

These extensive works included a re-pitch and re-roof the upper and lower levels, painting the building and fixing most of the external windows. Finally thank you to all Trustees for your contribution to our Trust Board, you all contribute in your own way as and when required, and it is very much appreciated.

It seems like only yesterday we were called to the stage, one by one, and announced as the Head Girl Team for 2024. The time has passed too quickly. Already at the end of the year, we wish to reflect on the blessings we and Manawa Tapu have received, and the blessings we have given to others.

Our school whakataukī this year was, "Kua tae mai ahau kia whiwhi ai te ora, te ora maha- I have come that you might have life and have it in abundance." With phones now out of the picture, it was refreshing to see so many wāhine getting involved in their community through lunchtime activities and school councils.

This year we were amazed to see hundreds of applications for councils, but were devastated that we could not offer every student a place. However, any disappointments were soon forgotten when the councils organised lunchtimes of Just Dance, bumper balls, Adoration, Ascend, and quizzes. These entertaining activities got everyone outside with their friends rather than inside online- no phones in sight!

An exciting new initiative called 'Bible and Biscuits' was introduced by the Special Character Council, which provided fortnightly lunchtime Bible study for girls to learn and embrace their faith. The council also helped run many liturgies throughout the year, such as Ash Wednesday, the Washing of the Feet, and Stations of the Cross during Holy Week. A highlight was Founder's Day Mass, where we were lucky enough to have Bishop John as our celebrant. His homily was particularly inspiring, as he talked about successful young Catholic women such as Lydia Ko,

Katie Ledecky, and Simone Biles, who are not afraid to express their faith and show how their beliefs have contributed to their success.

The Student Council ran dance sessions throughout the year to get our rangatahi active, and their big smiles were contagious. One of our projects was to design a school scarf, which we hope will be introduced next year. We also ran a bake sale to support one of our young wāhine, Annabelle Edwards, who is on the road to recovery after being away from school due to cancer. Our thoughts and prayers go out to the Edwards family during this difficult time.

Manawa Tapu student Ella Bartlett, and outstanding teachers Mrs Avery and Miss Scott, courageously supported Shave for a Cure this year by shaving their hair. To support them, we held a bake sale, contributing just under \$1,000 to raise a total of \$6,363 for the non-profit. Their amazing efforts will help find more effective treatments for leukaemia and blood cancer, saving lives and ensuring people with cancer get the support they need.

The annual Year 13 Formal was held in the St Joseph's Church Hall during Term 2. To thank and give back to our Catholic community for the use of the venue, Year 13 led a Youth Mass which was well supported. Our year group supported the Breast Cancer Foundation, raising \$200. We were blessed to have the wonderful PTFA fund, organise and prepare our food for the evening, massive shout out to them!! The theme was The Great Gatsby, with the checkered dance floor never empty and the chicken bites mysteriously vanishing after being on the table for only 2 seconds. Ultimately, the event would not have been a success without the help of the Formal Committee, staff, and the PTFA- thank you.

The O'Shea Shield Competition was another highlight for us, as our team of 15 girls travelled to Sacred Heart Napier to compete in the annual event. Projectile vomiting and lost voices were not enough to dampen our spirits, and we all learnt the importance of resilience in the face of disappointment. However, we were so proud of the effort put in by the team and were extremely grateful for the teachers that supported us during this time, particularly Ms Koorey, Mrs Costelloe, Ms Rilkoff, Mrs Ashton, and Miss Mulligan. Thank you!

We wrapped up the year with our well-loved Mission Market Day. The Mission Sisters had tea in the Quad, while our girls ran food stalls and games, raising a significant amount of money for the Sisters. The funds will support a nutrition programme in Senegal, Africa, by improving the autonomy of women so they and their children will have better health, as well as education opportunities for children in Odisha, India.

We are so grateful to all those who have walked alongside us this year, especially our parents and the staff of our college. Your unwavering support is the reason we haven't gone crazy, and the invaluable skills you have added to our kete of knowledge have helped us get through 2024 with the minimum amount of stress.

To Mrs Costelloe, though our Thursday morning meetings cost precious beauty sleep, it was always worth it to have a giggle with you. Breakfast on you, which consisted of an Eggs Bennie or a mean chicken



burger with fries, plus the offer of no-questions-asked schoolwork extensions, would not usually be offered by most mothers, but you were our school mum, so the normal rules didn't apply.

To Shin, because of your strict attendance policies and that massive binder, we were able to graduATE. We owe you one.

To them, staring at the night sky was more than just a hobby; the stars were pointers, road-markers, guardian angels. Without the stars, my ancestors would have been lost, unsure of their direction and destination.

When you arrived at Manawa Tapu, you too left the comfort of the things you knew. You stepped into our Sacred Heart waka. This journey of navigating high school has often felt like steering a ship through uncharted waters - we couldn't get anywhere if we had nothing to guide us. At Manawa Tapu, we have three stars to align our waka, all equally important and working together to help navigate our journey.

Our star Ako, taking every opportunity to learn, guides us to do everything to the best of our ability. It's not enough to just pick up our oar and paddle, we need to row hard – this means participating in our lives, listening and being active in our communities. Whether this is finding success on the stage, predicting a play in a game of football, or even getting good grades, if we navigate with Ako, every opportunity we take will bring us claser to achieving our dreams.

To our teachers, the navigators of our waka. You gave us the skills we need to be independent and shape our futures. Because of you, we will know what stars to follow and when. To my teachers this year. Thank you for making my last year more, difficult. Though you knew I had extra responsibilities, you made sure this wasn't an excuse for me to relax in class. Thank you for keeping me on course.

To the parents of the Year 13 Leavers. You are the brightest stars in our sky. Thank you for being there for us from day one. When enormous swells threaten to swamp our waka as four internals are due in the last week of term, you help us stay afloat and on course - making our school lunches, paying for our fuel and phone plans, or driving us if we haven't got our license yet... We hope we have made you proud.

To the leadership team, this year has been more hectic, but more fulfilling than we ever imagined. Thank you to the leaders, whatever you were doing; running interaction revolution, helping organise the formal, or bringing baking for Annabelle's fundraiser. But this time when we venture into the unknown, we are now able to navigate this new land because we carry Manawa Tapu in our hearts.

And if we're ever unsure of where we're going, and the sky is beginning to get dark, remember - the stars are always there, you just have **t**o look up to see them.

Over a period of 6 weeks travelling back and forth through September, I remember Mary saying to me that our school could do with a place of worship, a chapel, being the fine catholic college it is.

This started a train of thought and conversation between us and we kept an eye open for a church that could be for sale and uplifted

Amazingly, one morning in March 2005 we read in our local paper a church was for sale in Govett Avenue. This started a round of negotiation and how or if we could buy it. Mary and I chatted about this piece of news, and she commented to me that her brother John was a wealthy farmer who may be Maybe he may be able to assist in the purchase along with Mary & I?

Yes was the answer and a deal was done. The purchase was made about May 5, 2005.

Mary received the keys to the church, 4 days before she died on May 19. A tearful acceptance that someone had heard a prayer.

So now the work really started, how to get a church to Fitzroy from Frankleigh Park...Grounds had to be prepared and levelled for the church to sit on, and the church needed to be divided as it also had a supper room adjoining it.

The removal of the church went well, and no damage was done, then began the task to prepare it and make it a church again. We were very fortunate in having a fellow Geoge Tamati, Father of a staff member who was

painting and making it look like what it is today (along with our help and a few working bees).

The chapel was finally blessed and opened nearly 12 months later April

Mary & I had 5 children, and youngest Kelly was married there in 2006 as well as grandchildren being baptised in the chapel over ensuing years.

It is lovely to see that his year my 3 grandchildren are attending Sacred Heart, Alex Carr, Ally & Madi Fleming and I am sure they will appreciate and love the efforts that went into making our dream work.

Ultimately, life is a journey where we learn to "Cherry" pick the good from the bad, cherishing the moments that truly matter.





Learning in Years 7 & 8 took on many forms this year, as seen in the photographs.


Students were engaged in many opportunities to grow and develop academically and socially. It was a blessing to have Miss Harrison join us this year, as homeroom teacher in Y8.

Warwick Foy has been leading a project to honour our Angels – three girls who passed away, during their time at Sacred Heart Girls' College, Manawa Tapu. The idea for the project came about when Warwick found out that the memory of Jessie, amongst the school community, had been lost.

Tributes and memorials for the Angels have not had consistent maintenance over the years. The cross which was made for Karen decayed and is now gone.

Two project goals were agreed with the families:

- 1. To develop a process where memorial stones/tributes are maintained
- 2. To annually acknowledge our Angels on or around All Souls Day

Warwick said to Gabby's father, Roland that this project was "wrapped with respect" and he added, "and the love of the Holy Spirit".

Goal 1 will be met with the help of the new RST Environment class. Karen's brother Russell has started work on a new cross for her tribute space.

Goal 2 will be met with a display and blessing which will take place on November 11 at 3.30pm at school. The families will be in attendance. Interested members of the school community, friends and relatives are welcome to attend.

We have lost staff and other oldgirls as well but to keep the project manageble, the initial focus is on the girls who died while attending – our Angels. We hope to include other students and staff in the future.

Pathways demonstrates how school learning and achievement links to employment and further training. Education is not just about employment but employment is always about education.

Our most prestigious Pathways achievement is the awarding of The Prime Minister's Award for Vocational Excellence, valued at \$2000. Unfortunately, the new coalition government scrapped the award this year but most schools around New Zealand are keeping it going and at our school, it will now be known as the Sacred Heart Girls' College Award for Excellence in Education to Employment.

This year's winner is Alika Hunn, Year 13. Alika visited the Taranaki Careers Expo with her year level in 2023. One of the stands was an exhibit about flying. Alika was interested in the display, she watched a video and quite liked the thought of becoming a pilot. After the expo, she starting flying lessons and built up enough hours to eventually gain her solo wings. Alika used her Pathways lessons to work on her aviation papers and started researching flight schools and connecting with old-girl Ella Barrett who began flight school at the beginning of 2023.

In late 2023, Alika was nominated for the prestigious Pauwels Flying Scholarship. Alika was awarded the scholarship and Captain John Pauwels and her mentor, retired 747 pilot Captain David Meale, flew to New Plymouth to present the award at school assembly in April.

Alika has found her aviation papers difficult at times but she is determined and focused and displays all of the character required to be a worthy winner of the Award for Excellence in Education to Employment.
