On any given day, the community lunch in the EECM dining room is packed. Our lunch guests know that persistent inflation and other factors make coming to get a full balanced meal at EECM a necessity. Until the summer months, the mood in the dining room was consistently quiet, reflective. Well, that all changed when a 12-year-old boy named "Aiden" came into the dining room to join them for a meal.

"What's with this kid? He just lights up this room," said one guest. Aiden's mother "Rose" overheard, and responded "he's my very outgoing son."

Aiden is a 6th grader whose dream is to be President of the United States. We have no doubt he can achieve that given his ability to connect with people and make them immediate friends. Aiden and Rose began coming to the EECM Food Pantry in midJune. Rose is a single mother and currently unemployed, and needed help getting food. Our friendly volunteers told her about getting a hot, nutritious meal at the EECM Community Lunch. They went every day during the summer, and because of Aiden's big personality, they made close friends and other guests actually became competitive in wanting to sit with or near Aiden during lunch.

Rose said, "I was worried about being embarrassed needing food and a hot meal. But Aiden is a boy, and he just enjoys everything and everybody." But when it was time for Aiden to go back to school in midaugust, Community Lunch guests were sad and said they would miss him. But Aiden promised that he would come back to visit.

While we respected Rose's request to not use their last names or show photos of Aiden and her, she was proud to share their experiences here at EECM. Rose is now volunteering in the EECM kitchen until she gets settled into a new job. She says, "... Aiden and I learned quickly what a wonderful place EECM is where everyone is welcome. No one should ever be nervous walking into this place."

Before Aiden left, lunch guests were all smiles when EECM Volunteer Coordinator Reverend Tracy Hudson presented him with a new school backpack filled with lots of new supplies to appropriately kick off the new school year. We miss you Aiden!

YOUR GENEROSITY IS NEEDED

With Thanksgiving and the Holiday Season fast approaching, and given your consistent generosity, there's no doubt that you will be thinking of helping us serve those in need. And we are expecting this year to be particularly challenging due to the rise in homelessness and food costs.

Around the city, you're noticing tents popping up with homeless people living in parks, under bridges and other visible public places. With the lifting of the pandemic rental moratoriums, the numbers of homeless people are going up.

We've been collaborating recently with the leaders of the other shelters in the Pittsburgh area to discuss the dramatic increase in homelessness. We are comparing numbers and, in cooperation with city and county officials, we will be discussing publicly how we will meet these challenges.

Our food pantry distribution and community lunch attendance have seen a sharp rise in demand for food, and we point to inflation as a key factor in the increased demand.

In this newsletter, you're noticing so much of how we are gearing up to help those in need within our community. Our employee spotlight featuring Nikki Harrington warms the heart because Nikki is already working tirelessly to make sure those experiencing homelessness have a place to stay. Her department also helps with education and employment resources for the residents and the community.

In the coming months, we will be holding our annual Coat and Toy Drives along with special holiday meals. No matter what the challenge, the EECM staff rises to the occasion and EECM is always here.

MEET THE STAFF

NICOLE HARRINGTON

Nicole "Nikki" Harrington is our Director of Housing and Employment Services. Nikki manages our Emergency Shelter, Recovery House, and Education and Employment programs. And, she's become a respected voice in the region with regard to the ongoing challenges of homelessness and poverty.

Nikki came to EECM in 2018 as a housing specialist. She helped people experiencing homelessness develop housing plans and find affordable housing.

She is a doctoral candidate at Point Park University. She's pursuing an EdD in Leadership and Administration and will graduate in 2023.

Nikki sees her work here at EECM as so much more than a job and she gets her inspiration from fellow employees saying, "One of my job's best rewards is leading a team that is passionate about its work. We all have creative ideas on how we can better serve the community we work with. However, the challenge is learning



to work with different perspectives and find the best approach that will work for everyone."

With the homelessness population seemingly increasing in the Pittsburgh area, Nikki says there are no

easy answers and that each person's experience is different. "We continue to see an increase in the number of people enduring homelessness, couch surfing, sleeping on streets under bridges, and in tents and cars. We realize these people are more likely to be disconnected from housing."

At EECM, Nikki ensures that each client who is experiencing homelessness is treated with dignity as an individual. "We continue to do outreach and provide continuous support. The resources within our organization allows our clients to continue to thrive independently."

EECM VOLUNTEERS GROW AND HARVEST FRESH PRODUCE

Here at East End Cooperative Ministry, we accurately say that our many volunteers are the backbone of our success in serving the food-insecure. And it takes a strong back and lots of commitment to plant and maintain 17 garden beds outside of our building. The late summer harvest has included fresh and delicious vegetables like cherry tomatoes, plum tomatoes, beefsteak tomatoes, eggplant, lettuce, broccoli, zucchini, kale, and many kinds of fresh herbs including sage, dill, and thyme.

The garden produce is distributed to our food pantry clients. EECM Food Pantry Manager Krista Brolley says, "food pantry clients know when we have freshly picked produce from the garden and the truly appreciate getting it. It's just so fresh."

Daily field trips included fun visits to Kennywood, Idlewild Park, Sandcastle, the Carnegie Science Center, The Pittsburgh Zoo, and more.
