. The casket is placed on the carriage. The Celebrant leads the prayers for the reception of the body. The altar guild places the pall

- (or U.S. flag when appropriate) over the coffin. The coffin remains on the church steps until the entrance procession.
- * With cremated remains The remains are carried to the main church entrance and placed on a stand or table in the narthex. Family members gather with the Celebrant, who places a pall over the urn and leads the appointed prayers. The urn remains in the narthex until the entrance procession.

OLD TESTAMENT READINGS (Choose One)

Isaiah 25:6-9

On this mountain the LORD of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-aged wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well-aged wines strained clear. And he will destroy on this mountain the shroud that is cast over all peoples, the sheet that is spread over all nations; he will swallow up death forever. Then the Lord GOD will wipe away the tears from all faces, and the disgrace of his people he will take away from all the earth, for the LORD has spoken. It will be said on that day, Lo, this is our God; we have waited for him, so that he might save us. This is the LORD for whom we have waited; let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation.

Isaiah 61:1-3

The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the LORD's favor, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn; to provide for those who mourn in Zion--to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit. You press upon me behind and before * and lay your hand upon me. Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; * it is so high that I cannot attain to it. Where can I go then from your Spirit? * where can I flee from your presence? If I climb up to heaven, you are there; * if I make the grave my bed, you are there also. If I take the wings of the morning * and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea, Even there your hand will lead me * and your right hand hold me fast. If I say, "Surely the darkness will cover me, *

and the light around me turn to night,"

Darkness is not dark to you; the night is as bright as the day; *
darkness and light to you are both alike.

NEW TESTAMENT EPISTLE READINGS (Choose One)

Romans 8:14-19,34-35,37-39

All who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ-- if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him. I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

1 Corinthians 15:20-26,35-38,42-44,53-58

In fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has destroyed every ruler and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death. But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body

do they come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body. So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. For this perishable body must put on imperishability, and this mortal body must put on immortality. When this perishable body puts on imperishability, and this mortal body puts on immortality, then the saying that is written will be fulfilled: "Death has been swallowed up in victory." "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my beloved, be steadfast, immovable, always excelling in the work of the Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labor is not in vain.

2 Corinthians 4:16--5:9

We do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal. For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. For in this tent we groan, longing to be clothed with our heavenly dwelling-- if indeed, when we have taken it off we will not be found naked. For while we are still in this tent, we groan under our burden, because we wish not to be unclothed but to be further clothed, so that what is mortal may be swallowed up by life. He who has prepared us for this very thing is God, who has given us the Spirit as a guarantee. So we are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord-- for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yes, we do have confidence,

and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him.

1 John 3:1-2

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is.

Revelation 7:9-17

I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying, "Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!" And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, singing, "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen." Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, "Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?" I said to him, "Sir, you are the one that knows." Then he said to me, "These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them. They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."

And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "See, the home of God is among mortals. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away." And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new." Also he said, "Write this, for these words are trustworthy and true." Then he said to me, "It is done! I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. To the thirsty I will give water as a gift from the spring of the water of life. Those who conquer will inherit these things, and I will be their God and they will be my children."
