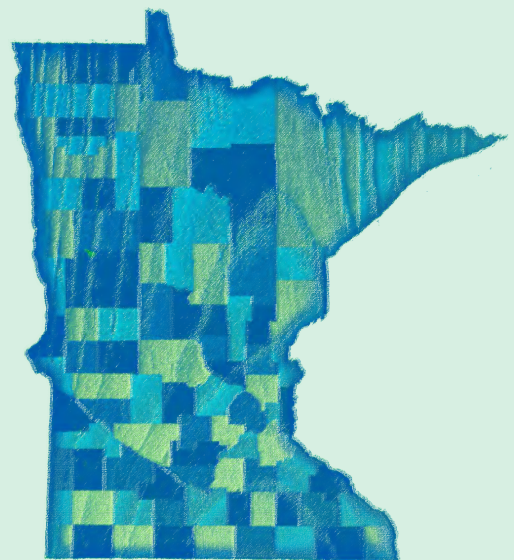

LEGISLATIVE VOTING RECORDS

AFSCME COUNCIL 5



HOUSE

1. Omnibus Transportation, Labor, and Housing Finance Bill (Final passage vote on HF 5242, pg. 18464, 5/19/24):

This law added new reporting language for MNDOT contract privatization. It also included new funding for 22 new license examiners at DVS to alleviate the drivers license backlog. The labor portion of the bill included cleanup language for Earned Sick and Safe Time, clarifications to PELRA, and allowed thousands of University of Minnesota employees to organize if they choose to.

A “YES” vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

2. Omnibus Health Finance Bill (Third Reading vote on SF 4699, pg. 16206, 5/9/24):

This law included a provision that will prohibit HMOs from converting from non-profit entities to for-profit ones, and adds several guardrails in the event that the simple ban is lifted in the future. The law requires that HMOs must provide lengthy notice and have open meetings for affected communities to weigh in with their concerns over potentially losing access to affordable care. This makes Minnesota the only state in the country that prohibits HMOs from becoming for-profit, which should prevent millions of dollars worth of charitable assets from being stripped from public access to profit health care executives and shareholders.

A “YES” vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

3. Omnibus Higher Education Finance Bill (Final passage vote on HF 4024, pg. 17373, 5/17/24):

This law made a series of changes to better regulate online program management (OPM) companies that partner with public higher education institutions. Two MNSU universities have already entered into agreements that give out-of-state companies the lion’s share of tuition dollars when they enroll in certain programs, and these companies perform tasks that would normally fall under AFSCME bargaining units or unionized faculty units. In the future, these agreements must not contain tuition sharing with OPMs, private ownership rights that benefit OPMs, or provide the OPM any decision-making authority over curriculums, student and course assessments, admissions, or appointments of faculty.

A “YES” vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

4. Omnibus Judiciary and Public Safety Finance Bill (Final passage vote on HF 5216, pg. 17732, 5/18/24):

This law included vital supplemental funding for the Department of Corrections to allay the costs of our current state employee contract. Without this funding, the department would have to cut programming and potentially staff to pay for the contract and negate any possible improvements in recruitment for frontline staff in correctional facilities.

A “YES” vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

5. Omnibus Tax and Government Bill (Final passage vote on HF 5247, pg. 19606, 5/19/24):

This vote encompassed ten omnibus bills rolled into one. After weeks of minority filibustering this was necessary to complete the work on time. Had this bill not passed into law, the Transportation, Labor, Housing, Energy, Climate, Agriculture, Human Services, Health, Paid Family and Medical Leave, and Tax bills would have stalled because of the minority’s filibuster. The changes include TTAA, DVS funding, PELRA, organizing at the U of M, ESST fixes, PFML fixes that would not create a tiered system of beneficiaries, additional funding for retention of staff at DHS facilities in St. Peter, HMO conversion language, and many other provisions.

A “YES” vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.
