Villaggio to Host Ellicottville Little Eagles Fundraiser Dinner

Too many years ago to count (late '70s), I remember selling hot dogs in front of what was then known as the Ellicottville Inn (now Ellicottville Inn Condos) during Fall Festival. It was one of those years when the snow fell early and we stood ankle deep in the cold stuff doing what we had to do to make money for our Little League football players. I was just a Little League mom, but we all did our share to raise funds for our kids to play.

Today, The Ellicottville Little Eagles players and cheerleaders number about 100. The Little Eagles Board is responsible for recruiting players and cheerleaders, outfitting them (except for shoes), equipping them (pads, helmets, etc.), providing concessions, insuring them, and paying necessary organizational fees. In other words, it may take a village to fill a team of young players, but it takes a conscientious board with a good amount of money to safely put those youngsters on the field, properly equipped.



Thanks to the generosity of Nick Pitillo at Villaggio Restaurant, a pasta dinner fundraiser will be held on Wednesday, January 8th from 5:30-8:00pm. Dinner includes pasta, salad, roll, soda or water for adults \$15, kids \$10 and little ones under two are free. Takeouts will be available and there is a cash bar. According to Griffith, it costs less for our kids to come onboard than it does for most other leagues. Check them out and involve your young ones in a lifetime sport. There are three age groups: Flag (ages 6-8), Pee Wee (ages 8-10), and Midget (ages 10-12).

Here's the Paul Harvey moment, with The Rest of the Story... Nick Pitillo grew up playing little league football back in the late 70s when I was selling hot dogs in the snow. His parents, Mike and Joanny turned out to be a vital part of the backbone of the new, emerging Ellicottville, and his siblings, Michael, Frankie, and Kim all shared in that evolution. From an ellicottvilleNOW story some Octobers ago, Spencer Timkey told this story about Nick talking about his brother Frankie: "My brother was an entrepreneur and ran a clam stand outside of the Nail (The Rusty Nail, a former bar in town). He went out on his motorcycle and unfortunately never came home. So, Frank had a couple grand in his bank account, and my old man asked what we should do with the money."

"YOUR TURN"

Another returning event that's popular amongst the lady shredders is the Your Turn Women's Ski Clinic, a women's exclusive ski school taught by Lisa Ballard, an accomplished snowsports athlete, commentator, writer, and overall powerhouse and trailblazer in women's athletics. Holiday Valley is receiving the clinic once again this season from February 24-25th.

"\$379 gets you instruction with Lisa Ballard, breakfast, lunch, one night of dinner, and a happy hour," Dash shared. "Demo equipment, lectures, and video analysis too. The price doesn't include lift tickets but those can be purchased the day of the event at the lift ticket window for a discounted promotional price."

Dash thinks that holding this space every year for women to collaborate and improve their skiing together is so important because snowsports needs to be inclusive for everyone. That mentality alone has even helped Dash in his own career. "I've been lucky

"At that point, very few schools had lights for their football fields," Pitillo said. "Frank, a star on the football team, was doubling up his junior and senior years at Ellicottville Central to graduate early and go train with the United States Ski Team - as the #1 ranked junior skier in the country." The Pitillo family mobilized the local community to raise the rest of the money to light up the football field. "We had this huge spaghetti dinner," Nick said. "A ton of heavies from that time came to help us raise money. Danny Gare and Terry Martin, legendary members of the Buffalo Sabres, and Paul Seymour from the Buffalo Bills, amongst others. After we had raised enough money, my dad and other members of the community installed them at no expense. They held me up in my little league football jersey and I turned them on for the first time."

As our kids are apt to do, Nick went off to chase his dreams, married and returned, first to Buffalo to establish his restaurant Osteria and then, in 2015, he packed up his wife, Kendra, and daughter, Olivia, and came home to Ellicottville. Sitting in the bleachers watching a game of his daughter's at that same ECS field, he realized that the lights







MEETING NOTES

VILLAGE OF ELLICOTTVILLE IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Following Public Hearing Centered Around Short-Term Rentals, Mayor Highlights Segment on WKBW; Gives Praise to Village Crews

A special evening occurred for the Village of Ellicottville as they hosted a Public Hearing in addition to their regularly scheduled Board meeting. The topics discussed included Cannabis Dispensary Zoning, Sewer Rate Increase, and the Short-term Rental Permit Fee increase.

Starting off with the Public Hearing, the Board welcomed residents, renters, and taxpayers of the Village to join in as they discussed the topics of concern. (It should be noted that the subjects of the Cannabis Zoning Regulation and Sewer Rate Increase were not open for discussion. They were, however, available to gauge the public's interest.) It was agreed by the Board to drop the 200-foot Cannabis Dispensary setback pertaining only to retail.

There will be a 25% increase to the sewer rates, which ends up being an additional \$5 a month. The quarterly rate was set at \$60 and that will go up to \$75 moving forward. For seniors that hold their permanent residence in the Village of Ellicottville, the increase will be from \$30 to \$37.50.

For the hot topic of Short-term Rentals... The Village is set to increase the permit fee for Short-term Rentals and while numbers have been thrown around, a decision has yet to be made. One of the key takeaways from the Public Hearing was to address the common concerns involving short-term rentals and that ultimately to better enforce these problems, an increase must be made to balance that cost. With over 50 people in attendance, and a dozen of those speaking about their experiences, the room reflected responsible residents and local short-term rental owners. They agree that some of the largest issues lie with non-local short-term rental owners that ignore Village laws and guidelines. In order to best enforce these issues, the Village will have to increase the permit price but has yet to determine what that amount will be. The Village Board will have a Special Committee Meeting on January 14th to further discuss the permit pricing and feedback they received. They would like to thank those who were present that took the time to show their genuine care for the quality of life in the Village of Ellicottville.

Moving on to the topics surrounding the regular meeting, the Board began discussions regarding the evening's agenda. With plenty of positive points to share, Good News was brought to the floor. A new Executive Director has been named for the Ellicottville Chamber of Commerce. The Village Board congratulates Barb Pump on the position.

The news station WKBW aired a promotion highlighting Ellicottville, NY and all agreed that it was very well received.

A great start to the season, both ski resorts - Holiday Valley and HoliMont - were able to kick off their opening days with nearly perfect conditions. It brings a lot of excitement and of course visitors to the area who were ready to enjoy a fun filled day on the slopes.

Approval of the previous month's meeting minutes went through without issue, as did the Financial Report. Next up we heard the Mayor's Report which included an exciting announcement - the official appointment of Amy Hayward as Village Clerk and Treasurer. Congratulations to Mrs. Hayward to all that she has worked toward and continues to do to benefit the Village of Ellicottville!

The new sewer billings are ready to be mailed out starting this January and will be sent in the format of postcard. They will also include the dates for large garbage pickup in the Village.

All Department reports were presented to the Board and approved without issue. Some of the information shared included an engineering update on the completion of the Elizabeth Street Project. Locals have shared their positive feedback, and the Village now looks to add some additional signage to minimize trucks from using the residential street as a route.

The Engineering Department will also be conducting a parking analysis on the amount of parking spaces available and their usage within the business area of the Village.

High praise has come in for the Department of Public Works (DPW) as we recognize all their hard work in keeping the sidewalks clear and safe. They have had a very busy start to this winter season, and it has not gone unnoticed. As their efforts continue, we'd like to thank them for a job well done.

As the evening came to a close, Mayor John Burrell called the meeting to adjourn. They will reconvene in January to further discuss the needs of the Village of Ellicottville. Updates and announcements can always be found at www.ellicottvillegov.com.

The Town Board of Ellicottville gathered for their last meeting of 2024 on December 18th. Following the busy Short-term Rental Public Hearing of November, this month's agenda reflected on updating current project plans and finalizing reports to prepare for the new year.

and the necessary tools to achieve those goals. It can offer shared guidance for public and private development that reflects the best interests within an area. For the Town of Ellicottville, the suggestion was made to form a committee with a cross section of members which would include those from the Town Board, Planning Board, Zoning Board of Appeals, along with community representatives.

To start the evening, Deputy Steve Crowley called the meeting to order as Supervisor Matt McAndrew joined by phone. The first topic to be discussed was the approval of the November 20th Board meeting minutes, followed by the approval of the current Town billing reports. Also accepted without issue, the Supervisor's report was approved with talks then shifting to the Department Heads.

The Police Department, led by Officer-in-Charge Jim Bouchard, has had a busy season; with events, patrolling, and staffing, they continue to serve the community diligently. OIC Bouchard was happy to then announce to the Town Board the hiring of a new officer, James Smerka, who has begun training. Congratulations and welcome to the force!

The Highway Department has been hard at work, keeping up with this season's snow coverage and Town road upkeep. This month's heavy snowfalls have kept the Town crew plowing streets and clearing snow at a fast pace. Scot Brumagin, department head, is hoping to add an employee to offset concerns of short staffing and encourages serious applicants to apply. Moving on to the Town Planner's report, Greg Keyser addressed the short-term rental zoning amendment that is currently in the works. The short-term rental committee met, and during their discussions they aimed to review and revise the current local law in place. A drafted update is being made to be presented to the Town Board at the January regular meeting.

The Planning Board has reviewed the current Comprehensive Plan and believes a considerable update is in order. A comprehensive plan provides a future vision of a community Continuing in the evening's talks, Board members then heard from the Engineering Department. A bid was made for the Town Hall Door project and is currently being reviewed. The hope is to replace the front door with one that matches the character of the 1829 Washington Street building.

New business regarding the annual Organizational Meeting was directed to the Board as they then agreed to set a date for January 2, 2025. During this time the Town Board will address policy matters, routine appointments for public offices and additional formalities.

Old business brought some positive updates to the Board's attention. The EVGV Trail has continued in their fundraising efforts and is now receiving support from GObike, the Western New York organization that connects communities through mobile activity.

Another previous matter that was discussed, Town Attorney Seth Pullen is continuing to coordinate with the Village Attorney to draft a new law that will allow the Town and Village of Ellicottville to have the same regulations and rules regarding noise law. If successful, the new adaptation could help solve confusion on how and where enforcements are made.

Wrapping up the evening's agenda, the Town Board received two correspondences thanking them for their support in regards to two separate efforts. The positive exchange was noted by the Board as discussions came to a close. The meeting was called to adjourn, and the Town Board will gather again on the third Tuesday of January. Breakaway Classic Adventures: A Cabin Fever Remedy

All deer hunting will be over January 1, 2025, so what will you do after the season ends and what will you do with your deer? (Hopefully you got one.) Well here is an idea. Besides the venison which we all savor, the deer's hide is also of value, especially to a fisherman. For the fly fisherman, the natural properties of deer hair make it ideal for spinning around a hook and creating famous flies like the Dahlberg Diver, the infamous Mouse, the Muddler Minnow, the Bomber and the Green Machine, to name a few. The common element in these flies is that they float due to the hollow cavity inside the deer hair that traps air.

The tail, more commonly known as the "Bucktail," is used in the making of streamer-type flies, especially large ones for musky and pike. Regular fishermen can add Bucktail hair to their lures; to spinners for musky, to jigs for bass and walleye and dressing up the rear hook of some wooden plugs for pike.

As one hunter/fisherman states, "Having processed my own whitetail hides for 20 years, I am still amazed at the uniqueness of the hair on each whitetail deer."

The flair quality of the deer hair makes it much better than other animal furs and depending on where on the hide the hair is taken, it can vary in length and thickness - critical in tying small flies like the Hair Wing of the caddis fly (elk hair is also widely used for the caddis fly). Hair from the head or legs is short while back, sides, and belly have longer and coarser hair.

If you yourself aren't a fly fisherman, then maybe one of your friends are, so ask around if they want your hide. If you are looking for a great hobby this winter, fly tying is one of the best! You will save a ton of money by tying your own flies or even make you some money on the side. Fly fishermen are always looking for unusual flies, so if you are good at tying deer hair and Bucktail flies, people will find you. List them on eBay or other similar sites and you could make \$3-\$5 per one of your hand-tied flies. Not that you'll ever get rich doing this, but you will stay out of trouble, sane, and out of the funny farm over those long winter months.

To tie flies, you'll need to have the following fly tying tools: a fly tying vise, a bobbin to hold your spool of thread, scissors that are sharp with sharp points, a whip finisher to finish tying the thread on the head of the fly, hair stackers, hackle pliers, bobbin threader, and a dubbing needle.

Materials that you will need: some tying thread, your deer hair, hackle or bird feathers, and epoxy to hold everything together. Although there are literally thousands of different fly tying materials and catalogues displaying them in dozens of different colors, a fly only requires either a hair or feather body to start with.

Finally, you will need hooks to tie the material to. Although any hook will do, the size, shape and style will be dependent on what fish you are tying the fly for. For example, large saltwater fish require large 1/0 to 5/0 hooks, while the trout fisherman will go as small as a #20. For general purposes, a 2-12 size of hook will catch most of your salmon, trout, pike, bass and panfish.

There are many books, DVDs and internet Youtube videos that will teach you to tie flies, so I won't go into that here, but keep in mind that the simplest fly that just takes a few minutes to tie will sometimes out-fish the classic salmon fly that takes many painstaking hours to tie. If you spend more than five minutes tying one fly, then you are tying flies for show rather than for fishing. You may be crushed when that fly snags on the bottom of the river or lake and you are forced to break it off. The less time that you put into your flies will save you considerable heartbreak.



The fly tying vise is your most important piece of equipment that you'll buy for fly tying. Don't be fooled by all the bells and whistles when shopping for a vise; you'll need to become a master tyer to effectively use all of them on an expensive one. On the other hand, a cheap or inexpensive vise will certainly be poorly constructed and will lead to frustration and possibly lead to you giving up the hobby.

The jaws of the vise need to be well manufactured of hardened steel that are precise - not too soft as to leave a groove from a hardened hook, but not so hard that they are brittle and will crack if over tightened. Sometimes vises will have three types of removable or interchangeable jaws: fine, medium and large jaws for those big 5/0 flies.

The tightening devise or method for closing the jaws around the hook is where most vises fail, and rather than giving you a lifetime of use, may only last one or two years. Normally there is a locking method that requires the tightening of a threaded bolt. Poorly made vises use cheap metal that can easily break or the threads can get stripped. If you can't hold a hook 100% still in the jaws, you'll throw up your arms in frustration and start pulling out your own hair.

The last piece of equipment will be some sort of table light with a magnifying glass built into it. If you don't already require reading glasses, you will shortly after you start fly tying - especially if you are tempted to tie a tiny #20 gnat. Beauticians light, one of those with a round neon bulb around a 6" magnifying glass on a robotic type arm are ideal and most department or office stores sell them. Make yourself a hot cup of coffee, light a fire and nestle in for that long cold winter at your fly tying table. Tie a mouse or two... you'll be glad you did and so will your wife by staying out of her hair!


