RAISING THE PARTICIPATION (RPA)

In 2015, RPA came into place which states that young people now have to participate in education or training until their 18th birthday.

When you leave Year 11, your options are:

Remain in full time education, such as sixth form or college Go onto work-based learning such as an apprenticeship or traineeship Be into full time work or volunteering combined with part-time education or training (for 20 hours or more a week).

Why raise the participation age?

RPA was introduced to increase the opportunity for every student to improve their life prospects and become economically active individuals. Evidence shows that achieving qualifications at 16 and 17 can help to boost a student's prospects for life – for instance, young people with 2 or more A-levels earn around 14% more than those without.

A LEVELS

WHAT ARE A LEVELS?

Advanced level qualifications, known as A levels, are subject-based qualifications that can lead to university, further study, training, or work. You can normally study three or more A levels over two years. They are usually assessed by a series of examinations.

WHAT GRADES DO I NEED?

You will normally need:

- At least five GCSEs at grades 9 to 5/A* to C, with a minimum of grade 4 in English and Maths
- At least grade 4 in the specific subject(s) you want to study
- To study a science/maths subject, you will usually need at least a grade 6.
- However, the specific requirements needed to study A levels will vary across sixth forms so it is important to check the individual sixth form/sixth form college you are interested in applying to.

WHY SHOULD I CHOOSE A LEVELS?

- If you are thinking of going to university
- If you are unsure of what career or job you want to do, studying a selection of A levels can be a good way of keeping your options open. There are a number of subjects available to study at A level whether this be a subject you enjoyed studying at GCSE or a completely new subject such as law
- You are able to study independently, can revise and apply a good exam technique.

WHICH SUBJECTS SHOULD I CHOOSE?

- Think about what you enjoy and are good at (this can be in and out of school). If you have a natural ability or are passionate about a subject, you are more likely to do well
- Do you have a particular further study or career in mind? If so, what do you need to progress on to them are there specific entry requirements?
- If you are unsure of what you would like to do in the future, how open do you want to keep your options so that you are not limiting yourself.

- Continue on to university A levels are the most common qualifications studied to get into higher education
- Do an apprenticeship higher and degree apprenticeships are alternative pathways to university
- Get a job this could be a full-time position or part-time alongside further study.







VOCATIONAL (INCLUDE SPECIALIST COLLEGES E.G. SHUTTLEWORTH, PRO:DIRECT etc.)

WHAT IS A VOCATIONAL PROGRAMME?

Vocational courses are related to a specific area of employment, for example, if you want to become a social worker, you would study Health and Social Care. There are different types of vocational qualifications available; BTEC diplomas, certificates and Cambridge Nationals, which vary in level and weight in terms of equivalence to A levels. You can study a vocational course on it's own at a vocational college or in combination with other qualifications such as A levels, at a sixth form. Vocational programmes apply learning to real-life situation and so offer a more practical, hands-on approach than traditional A level academic courses.

WHAT GRADES DO I NEED?

- Entry requirements vary greatly, depending on the course and level of the vocational programme
- You may not have had the opportunity to study the course beforehand, so you may need to start at a slightly lower level to develop the vocational skills that are required for employment

WHY SHOULD I CHOOSE VOCATIONAL?

- If you have a clear idea of a practical career/vocational sector that you want to go into e.g. hairdressing
- If you have an interest in a particular industry or 'job family' but want to know the different careers available within it
- If you enjoy practical learning and want to develop your knowledge and skill in a particular area

WHICH COURSE SHOULD I CHOOSE?

- There are a range of vocational subjects to choose from such as hairdressing, childcare, motor vehicle and graphic design to name a few
- Think about what you enjoy and are good at (this can be in and out of school). If you have a natural ability or are passionate about a course, you are more likely to do well
- You would typically choose a course in which you want to study further at a higher level (either at university or through an apprenticeship) or that would lead into a specific sector/field of work

- Go straight into employment, which is likely to be within the sector you have studied in
- Do an apprenticeship within the sector you want to work in
- Go to university If you haven't taken A levels as well as a BTEC, it will probably be to study a subject that relates to your BTEC and is vocational (focused on a specific career e.g. nursing or business studies) rather than academic







COMBINATION (A LEVEL AND VOCATIONAL COURSE)

WHAT ARE COMBINATION SUBJECTS?

You choose to study a combination of A levels and vocational courses. You can choose to study 1 x A level and a BTEC level 3 National Diploma (equivalent to 2 x A levels) or 2 x A levels and then a BTEC level 3 National Extended Certificate (equivalent to 1 x A level). Your course combination needs to be equivalent to 3 x A levels in total. Most sixth forms offer both courses and will specify the amount/type of qualification it is.

WHAT GRADES DO I NEED?

You will normally need:

- To study A level(s), you will need at least five GCSEs at grades 9 to 4/A* to C
- For the vocational course, you will need to check the entry requirements as this varies greatly, depending on the level and type of course

Check the individual sixth form you are considering as they will have the course entry requirements on their website

WHY SHOULD I CHOOSE COMBINATION?

- If you want to keep your options open and are unsure of exactly what career or job you want to do
- If a varied assessment method works for you. A Level courses are linear and examined at the end of Year 13, whilst many of the BTEC Level 3 courses are examined throughout the course through a combination of summative exams and coursework
- If you work well in both environments; studying in a classroom and in a practical setting

WHICH SUBJECTS SHOULD I CHOOSE?

- There are a number of courses and combinations in which you could choose from
- Think about what you enjoy and are good at (this can be in and out of school). If you have a natural ability or are passionate about a subject, you are more likely to do well

- Continue on to university
- Do an apprenticeship higher and degree apprenticeships are alternative pathways to university
- Get a job this could be a full-time position or part-time alongside further study.







T LEVELS

WHAT ARE T LEVELS?

T Levels are new courses, launched in September 2020, which follow GCSEs. They are 2-year courses and have been developed in collaboration with employers and businesses so that the content meets the needs of industry and prepares pupils for work, further training or study. T Levels are a mixture of classroom learning (typically 80%) and 'on-the-job' experience (typically 20%) through an industry placement.

WHAT GRADES DO I NEED?

• The majority of the initial T level providers ask that you have at least grade 4 in GCSE English and Maths, however each provider will have their own requirements.

WHY SHOULD I CHOOSE T LEVELS?

- They have been designed with leading businesses and employers to give you the knowledge and skills needed for your chosen industry
- They give you an insight into what a real career is like through the industry placement
- Upon successful completion, you receive a national recognised qualification which is equivalent to 3 A levels.

APPRENTICESHIPS

WHAT IS AN APPRENTICESHIP?

An apprenticeship is a genuine job where you learn, gain experience and are paid a salary. You will learn and develop job-specific knowledge and skills, working alongside experienced staff whilst studying. As an apprentice, you will spend 80% of the working week at your place of employment, and 20% at your place of study.

WHAT GRADES DO I NEED?

• The apprenticeship provider sets out the entry requirements and so the grades and experience required vary.

WHY SHOULD I CHOOSE AN APPRENTICESHIP?

- If you have a particular career of job sector that you want to work in the future
- If you want to gain hands on, real life work experience, whilst being paid
- If you are hoping to go into employment at the end of your training/qualification

WHERE CAN I DO AN APPRENTICESHIP?

- Most apprenticeship vacancies are listed on the gov website https://www.gov.uk/apply-apprenticeship
- To save you searching regularly through the website, you can create an account. This will allow you to set up 'alerts' where you will receive text/email alerts of any new vacancies that have been added, based on the types of apprenticeship and location you are interested in.

WHICH SUBJECT SHOULD I CHOOSE?

• There are many different types of apprenticeships available across a whole range of industry sectors. It's really about picking the sector that interests you the most and suits your skills. The apprenticeship you choose will be in one sector/area, for example engineering, but will have modules which will make up the qualification.

- The majority of apprentices stay in employment (85%) with 64% staying with the same employer they did their apprenticeship with
- You can go on to a higher level apprenticeship; at 18, you can do a higher or degree apprenticeship
- You can go on to university; having an apprenticeship can be seen as advantageous by some universities, where you are wanting to do a sector specific degree.





TRAINEESHIPS

WHAT IS A TRAINEESHIP?

A traineeship is an education and training programme with work experience that can last between 6 weeks and 6 months, depending on how long you need. Traineeships help 16 to 24 year olds – or 25 year olds with an Education, Health and Care (EHC) plan – get ready for an apprenticeship or job if they do not have the appropriate skills or experience.

WHY SHOULD I CHOOSE A TRAINEESHIP?

- If you do not have many qualifications it will give you the opportunity to improve your English and Maths too
- If you want to develop your skills and gain real life work experience but do not feel ready to do an apprenticeship

WHERE CAN I DO A TRAINEESHIP?

• Most traineeship vacancies are listed on the gov website - https://www.findapprenticeship.service.gov.uk/traineeshipsearch

To save you searching regularly through the website, you can create an account. This will allow you to set up 'alerts' where you will receive text/email alerts of any new vacancies that have been added, based on the types of traineeships and location you are interested in.

WHAT CAN I DO AFTER?

• The aim of a traineeship is to help you move into an apprenticeship or employment.








CHOOSING THE RIGHT OPTION FOR YOU

YOU SHOULD CONSIDER:

- Their entry requirements do they have a minimum GCSE grades, are there requisites to study certain subjects. For example, to study A level Art, you must have a qualification at GCSE level in Art or Design, To study any A level Science, most providers expect you to achieve a minimum of grade 6 at GCSE Science
- How you will get there
- Your timetable will be different to your friends. You may be there for 5 days a week or 4 longer days
- Their facilities and extra-curricular opportunities
- Future prospects do they specialise in their area you want to pursue







THINGS TO CONSIDER BEFORE APPLYING

APPLICATION DEADLINES

WE HAVE SET OUR INTERNAL APPLICATION DEADLINE FOR FRIDAY 24TH JANUARY 2025

However, each post 16 provider has their own application deadline and you should therefore check each provider you are interested in applying for, either by visiting their website or contacting their admissions teams. School sixth forms tend to have an earlier application deadline which can be early as September/October.

In this booklet, you will find the application deadlines for the colleges and sixth forms within the following areas:

- Luton
- Harpenden
- St Albans
- Bedford
- Central Bedfordshire
- Hitchin

Some of the colleges do not have a set deadline and accept applications throughout the year. In this instance, we would encourage you to follow our internal deadline, to give you the best chance of getting onto your preferred course.

If you are considering moving out of the area once you have finished year 11, you will need to check who the post 16 providers are in the area and visit their websites directly for more information.

HOW MANY CAN I APPLY TO?

You can apply to as many post 16 providers as you like, but when submitting any application, please consider the points outlined on page 11. We recommend that you apply to at least two post 16 providers so that you have a plan B option.

Once you have applied, you may be invited for an interview. They are likely to ask you if you have applied anywhere else. You can inform them of how many/where else you have applied to. They will then inform you of whether they would like to offer you a place. You can accept all of this. It is on results day that you then make your final decision of where you will go.







THINGS TO CONSIDER BEFORE APPLYING CONTINUED

PREDICTED GCSE GRADES

Your predicted GCSE grades will be sent to the colleges and sixth forms you have applied to w/c 9th December. Your November mocks will influence these grades. For some of the colleges/sixth forms, if your predicted grades do not meet the entry requirements for the course(s) you want to study, they will not offer you a place. Other colleges/sixth forms may offer you a Conditional Offer and will then await to receive your final GCSE results in August.

If you're predicted grades do not meet individual subject requirements, the college/sixth form may offer you a provisional place, but on a different course/at a different level. It is therefore crucial that you put 100% into your mocks in November.

OPEN EVENTS

We have tried to provide as much information as possible about the local college/sixth form open events on pages 14-22. However, you should check individual websites as dates may change/new dates added. We strongly recommend visiting each place you are considering applying for. This gives you a chance to:

- Speak to the subject leads to find out what the course entails, how it is assessed and what it could lead on to
- See the facilities for yourself
- Test the journey how long does it take to get from your home to the college/sixth form?
- Hear about the extra-curricular opportunities that are available
- Find out about additional support available (financial, pastoral, academic exam access etc)
- Get answers to any other questions you may have

Like school, there is a range of support available at college, sixth forms and with apprenticeship providers. This includes:

- Financial (16-19 Bursary)- this could be support towards transport, meals, resources and equipment
- Pastoral this could include attendance, issues with your course, relationship difficulties
- SEN/exam access arrangements this could be resources that are suited to you, in-class support, extra-time in exams
- Careers this could include help with applying to university, completing a CV, searching for jobs
- At any open event, the post 16 providers will have people to talk to about the support they offer. In addition, most of them will have a section on their website outlining the additional support they provide If you are likely to need any support, make sure to check their website




