## National Archives History

**1934:** Established to preserve and care for records of the U.S. Government

**1949:** Incorporated with General Services Administration


**1985:** Made independent agency

#### **Presidential Libraries**




- Not mandatory, choice of outgoing Presidents; collections preserved regardless
- Embraced from Herbert Hoover, through Barack Obama (14 currently existing)
- Construction paid for with private and nonfederal funds raised by respective presidents
- Collections, museums overseen and maintained by National Archives
- Many libraries supported in part by non-profit foundations



# Carter Presidential Library

- Opened October 1, 1986
- 40 million pages of written materials
- 40,000 museum objects/artifacts
- 500,000 photographs
- 2,500 hours of film, audio and video tape

**Right:** A portion of the Carter Library archival collections as seen from the museum floor (Carter Library)






# **Teaching with Primary Sources**

- They make us question where information comes from; encourages consideration of original intent and context
- Images, Film and Audio sources reveal the intangible
- Analyzing multiple documents related to a similar topic allows researchers to consider multiple perspectives
- No single primary source will contain all desired information, prompting further inquiry

**Left:** Proposals authorized by the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (National Archives Identifier: 42203688)






### Alaska Purchase: Folly to Fortune



- Arranged by Secretary of State William Seward in 1868 for \$7.2 million (less than 2 cents/acre)
- Ridiculed as "Seward's Folly",
   U.S. clears \$3+ trillion in revenue

#### A New Star and Promises Made

# **1959:** <u>Alaskan Statehood proclaimed by</u> President Eisenhower

 Includes mandate for 104 million acres to be transferred to state control

#### 1971: Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act

- Provided 44 million acres of land and \$962.5 million to Alaska Native Regional/Village Corporations
- Authorized Secretary of Interior to withdraw 80 million acres for conservation purposes
- Deadline to implement: 12/18/1978

# Protecting Georgia's Natural Resources



- Establishes Georgia Heritage Trust
- Vetoed more than 600 applications to drain swamplands, protecting vital wetland ecosystems

- Notable environmental legislation:
  - Clean Air Act (1970)



### Alaska Demands Action, Carter Seeks Advice



THE WHITE HOUSE

November 16, 1978

To Secretary Andrus

As you know, the 95th Congress adjourned without passing the Alaska National Interest Lands legislation. Protection for these lands is the highest environmental priority of my Administration.

Since Congress' failure to act means that the so-called "-2" withdrawals will exp: "e next month, I am requesting your opinion on what, ff any, action the Administration can and should take to protect Alaska lands until legislative proposals are enacted. I particularly seek your advice on the suitability of the lands for designation as national monuments under the Antiquities Act of 1906.

In order that I may decide on the appropriate course of action before the statutory deadline, please provide me with your recommendations in writing by November 27, 1978.



## The Antiquities Act of 1906





"The President of the United States is hereby authorized, in his discretion, to declare by public proclamation **historic** landmarks, historic and prehistoric structures, and other objects of historic or scientific interest that are situated upon the lands owned or controlled by the Government of the United States to be national monuments..."


#### Executive Power Checked: The Case of Wyoming

#### 1950: Compromise to establish Grand Teton National Park

SUBJECT:

Alaska Lands

Secretaries Andrus and Bergland have completed the work you requested concerning administrative actions to protect Alaska lands until Congress enacts legislation. Each Secretary has already taken actions under the Federal Land Policy and Management Act (FLPMA) to withdraw temporarily all of the areas of concern from mineral entry and from selection of lands by the State (although the protection against State selections is uncertain under this statute). In addition, they propose that you take actions under the Antiquities Act to create National Monuments to provide strong and certain protection to the most critical areas.

Pollowing are the recommendations:

1. Interior Department lands (proposed National Parks and National Wildlife Refuges):

**11/28/1978:** President Carter is advised by Interior, and **Agriculture Secretaries** to take action under the Antiquities Act "...to provide strong and certain protection to the most critical areas."

#### Carter Acts...Alaska Reacts



- 12/01/1978: President Carter invokes Antiquities Act to preserve 56 million acres of Alaskan lands
- Secretary of Interior Andrus withdraws additional 40 million acres for 20-year period
- Unrest and acts of civil disobedience break out in Alaska at sites of proposed public land designations

#### Effective in Defeat



- 12/02/1980: Despite losing 1980 election, Carter successfully leverages the Antiquities Act to press Congress to pass Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (<u>full</u> <u>transcript</u>)
- Federal public land designations in Alaska greater than 5,000 acres require Congressional approval going forward
