



GYLHAS Autumn Conference Norfolk & the North Sea: the past million years

Great Yarmouth Local History & Archaeological Society is delighted to present a one-day conference on 15 October 2022 with visiting speakers who will share their expert knowledge as we explore this fascinating topic.

Norfolk's proximity to the North Sea provides the county with a unique place in history. The earliest known human footprints



outside of Africa, dating back almost a million years, were found at Happisburgh, and Norfolk is the only county which contains evidence of four different human species. The world's

most complete skeleton of a Steppe Mammoth was excavated at West Runton, alongside the remains of other species from warmer environments such lions, rhinoceros and even hyaena, providing proof that the region has been experiencing climate change over a very long period of time.

Extreme temperature variation from tropical zones to ice ages, and changes in water levels impacted significantly on the area now occupied by the North Sea. Recent archaeological investigation, alongside discoveries made by industrial dredging and seismic research, are revealing intriguing new insights into the landscape formation and human and animal habitation in and around the North Sea basin.

Speakers at the conference include:

Dr Rachel Bynoe, Marine Archaeologist, Director of the Centre for the Archaeology of Human Origins, University of Southampton to speak on Underwater Archaeology.

Dr Rob Davis, Project Leader, Pathways to Ancient Britain, Dept. of Britain, Europe and Prehistory at the British Museum to speak on Early Man in Norfolk and surrounding counties.

Professor Vincent Gaffney,

Anniversary Chair in Landscape Archaeology, School of Archaeology and Forensic Sciences, University of Bradford to speak on sea levels in the North Sea Basin.

Professor Adrian Lister, Research Leader, at the Dept. of Vertebrates and Anthropology at the British Museum to speak on the Natural History of the Region.



The front section contains news coverage from then, and the back pages link them to now, highlighting related visitor attractions, websites, books, magazines, organisations, and TV/film/radio output. News stories in the first three editions have included the (shocking for some) marriage of Thomas William Coke MP ('Coke of Norfolk') to a woman 50 years his junior, the impact of the rural recession on Norfolk, an election riot in King's Lynn, employers in Norwich dropping planned pay cuts for weavers, and John Constable's latest painting. Historic Photographer of the Year 2022

Sponsored by HistoryHit.com, the 2022 Historic Photographer of the Year Awards celebrate the very best historic places and cultural sites across the globe, offering a window to history that exists all around us. Historic England is a partner of the Historic England category, which

was won in 2021 by Sam Binding for the atmospheric view of the iconic Clifton Suspension Bridge, captured during a misty sunrise.

Entries were judged on composition, originality and technical proficiency alongside the story behind the submission and its historical impact.

Historic Photographer of the Year calls on photographers to explore and capture the very best historic places that the world has to offer.

Whether it's a ruined medieval fortress, a secluded religious sanctuary or an Iron Age earthwork, historic sites are among the most stunning and provocative places to photograph on Earth.

The **Historic England** category, run in partnership with Historic England, celebrates the best of England's heritage. The **World History** category recognises sensational photographs of sites around the world.

Entries will be judged by a panel of five judges based on their originality, composition and technical proficiency alongside the story behind the image and its historical impact.

The Historic Photographer of the Year competition opened for entries on 1 August 2022. The competition is open to amateur and professional photographers over the age of 18 and resident in the UK. The overall winner will see their work showcased on the official competition website and will receive a cash prize of £250, while category winners stand to win a cash prize of £50. The Historic England category winner will also receive up to £100 worth of books selected from the Historic England imprint.

Entries close at 18:00 BST on 16 October 2022. Winners will be announced on 24 November 2022. All images must be of historical significance and taken in England with an accompanying explanation of the significance. All photographs must be submitted in high resolution JPEGs, with a minimum resolution of 300 dpi and a maximum size of 3000 x 3000px. No photograph uploaded may be larger than 15 MB. Great Yarmouth's High Street Heritage Action Zone

The High Street Heritage Action Zone is a scheme put together jointly by the Great Yarmouth Borough Council, the Great Yarmouth Preservation Trust and Historic England. It's aim is to improve Great Yarmouth's centre by conserving and repairing historic buildings, help develop a greater understanding of the area's heritage amongst the local community, aims to facilitate training and skills development as well as supporting the creative use of vacant spaces by helping to develop spaces for both residential living and retail opportunities.

It is a four year project with grant funding of £2.3m, of which Historic England provided £980,743 and is running along side with the projects run by the Future High Streets Fund (which has funding of £13.77m) and the Town Deal (which has funding of £20.1m). The area covered by the High Street Action Zone includes the Market Place, the Rows and the northern end of King Street.

Projects that have been funded by the Action Zone are the consolidation of the section of medieval Town Wall alongside the Market Place, the restoration of the wrought iron railings at St Nicholas Priory Primary School, the repairs and improvements to historic buildings in Market Row, the repair and reuse of 145 King Street and 6 Market Place, the landscaping of the Market Place which runs alongside the existing Market Place redevelopment, grant schemes for historic shopfront improvements and historic building repairs and the historic digital mapping of the Action Zone area.

As part of this programme, Cotswold Archaeology were involved in leading a team of volunteers from Great Yarmouth, which included the Society's Young Archaeologists, in a project which involved seven test-pits at selected locations inside and outside the town walls.
