## HONORING THE TREASURED 'IOLANI TRADITION OF "ONE TEAM"

In 2002, in honor of the 50th Anniversary of the passing of legendary Father Kenneth Bray, the 'Iolani Prep Classic began the tradition of presenting The Ray Wong Team Award to the team that best exemplifies the qualities of good character and sportsmanship in its performances at the tourney.

This prestigious award will honor the legacy of men who have dedicated their lives to ensure that athletic competition fosters the valued traits of selflessness, humility, perseverance, and integrity. At 'lolani, this tradition was begun by Father Kenneth Bray, and carried on by Edward Hamada and future generations of coaches. The impact that these men have had on countless numbers of 'lolani athletes is immeasurable.

Decades ago, Glenn Young '59 had a vision to create the 'Iolani Prep Classic in order to elevate the quality of basketball in Hawai'i. There is little doubt that Glenn's dream has become reality. Essential to that success has been the generous support of many corporate and individual donors.

No single sponsor has been more generous or more consistent than Mr. Ray Wong '49. An 'lolani graduate and disciple of Father Bray, Ray realized the tremendous value that this tournament had for the youth of the entire state, and he pledged his resources to its success. In typical "One Team" fashion, his generosity came with only two conditions. First, he asked that the tournament include as great a variety of local Hawai'i teams from year to year so that the entire state could benefit from it. Second, he wished that his sponsorship remain anonymous. Credit simply was not important to him.

We broke our promise to Mr. Wong, and in 2002 established an award in his honor, and in the honor of the traditions that he has steadfastly upheld. We believe that this award is the most significant one that we will dispense. Championships and individual recognitions are fleeting honors, but values such as those recognized by this award are timeless and everlasting virtues. Mr. Wong passed away on July 17, 2022, at the age of 90, but dedication to good character and sportsmanship live on.

## **COACH GLENN YOUNG '59**

The 'Iolani Prep Classic, one of the nation's premier high school basketball tournaments, was the brainchild of Glenn Young after his talented 1982-83 'Iolani Raiders squad had a humbling tournament experience in Las Vegas. After returning, he began plans to bring top mainland teams to Hawai'i to expose local players and coaches to the kind of competition that 'Iolani faced in Nevada.

A steady stream of elite high school teams to the 'lolani Prep Classic began in 1983 with West Philadelphia. It went on to include well-known programs such as: Oak Hill, St. Anthony's, Fairfax, Montrose Christian, Flint Hill Prep, Rice (N.Y.), DeMatha, Findlay Prep, Montverde, and many others. It didn't take long for Glenn Young's idea to take shape quickly and become a can't-miss holiday event that has the attention of avid high school basketball fans throughout the country. The tournament has also gone worldwide with its impact,

including teams from China, Germany, Italy and Japan in 'Iolani Prep Classic fields through the years.

With the assistance of his family and the 'lolani community, Glenn Young shepherded the 'Iolani Prep Classic, which added the girls tournament in 2007, for over 30 years. From coordinating transportation, food and staffing, to setting the brackets and publishing the program, he was involved in all aspects of one of the most illustrious tournaments in the United States.

A member of 'Iolani School's Class of 1959, Glenn Young also coached football at his alma mater, where he spent 43 years as a teacher and department head. He passed away on Nov. 12, 2015, at the age of 73, but not before becoming a friend and mentor for many at 'lolani School, and making a lasting impact in the Hawai'i basketball community and beyond.



## **'IOLANI PREP CLASSIC: EARLY TIMELINE**





The seeds for the 'lolani Prep Classic, now in its 40th year as one of Hawai'i's venerable sporting events, actually were planted almost 3,000 miles away in a Nevada desert. Here is an early timeline of the Classic, from its conception to emergence as the nation's premier high school basketball tournament:

Dec. 1982:

'Iolani School, which returned four talented starters and later went on to win its first state championship, participates in the Rancho High School Tournament in Las Vegas and loses all three games by over 20 points each. "It wasn't even close," Red Raiders coach Glenn Young said years later. "The caliber of play on the Mainland was so much more superior to the caliber of play in Hawai'i ... We needed to expose our local high school players to the kinds of things they were doing on the Mainland." Young met the head coaches from West Philadelphia and St. Bernard (Marina Del Rey, Calif.) in Las Vegas and invited their teams to play in the inaugural 'Iolani Prep Classic the following year.

Glenn Young meets with 'Iolani athletic director Eddie Hamada to start planning the first annual 'Iolani Prep Classic. It is acknowledged that the tournament must be self-funded, with no subsidies from the school. Hamada approaches longtime friend and supporter Ray Wong '49 for help, and Mr. Wong generously pledges to fund anchor support entirely out of his personal account.

**INAUGURAL** 'Iolani Prep Classic tips off, featuring the West Philadelphia "Speedboys," ranked No. 10 in Street & Smith's preseason national poll. Other visiting teams include Rancho (Las Vegas), Huntington Beach (Calif.) and St. Bernard (Marina Del Rey, Calif.). West Philadelphia entertains the capacity crowds with its rhythmic clapping and high-flying dunks during warm-ups and fast-paced action during the games. The Speedboys, led by Temple-bound guard Howard Evans, defeats St. Bernard, 60-51, for the championship.



**SECOND ANNUAL** 'Iolani Prep Classic sees the return of West Philly, along with crosstown rival Johnstown (Pa.) and Glendale (Calif.). Glendale upsets the Speedboys for the title.

THIRD ANNUAL 'Iolani Prep Classic represents "the turning point," according to Glenn Young. McDonald's of Hawai'i becomes a title sponsor, and Flint Hill Prep of Oakton, Va., -- the No. 1-ranked team in the nation – makes its first appearance in the Classic. Flint Hill junior Dennis Scott – rated as one of top five guards in the country – puts on a spectacular show with his all-around game that features alleyoop dunks, 20-foot jumpers and nifty dribbling and passing. The other Mainland teams are West Philly, Servite (Anaheim, Calif.) and Doss (Louisville, Ky.). Maryknoll, led by future University of Hawai'i quarterback Garrett Gabriel, upsets Doss in the quarterfinals 64-62, after Gabriel scored 13 points and blocked a shot with one second remaining. Gabriel then scored a tournament-record 32 points as the Spartans fell short against West Philly in the semifinals.

FOURTH ANNUAL 'Iolani Prep Classic expands to 12 teams and again features No. 2-ranked Flint Hill as Scott returns, this time as the nation's No. 1-ranked player. Joining the field is Camden, N.J., ranked No. 25, and Roman Catholic (Philadelphia), Simi Valley (Calif.), Msgr. McClancy (New York), and St. Bernard. The stacked field earns national recognition as Street & Smith magazine names the 'Iolani Prep Classic as the best high school tournament in the country. St. Bernard's David Whitmore, a 6-foot-4 All-America candidate with a 40-inch vertical leap, wins the slam-dunk contest and 'Iolani's 5-foot-10 sophomore, Kanoe Winchester, finishes second. KHNL-13 televises the championship game on live statewide TV.

## INAUGURAL 'IOLANI CLASSIC GIRLS TOURNAMENT WAS HISTORIC

here was a time -- not too long ago -- when Hawai'i was the only state in the country that played high school girls basketball in the spring. From 1977, when girls basketball became an official Hawai'i High School Athletic Association sport, through 2007, the season started in late February or March with the state tournament usually in May.

That changed after the 2006-07 school year, when the state's athletic directors voted to move the season to winter, in alignment with the other 49 states. 'Iolani Prep Classic director Glenn Young, who founded the Boys Classic in 1983, sprung into action and quickly organized the first 'Iolani Girls Prep Classic which was played Dec. 13-15, 2007.

"With the experience we had in the boys tournament, it raised the level of play here," Young told The Honolulu Advertiser on the eve of that first Girls Classic. "But the girls never had that opportunity. With the change in seasons, we felt this was something we really needed to do. It was a no-brainer."

Like the Boys Classic, the first 'Iolani Girls Prep Classic featured high-level Mainland teams. Eventual champion Redondo Union (Redondo Beach, Calif.) went deep into the 2007 California Interscholastic Federation playoffs and featured preseason McDonald's and EA Sports All-American Atonye Nyingifa, who had signed with UCLA. Narbonne (Harbor City) was Los Angeles City Section champion three of the previous four years, and at the time, had four alumni playing in the NBA.

The third Mainland team that inaugural year was Granada (Livermore, Calif.), which was a contender in the East Bay area.

But from the get-go, the Hawai'i teams fared well. On Day 1, Punahou dominated Granada, 59-30. In the semifinals, the Buff 'n Blue held off Narbonne, 47-39, with senior forward Shawna-Lei Kuehu leading the way with 24 points, 11 rebounds, two steals and one assist.

"Our girls competed and played hard the whole game, like all Hawai'i teams do," said Punahou coach Mike Taylor. "When we play top teams from the Mainland, we want to represent Hawai'i basketball, so even if we're undersized we want to compete, show composure and play with a big heart. It's a nice win not just for our school, but for the whole state."

In the other semifinal, Redondo Beach defeated 'Iolani, 40-29, after the Raiders had jumped out to a 9-2 lead. 'Iolani center Jamie Smith finished the game with 11 points and 18 rebounds.

The Sea Hawks won the championship, 45-35, and Narbonne rallied past the Raiders, 48-42, for third place, despite Smith's 20 points and 12 rebounds. Redondo Beach coach Marcelo Enriquez had high praise afterward.

"I was thoroughly impressed with Punahou all week -- they're wellcoached, disciplined and they have some great basketball players," Enriquez said. "This tournament was incredible, the hospitality was great. And as far as the basketball, Hawai'i hasn't missed a beat. All three Hawai'i teams we played -- Punahou, 'Iolani and Kamehameha -- are quality teams and gave us a tough game. They definitely can play with the California teams; they showed it."

At the end of that 2007-08 season, Punahou held off 'Iolani, 46-41, in a thrilling state championship game.



Longtime coach Dean Young of the five-time defending state champion Raiders returns three starters from last year's team that finished 25-2, including senior guard Mia Frye (5-7), who was named Most Outstanding Player of the 2024 HHSAA State Tournament.

'Iolani is off to a 5-1 start this season, with the only loss coming to Southern California power Mater Dei (Santa Ana). Sophomore sensation Justice Kekauoha, a 5-7 guard, was named to the All-State Tournament Team last season and currently leads the Raiders in scoring, averaging 14.3 points per game. She has made 11 of 12 free throw attempts (91.7 percent). Freshman guard Rayah Soriano (5-7) is second in scoring at 11 ppg and has already made 13 shots from 3-point range, including five in her varsity debut against Leilehua.

Junior guard Chelsea Lee (5-8) is third in scoring at 8.8 ppg, and has converted 10 triples from beyond the arc. Junior guard Hailey Fernandez (5-3) is the third returning starter.

Lone returning starter, junior Savvy Swords (6-3), will be counted on for veteran leadership. Swords helped guide Team Canada to a silver medal in the U17 FIBA World Cup this past summer.

Junior guard Olivia Jones (5-11) also returns for the Crusaders after playing primarily off the bench last year. New additions of junior wing Sanai Green (#29 in ESPN 2026 class), junior guard Zaniyah Williams (#41 in 2026), sophomore guard Taylor Brown (USA U16 Invitee) gives Coach Raiti a new core to mold and shape as they try to be one of the nation's best once again.
