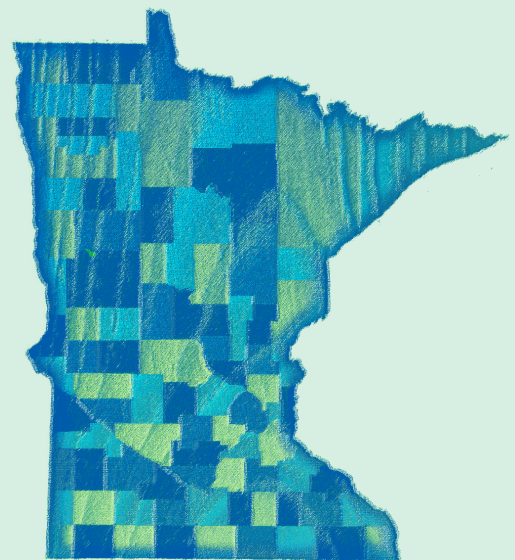

LEGISLATIVE VOTING RECORDS

AFSCME COUNCIL 5



HOUSE

1. COVID-19 Presumptive Eligibility for Workers Compensation (HF 2253) [3/25/21, pg. 1363-1364]:

This bill adopted the recommendations of the Workers Compensation Advisory Council. Among other provisions, it extended the presumption that certain workers contracted COVID-19 at work, and were therefore eligible for workers' compensation from May 31st, 2021 to December 31st, 2021. This ensured that workers that had to miss time because they got COVID at work were financially compensated, regardless of their workplace paid sick leave policies.

A "YES" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

2. Index the Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax to Inflation (Amendment to HF 1684) [4/17/21, pg. 5423]:

This amendment would remove a proposed increase to the gas tax in Minnesota that would index the tax to the National Highway Construction Cost Index. This would cut tens of millions of dollars' worth of investment in state highway maintenance, construction, and program delivery over the next two years.

A "NO" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

3. Omnibus Jobs and Economic Development Bill (SF 1098) [4/20/21, pg. 5786]:

This omnibus bill would create a public paid family leave benefit that would enable every worker in Minnesota to take up to 12 weeks of leave at 90% of their wages (capped at \$515 a week) to take care of their child or a family member. This program would also allow an additional 12 weeks of medical leave coverage. This bill also would establish unemployment benefits for school workers that are often seasonally laid off. Thousands of school workers were laid off at the end of the 2020 school year, but were unable to collect UI benefits because their job class is ineligible.

A "YES" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

4. Omnibus Tax Bill (HF 991) [4/22/21, pg. 6559]:

This omnibus bill would establish a fifth tier of state income tax in Minnesota, for individuals earning over \$500,000 and married joint-filers earning over \$1,000,000. It would additionally tax corporate income that was derived in Minnesota but held offshore, circumventing tax havens abroad. The bill also increased the working family credit for taxpayers without children.

A "YES" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

5. Developing a State-Run Public Health Insurance Option (Amendment to HF 2128) [4/26/21, pg. 6788]:

This amendment would strip a provision of the bill that would require the Department of Human Services to work with the federal government to develop a proposal for a public option program via the expansion of MinnesotaCare. A public health insurance option would enable thousands of Minnesotan workers and their families to have access to quality, affordable health care that isn't reliant on privately-run provider networks.

A "NO" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

SENATE

1. COVID-19 Presumptive Eligibility for Workers Compensation (HF 2253, pg. 3032):

This bill adopted the recommendations of the Workers Compensation Advisory Council. Among other provisions, it extended the presumption that certain workers contracted COVID-19 at work, and were therefore eligible for workers' compensation from May 31st, 2021 to December 31st, 2021. This ensured that workers that had to miss time because they got COVID at work were financially compensated, regardless of their workplace paid sick leave policies.

A "YES" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

2. Bad Policy in State Government Bill (Amendment to H.F.1952/S.F.1831, pg. 3240-3241):

This amendment to the State Government omnibus bill would have removed several bad policy provisions including 1) language that would reduce agency appropriations every time a posted position is not filled within a specific timeframe 2) language designed to interfere with our collective bargaining process 3) a section which could hinder an agency's ability to provide safe workplaces or properly respond to service delivery needs by limiting state employee growth based on the growth of the state's population and more.

A "YES" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

3. Cost/Benefit Analysis of Universal Health Reform Proposal (Amendment to H.F.2128) [4/29/21, pg. 40574060]:

This amendment would appropriate \$500,000 to fund a benefit and cost analysis of a universal health reform proposal which would provide policy makers and the public an unbiased comparison of our current health care financing system to a universal health care financing system. The analysis would examine total expenditures under both systems, the adequacy and completeness of coverage, number of people covered and the timeliness and appropriateness of care patients would receive under both systems.

A "YES" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

4. Prescription Drug Affordability Council (Amendment to H.F.2128/S.F.2360) [4/29/21, pg. 4045-4055]:

This amendment would have established the Prescription Drug Affordability Board and the Prescription Drug Affordability Council. The Board, in consultation with the Council, would identify prescription drugs with unreasonably high price increases. They would have the authority to initiate a cost review of those prescription drugs and set upper payment limits for those drugs if the unreasonably high prices create an affordability challenge for patients. The State Attorney General's Office would be authorized to enforce this law which would have an immediate positive effect on keeping prescription drug costs down for all Minnesotans.

The amendment was ruled out of order by the Senate President. A vote was taken challenging the ruling of the President in order to adopt this prescription drug affordability measure. A "NO" vote overturns the ruling of the President and a "YES" vote upholds the ruling of the President.

A "NO" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

5. Partisan Election Provisions in State Government and Elections Omnibus Bill (Amendment to H.F.1952/S.F.1831) [4/26/21, pg.3241-3242]:

This amendment would have removed several elections provisions from the bill. Best practice for changing election law is to ensure proposed changes have wide bi-partisan support. In the wake of the January 6th attack on the U.S. Capitol and amidst the lies still being promoted to undermine confidence in our elections, this omnibus bill included partisan changes to our state election laws.

A "YES" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.
