Nurse Charting Cheat Sheet

Nurse charting guidelines

General

- 1. All chart entries must be printed except for the nurse's signature.
- 2. Nurse's signature:
 - Consists of the initial of the first name and the full last name.
 - Should appear on a separate line below the nurse's recorded notations.
 - Must be legible but not overly conspicuous.
 - A single signature covers a series of statements or notations, not individual entries.
- 3. Nurses must complete necessary notations before going "off duty" for all assigned patients.
- 4. All recordings must be neat, legible, and meaningful.
- 5. Entries should be accurate, concise, and relevant.
- 6. Use terse statements rather than full sentences.
- 7. Employ correct spelling and official abbreviations only.
- 8. Accurate and truthful recording is essential as the chart may serve as court evidence.

Formatting, ink usage and time rules

- 1. Use blue or black ink to write proper headings on new pages or sheets.
- 2. Keep recordings within the chart's pale limits. Start each entry on a horizontal line at its intersection with vertical limiting lines.
- 3. Prohibited styles: Avoid ornamental lettering.
- 4. Ink usage and time rules
 - Daytime recording (7:00 AM-11:00 PM): Use blue or black ink.
 - NighttimerRecording (11:00 PM-7:00 AM): Use red ink.

Content recording

- 1. Record the exact time of treatments, medications, symptoms, and doctor visits.
- 2. Observations column:
 - Record symptoms, complaints, and condition changes.
 - Document treatments, medications, and their effects.
 - Include routine nursing procedures and physician visits.
- 3. Avoid redundancy: Do not print the word "patient"; all notations inherently refer to the patient.
- 4. Doctor's orders: Avoid phrases like "Dr. Smith ordered backrest elevated two inches."
- 5. Do not erase errors.
- 6. Correction Process:
 - Strike through the error with a line from the upper left to the lower right corner.
 - Label it as "ERROR" and sign underneath.
 - Consult a supervisor if unsure about recopying pages.
 - If a page is recopied, file the original at the back of the chart.

Rules for printing

- 1. Use well-formed, individual letters.
- 2. Avoid unnecessary curves, tails, or fancy strokes.
- 3. Ensure all letters stand erect with minimal slant.
- 4. Use one space per letter, with single-letter spacing between words.
- 5. Rest all letters on the line.
- 6. Keep small letters 3/3 the height of capital letters.
- 7. "U" should have a curved bottom.
- 8. "V" should form an acute angle at the bottom.
- 9. Cross "t" at the upper third of its height.
- 10. Use "bed" to remember the orientation of loops for "b" and "d."
- 11. Print numbers clearly and in accordance with the charting style.
