Political System

Democratic republic, bicameral parliamentary regime

Head of State: Michael D. Higgins (Labour Party) since November, 2011 (re-elected for a second mandate of 7 years after the elections on October 26th 2018).

Prime Minister (Taoiseach): Simon Harris (Fine Gael) since April 9th 2024, following the announcement of Leo Varadkar's resignation on March 20th 2024. Following a political threeparty agreement from June 27th 2020, the Irish government is composed of the Green Party, Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael.

Bi-cameral legislative system:

the Dáil Éireann (House of Representatives), made up of 160 members who are elected for five years by direct universal suffrage

the Seanad Éireann (Senate), of which 60 members are either elected by indirect universal suffrage or are appointed by the Taoiseach (Prime Minister)
