
Clinical Excellence in Action: Providing Another Option for Kids in Mental and Behavioral Health Crisis

For many families with a child in a mental or behavioral health crisis, the only care option is the Emergency Department (ED). Due to high patient volumes and lack of other options, those families may wait hours to be seen in the ED. Up to 40% of those kids could be safely seen in a different setting: Seattle Children's Psychiatric Urgent Care.

Psychiatric Urgent Care will serve children and adolescents ages 4 to 17 who are experiencing a mental or behavioral health crisis. The clinic will be an alternative for kids who need urgent intervention but don't necessarily require the services of the ED. It will also serve kids who need mental health services but are unable to see their provider for an extended period of time.

In short, Psychiatric Urgent Care will give many families a faster, more appropriate option for assessment and connection to follow-up care.

Psychiatric Urgent Care will be located at Seattle Children's Magnuson Clinic and is expected to open in late summer 2024. The Magnuson Clinic is Seattle Children's hub for outpatient behavioral and mental health care — including autism care — and provides a calming, intentionally designed space that can be a better option than the ED for kids in mental health crisis.





Life-Changing Research Trek: Treating and Curing Childhood Diseases


The goal of the Life-Changing Research trek is to leverage our strengths and capabilities in research to deliver innovative patient care and pioneer breakthroughs in child health.

Seattle Children's will accelerate the development of cures, increase access to treatments and expand research efforts to address a wider range of childhood diseases.

Life-Changing Research in Action: A Pioneering Clinical Trial Offers New Hope for Kids With Lupus

In March 2024, Seattle Children's received a groundbreaking FDA authorization to begin the first **chimeric antigen receptor (CAR) T-cell** clinical trial in the U.S. for children under age 18 suffering from systemic lupus erythematosus, the most common form of lupus.

Lupus is a chronic autoimmune disease that can damage multiple organ systems, leading to significant illness and risk of death. Around 20% of lupus cases manifest in childhood, with pediatric patients facing a heightened risk of severe disease and poorer long-term health outcomes.

Despite recent advancements in lupus treatment, many patients continue to struggle with drug-resistant forms of the disease. Furthermore, existing medications typically require continuous use, offering little hope for sustained remission without ongoing treatment.

The REACT-01 study, short for Reversing Autoimmunity through Cell Therapy, will attempt to empower the patients' own immune systems to fight the disease.

"Our hope is that this therapy holds the potential to put patients with systemic lupus erythematosus into true remission without the need for ongoing medications," said Dr. Shaun Jackson, principal investigator for the study.

The clinical trial is set to launch in summer 2024, marking a hopeful new chapter in the treatment of pediatric lupus.





Seamless Operations Trek: Improving Access to Patient Care

The goal of the Seamless Operations trek is to significantly improve internal operations to increase capability and capacity and accelerate expansion of service for an enriched patient experience.

By improving the way we do our work, Seattle Children's can provide greater access to care at the right time and in the right place, leading to the best outcomes for our patients. The Seamless Operations trek will impact quality of care by improving access for our patients and families to receive necessary services at the right time and place. It's exciting to see our teams coming together with ideas and creativity to reinvent how we do our work. There will be challenges along the way, but I know we have the best team to pivot when necessary to face the boulders along our journey."


Seamless Operations in Action: Helping Kids Get the Surgeries They Need

In the bustling operating rooms of Seattle Children's, more than 17,500 surgeries were performed in 2023 alone. From appendectomies to organ transplants, surgeons, nurses and techs move with precision.

Outside the operating rooms, surgery schedulers are doing their part to orchestrate surgeries with a shared goal in mind: to get the right surgeon for the right procedure with the right equipment to the patient who needs it.

Yet there is room for improvement, and data shows patients and their families are still waiting for surgeries. As part of the strategic plan, surgical teams are making process improvements to create capacity for more surgeries and harmonizing schedules so each patient receives timely care.

As the only Level 1 children's surgery center in Washington state, it's critical for Seattle Children's to improve operations so more patients can gain access to the care they need, when they need it. That's what the Seamless Operations trek seeks to accomplish.





Enhanced Partnerships Trek: Expanding Our Network to Accomplish More

The goal of the Enhanced Partnerships trek is to expand the breadth and health of our partnership network, in recognition of Seattle Children's unique contributions to children's health and in support of broader strategic aspirations.

Enhanced Partnerships in Action: Improving Youth Mental and Behavioral Health Through Partnerships


The youth mental and behavioral health crisis is complex and evolving. Creative thinking is essential to meeting the mental and behavioral health care needs of the kids Seattle Children's serves. That includes building partnerships that lead to a more holistic approach to care.

For example, Seattle Children's supported legislation in Washington state for a new state-run facility that will provide specialized care for youth ages 13 to 18 with intellectual developmental disabilities or autism spectrum disorder and co-occurring behavioral health disorders. Additionally, Seattle Children's leaders and External Affairs team partnered with key Washington state representatives to advocate for specific funding for the facility in the 2024 state budget.

Those efforts were successful, with lawmakers approving \$12.3 million to fund the Lake Burien Transitional Care Facility. The facility is scheduled to open in summer of 2024. It will be operated by Washington state's Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS).

The Lake Burien Transitional Care Facility will provide an alternative for teens who might otherwise experience extended stays in emergency rooms or out-of-state placements due to a lack of appropriate services.

After a successful collaboration to secure the state budget funding for the facility, Seattle Children's and DSHS will continue to explore opportunities to address the most pressing patient needs.





Sustainable Stewardship Trek: Building a Strong Foundation for Generations to Come

The goal of the Sustainable Stewardship trek is to advance a culture of increased financial excellence and accountability to accelerate investment in programs that make the greatest impact.



Sustainable Stewardship in Action: Reducing Insurance Denials to Improve Patient Experience

Medication infusions can take anywhere from 30 minutes to several hours, making them disruptive to the busy lives of patients and families. So, imagine how frustrating it would be to arrive for a scheduled infusion appointment to learn your insurance company has denied the treatment.

Over the years, many payors (such as insurance companies and Medicaid) have increased their authorization requirements for infusion services, leading to more denials. To compound these challenges, in the past Seattle Children's often scheduled infusion appointments prior to receiving authorization from the payor.

A team at Seattle Children's launched the Outpatient Infusion Project with the goal to reduce authorization denials, and the results are dramatic: Denials were reduced by 57% in just the first six months (October 2023 to March 2024)!

The most gratifying part, though, is how the project has improved the patient experience. The average authorization time has been cut in half, which means patients are being scheduled sooner and experiencing fewer challenges with their appointments.

The project is so successful that a second phase is underway, focused on chemotherapy ordering for Oncology and the Bone Marrow Transplant service.
