

Filliettaz Credited With Fire Rescue

"Driving home from work I noticed smoke billowing from a building across the street," MSgt. Richard B. Filliettaz recalls about the first seconds of his heroic life saving rescue. "I realized no one else had seen the fire and that I had to do something fast!"

Sergeant Filliettaz then immediately instructed a nearby gas station attendant to call the fire department as a merchant from next door was explaining that an elderly woman lived on the top floor of the burning building and that she was deaf.

Although the top portion of the structure and stairs were fully engulfed in heavy, black smoke, Sergeant Filliettaz managed to find his way to her apartment. Door bells, shouts of alarm, or pounding on the door would have been futile because of the lady's lack of hearing, so he had to patiently wait until his frantic gestures at the window caught the potential victim's attention to explain the imminent danger.

With flames drawing nearer, the woman adamantly demanded that certain cherished belongings be brought to safety as well. The two started collecting her choices.

By the time the Watervliet (N.Y.) Fire Department arrived, Sergeant Filliettaz had saved the woman's life and prized possessions.

With his job done, Sergeant Filliettaz, personally pleased with his efforts, continued on his journey home. It was not until eight months later that the fire department confirmed who the heroic but quiet rescuer was, and thanked him for his actions.

The cause of the fire is unknown. Perhaps if Sergeant Filliettaz could have used his Air Force training at the house prior to the incident, the fire would never have occurred. On Reserve weekends, he's a fire prevention inspector with the 439th's Fire Department.

AF Assists Earthquake Victims

More than one million pounds of relief supplies were airlifted by the U.S. Air Force to Van Airport, Turkey, for survivors of the Nov. 24 earthquake in the northeast area of the country. C-5 Galaxies, C-141 Starlifters and C-130 Hercules aircraft flew more than 25 missions hauling tents, space heaters, blankets and other goods in Incirlik Common Defense Installation (CDI), Adana, Turkey. Supplies airlifted from Incirlik to the Van Airport took 39 C-130 airlift missions. Although the airlift of supplies has been completed, Air Force efforts are continuing. Personnel will remain at Van to assist the disaster area for as long as needed.

Recycling Program Canned

Air Force Reserve headquarters has directed all its subordinate units to "can" their recycling efforts.

Actually, each base's efforts are not stopping but are being expanded. A new program to collect and recycle aluminum and steel cans, such as beverage containers, recently started throughout the country, including Westover.

Thirty pairs of 55-gallon drums will be placed around the base; one for aluminum cans, the other for steel. Crushed containers are preferred, but are not required. The base civil engineers will periodically collect them and the base property disposal office will insure the cans' recycling.

Everyone working at Westover is urged to pitch in.
