## Prominent Pastor Dies

Dr. J. W. Tynes, 93, of 1117 Benbow Road, pastor emeritus of <u>Providence Baptist</u> Church in Greensboro, died yesterday at his home. The body is at Brown Funeral home pending completion of funeral arrangements.

Providence Baptist Church, established in 1866, is Greensboro's oldest black church. The building itself, er e c t e d about 1871, was for many years in the only brick church in the state for black people and for several years a tourist attraction for visitors from across the state.

Dr. Tynes was pastor from 1932 to 1959 after which he retired to assist actively in ministries to the congregation. He came to Greensboro from Lynchburg, Va., where he was pastor of Eighth Street Baptist Church for 12 years.

Dr. Tynes was vice-president of Virginia Theological Seminary and College where he taught Greek, Hebrew, and theology.

Greek, Hebrew, and theology. He was born in Sandy Mount, Va., in 1879. His father, James Thomas Tynes, a sergeant in the Civil War on the Union side, was born a free man in 1834.

Dr. Tynes graduated from St. Paul's Normal and Industrial School in Minnesota and received advanced degrees from Ohio State University. He was married to the late Mrs. Lucy Rich Tynes, the first woman principal of Northern Neck Academy in Virginia.

Surviving are sons, T. R. Tynes of Saint Croix, the Virgin Islands, Frank W. Tynes of New York, Dr. Victor H. Tynes, a Greensboro d'entist, and Dr. Morris H. Tynes of Chicago, Ill.; daughters, Dr. Margaret Tynes of Milan, Italy, world-famous opera singer, and Mrs. Angeline Roberts of New York.
