SETTING UP ADA EQUIPMENT

- 1. Remove the ADA Controller from the rear of the Voting Machine.
- 2. Thread the Controller cable through the cable slot on the upper left corner of the door.
- 3. Place the controller on the body of the machine.
- 4. If a voter needs to use the ADA Controller:
 - Make sure the Controller is plugged into the appropriate slot
 - Plug the headphones into the Controller (Some Voters may have their own headphones)
 - Make sure the Voter has the headphones on before they insert the activation card in the machine
 - If the Voter is unable to insert the activation card, an assistor may do so or the Poll Worker may assist them
 - Hand the controller to the Voter over the rear of the machine.

POLL WORKER 10 BEST PRACTICES

- 10. Adhering to business casual attire as requested
- 9. Paying close attention to any and all FORM submissions
- 8. Maintaining a neat and orderly district
- 7. Attending Poll Worker training every two years
- 6. Mutually cooperating with your fellow board members
- Making sure that all equipment is stored properly when the polls close
- 4. Researching Voters according to proper procedures
- 3. Opening equipment in a timely manner
- 2. Not discussing politics or matters on the ballot at the polls
- 1. Providing Voters with a pleasurable experience

THE 10 MOST RECURRING POLL WORKER ERRORS

- 10. Front loading voter activation card into printer causing jams
- 9. Multiple Voters with the same name not checked for DOB
- 8. Poll Worker does not verify info. on Voter using sample ballot
- 7. Showing up later than 5 AM
- 6. Poll Worker allows assistance without getting assistor form signed prior to entry
- 5. Not spoiling the ballot of voter who presses the accept button
- 4. Does not have Voting Authority signed
- 3. Does not use Equipment Guide for setup
- 2. Issues Voting Authority for PROVISIONAL ballots
- 1. Asks for ID during voter check-in process

WHAT IS ALL THE CONCERN ABOUT "CHALLENGERS"

In our training class there seems to be a concern over what is a Challenger and what we are supposed to do if we have a Challenger at our districts. The amount of concern is overstated. Here is a brief synopsis of what the Challenge process is all about.

Challengers are people who are appointed by a Candidate, political party chair or as a proponent or opponent for a question on the ballot. A Challenger is permitted to OBSERVE the voting process and challenge a voter's right to vote based on a valid reason.



Reasons a Challenger can exercise a challenge

- If they believe the voter is not a US citizen
- Is not 18 years of age or older
- Is not a resident of the County for at least 30 days prior to the election
- Is not a registered voter

If any of these pertain, then the Challenger must sign an affidavit (C2-C4) stating the reason for the challenge

What are Challengers NOT allowed to do:

- Challengers can't "challenge" a voter for the following reasons:
 - a. They think they know how the voter will vote
 - b. The race or ethnic origin of the voter
 - The voter resides in a particular section of the municipality or county
- Sit with the district board worker or touch the election materials
- Sit or stand near the voting machines
- · Challenge the voter directly. Only you can question the voter
- Wear campaign paraphernalia
- Harass or intimidate any voters or cause disturbances in the polling location
- Challenge a voter because the board worker asks the voter to affirm their residence or first-time registrant by mail to show ID.
