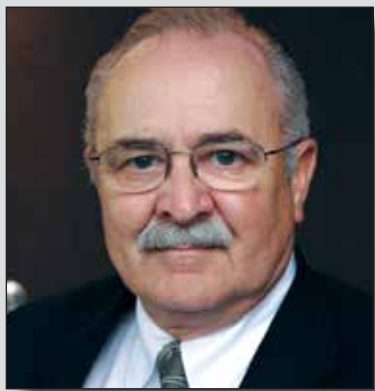

# Take a ride on the Goodship—Jody Hall leads the way with cupcakes, cannabis

Jody Hall has a hunch that her cannabis creations could be a gateway leading to better conversations and more inspired connections.

“Bring a box of Goodship to a dinner party like you would a nice bottle of wine, and see how that goes,” she dares newcomers to the scene. “It will be a profoundly different dinner party.”

The Goodship is Hall’s company that churns out high-end marijuana edibles, ranging from double fudge brownies and snickerdoodles to fair trade chocolate bars and tart cherry pastilles.

She also owns Seattle’s flagship cupcake bakery and coffee shop, Cupcake Royale, with locations in Madrona, Ballard, West Seattle, Capitol Hill, Queen Anne and downtown.

Hall was a pioneer in the cupcake craze—opening the first bakery dedicated to the confection outside of Manhattan.

She started as Verite Coffee and Cupcake Royale in Madrona in 2003, with a business plan she spent a year writing and notion that cupcakes would be more than a trend.

A feature article in the Seattle PI set the stage for a major success.

“Our business went from 100 cupcakes a day to 1,000 overnight,” she said. “People were driving from all over the state to get our cupcakes. We were floored. Our business went crazy after that.”

Hall was able to open a second location 10 months after the first, fully funded by the first store’s profits.

Now, she is applying that same pioneering, forward-thinking approach to the marijuana market.

“With Goodship, we’re at the beginning of a renaissance,” she said. “And we have a chance to have a seat at the table and create a positive narrative.”

Throw away the stigma still surrounding weed, Hall says, and you’re left with big possibilities.

“I think pot makes you more present with what you’re doing, who you’re with, what you’re eating, what music you’re listening to,” she said. “We want to inspire discovery and joy. There’s beauty in the world all around us.”

Hall believes that—through the lens of a nice high—people can have more positive

interactions and more creative thoughts.

Her mission is to make edibles that are reliable and promise a consistent experience—and eliminating the trepidation and the guesswork about how the products will make users feel each time.

“Building trust is what we want to do,” she said.

Hall also wants to build a brand with a loyal following.

“We want to do with the commodification of cannabis what Starbucks did with coffee,” she said.

And she’s got the know-how to do exactly that.

Hall got her start at Starbucks when the coffee empire was just getting its start.

She joined the company about a year after college, when there were about 30 locations. By the time she left, 11 years later, the number jumped to 3,000.

For her time as one of the first marketing employees at the corporation, Hall learned “how to build a good culture and how to have a good vision.”

A lot of the skills she acquired while working at Starbucks still shape her work ethic. She said she learned the importance of listening skills, enhancing the self-esteem in employees and promoting collaboration.

Most importantly, Hall added, she learned to ask for help when needed.

“We’re in uncharted territory often as entrepreneurs,” she said. “The ability to find

solutions to problems doesn’t just come from the CEO. And if it did, that would be a boring company. Everyone would just be a cog in the system.”

Instead, she wants all of her employees to feel invested in her companies – whether it’s Cupcake Royale, the Goodship or her Rodeo Donut pop-up shops. She wants to encourage their ideas, the same way she believes Starbucks fostered hers.

“I would have been on a totally different path if I hadn’t had that opportunity to have a voice,” she said. “We all have a nugget of something we feel like we’re specifically on the planet to do, and I love the idea of exploring that and encouraging others to explore that.”

For Hall, the drive is building community and interaction—uniting people around delicious food.

“Our purpose is to inspire community connections and be the most joyful part of a person’s day,” she said.

The regulations and issues surrounding the pot business have been tricky, she admits.

“It’s the hardest business I’ve ever done,” she said. “You’re getting into a can of worms. But the opportunity at the end of the day to create a soulful brand is so exciting. It gets me out of bed everyday.”

The Goodship is already expanding to Nevada and Hall is considering other states.

Hall has been an inspiration for other entrepreneurs, including Rachel Marshall, founder of Rachel’s Ginger Beer.

“When I was getting started, I had all of these questions,” Marshall said. “And Jody was amazingly generous. When people have to figure things out on their own, they’re often stingy with information. It’s a person of great character who is willing to give that kind of information to someone else.”

Marshall said Hall is an innovator with heart—and a strong role model to others.

“Her cafes are still vibrant,” she said. “Now she’s got a whiff of something that’s a trend that’s going to be huge. And she’s got all of her ducks in a row.”

## Online accounts reveal more after woman stabbed to death in Ballard

Details about the events leading up to a woman stabbed to death in Ballard have surfaced and paint a picture of homelessness, crime and drugs.

The King County prosecutors say 29-year-old Kirstyn Outen was stabbed by her husband, 34-year-old William Harrel, after Outen allegedly hid a heroin pipe from him. However, prosecutors say that Outen had hid the pipe after a neighbor knocked on the door of the RV the couple lived in.

The King County Medical Examiner confirmed Outen died from penetrating sharp force trauma to the torso on April 28. She died at Harborview Medical Center after she was found outside the Jack in the Box and 7-Eleven on the 900 block of N.W. Leary Way.

Prosecutor documents show that SPD officers interviewed a woman who claimed she had been smoking heroin with the couple leading up to the incident. The woman reported that a man knocked on the door with some gas cans and in a panic Outen hid the pipe out of sight. Harrel became enraged and accused Outen of stealing his money and drugs. He pushed the woman out of the RV while he reached for a knife, documents say. Then she heard Outen scream and Harrel say to call 911. Blood was later found on Harrel, and he was arrested.

King County Senior Deputy Prosecutor, Julie Kline claimed in charge papers that Harrel had a long history of crime and

would regularly leave a state where he had warrants for his arrest.

"The defendant has no area ties, is highly nomadic and has a history of arrests in several states across the country, including Tennessee, Florida, New York, Pennsylvania, Colorado and Washington," Kline wrote in prosecutor documents.

Harrell's arraignment is scheduled for May 15.

The couple's Facebook accounts show details of their situation leading up to Outen's death.

Outen's Facebook profile reveals that she was living in an RV with Harrel after they moved here from Tennessee three years ago. Outen started a Gofundme.com account almost a month ago in order to raise money to help the couple get back on their feet after buying the RV at auction. On the website she pleaded for help and described a string of misfortune involving car theft, sleeping in doorways and incidents with police. She also said the tires of the RV were in desperate need of replacing. The account had a goal of \$6,000 but had not garnered support.

"[W]e were able to finally get us another RV and a car from the auction so we now are starting our way up the ladder again. If it wasn't for us having each other out here we would have never made it alone. Seattle has changed our lives and we are now trying to better our lives," wrote Outen.

She went on to say that the couple led a peripatetic lifestyle and like many RV camp-

ers in Ballard, they were moving their RV every three days in accordance with Seattle's parking laws: Vehicles can remain parked in the some zones for up to 72 hours.

"We are going to school online now and almost back to normal again. Any help we get would be more than a blessing for us. We need some funding as soon as possible due to the fact of moving our RV every few days and the risk of our tires popping. Any extra funding we get we plan to donate to some different charities for our children as well. We appreciate the support." 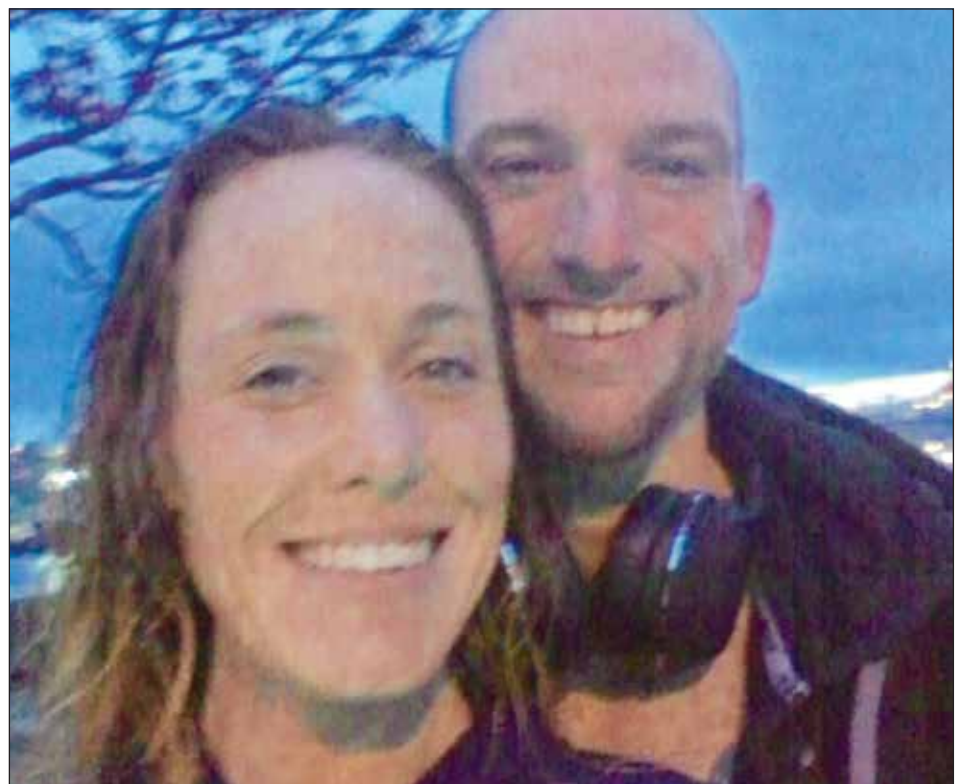
Outen also wrote on the Gofundme.com account that she and Harrel were going to

school online. Harrel reported on his Facebook account that he was going to school for web development.

Outen's sister, of Rock Hill, South Carolina, started a Gofundme.com account last week after word of her sister's death.

"My beloved sister Kirstyn Outen was killed last night. I'm still not up to date on all of the details but it's a tragedy no one expected. She was stabbed to death last night, April 27th 2017. Any donations to the funeral would be greatly appreciated by my family and I. Thank you so much in advance for thought, prayers, and any donation."

## Considering filing for the Highline Public Schools? It's time to get on board

Two positions on the board of Highline Public Schools are up for election in November.

Candidates may begin filing on Monday, May 15. The filing period closes at 4:30 p.m. on Fri., May 19. The deadline for candidates to withdraw is Monday, May 22 and the deadline to file as a write-in candidate is Fri., July 14.

The election will be held on Tues., Nov. 7.

The positions, each with two-year terms, will fill the seats currently held by board members Angelica Alvarez for district 2 and Joe Van for district 3.

Tyrone Curry Sr, district 1, Bernie Dorsy, district 4, and Michael Spear, district 5, will retain their positions.

Current board members Van and Alvarez have decided to run for reelection.

"I want to continue with what we're working on," Van said. "I have three kids in the system, so I have something invested. It's not only my kids, but also their friends and my community."

Alvarez, a Burien resident, had four children graduate from the district and currently has one grandchild enrolled.

She was originally elected in November 2009. Born and raised in San Luis, Arizona, to migrant field workers, Alvarez has a background in social services and education and believes having diverse voices on the board is important.

Van, a resident of SeaTac, is a 1995 graduate of Tyee High School and holds an AA in Administration of Justice from Highline Community College. He is currently employed as a supervisor at Owens & Minor medical supply distribution center and serves on the City of SeaTac Human Services Advisory Committee.

Both candidates say that state funding is a top issue for consideration.

"Fully funding education is one of the hottest topics," Alvarez said. "And it espe-

cially affects our students of color. It's one of the challenges not only for our district but one that our whole community is facing."

Alvarez said another concern for the district is the lack of space in the schools for all of the families moving to the area.

Van said funding issues have a far-reaching ripple affect in the district. Another concern for him is the new "Core24" graduation requirements issued by the state of Washington.

The state mandated an increase in the minimum number of credits—from 20 to 24—for seniors to receive their diplomas starting in 2021.

"We have to look at our schedules," he said. "Right now, if a student fails one class, he can't graduate. We're looking at options to help them."

Van wants to continue to build the programs he believes in—like the "P-3" system which provides early education opportunities for children in pre-kindergarten through third grade.

He and Alvarez are also strident supporters of the dual language program, since they are both bilingual themselves.

"It's important to maintain our languages, so we're able to speak to all of our families," Alvarez said.

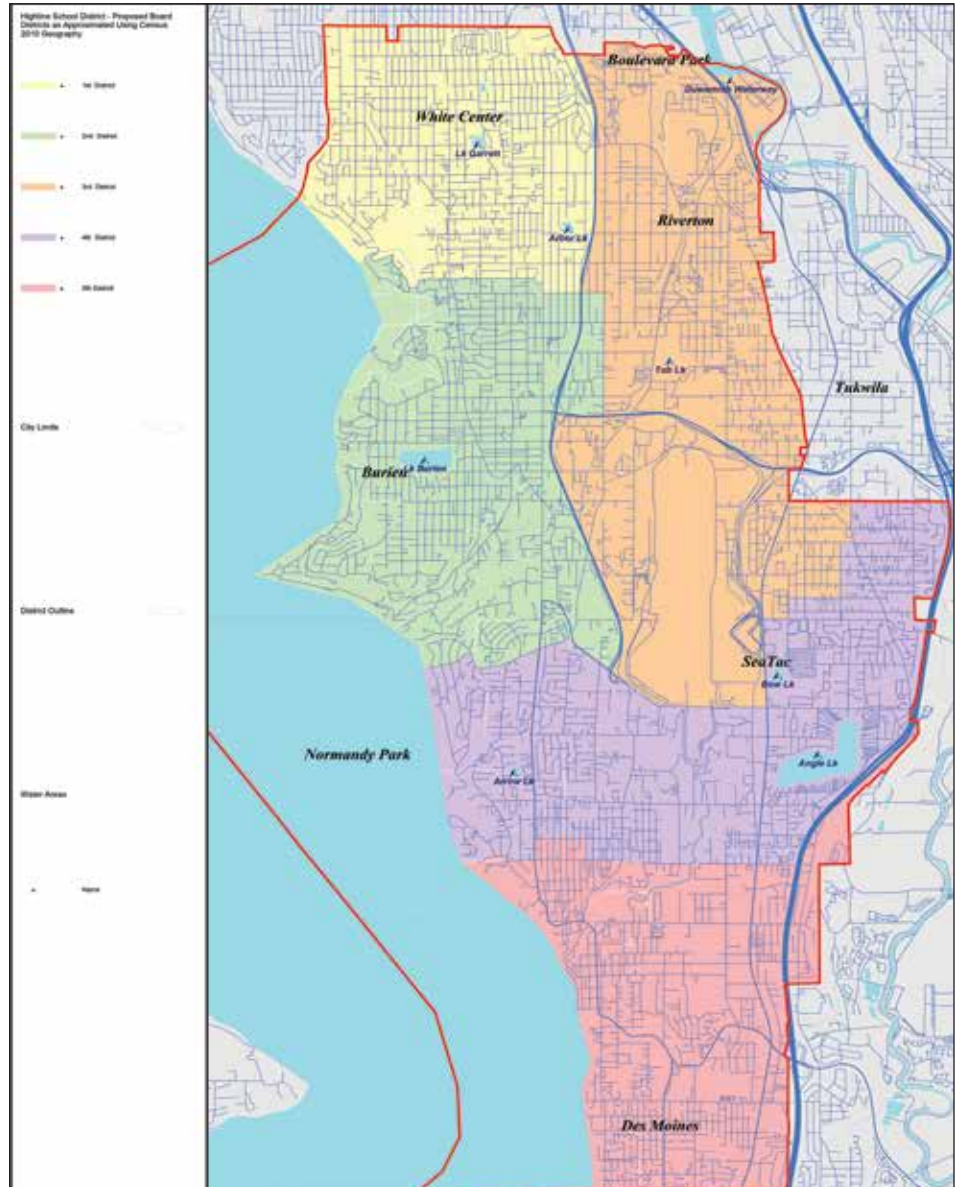
Both candidates also believe in the need to build community partnerships.

"I want to bring more people in," Van said.

"We can't do it alone," Alvarez said. "We continue to look for not just partnerships but also apprenticeships."

She also wants to work more on bringing up the graduation rates. "When you go to college' should be the expectation," she said. "It's not 'if' you're going to go, it's 'when.' I want to teach that vocabulary in the district."

# Aviation Day at SeaTac inspires students to let their dreams take flight

Hamreet Kaur, is literally under the wing of airline pilot Captain Ronald Limes

The Ninth Annual Aviation Day on Saturday, May 6, hosted by the Port of Seattle, Boeing and Alaska Airlines saw more than 1200 teenagers from around Puget Sound and beyond come to the Alaska Airlines hangars at Sea-Tac airport to be inspired, learn and make connections with people, equipment and programs in aviation and aeronautics. The event began nine years ago as a tour for Boy and Girl Scouts and has evolved over time into something more like an aviation and aeronautics job fair.

One of the students there was Hamreet Kaur, a 15-year-old aspiring pilot from Des Moines who is part of the Michael P. Anderson Program. She attends Mt. Rainier High School and has already completed her ground training at the Puget Sound Skills Center <https://www.highlineschools.org/pssc> where she scored 98.7 percent on all her tests. She does programs at the Museum of Flight and is aiming first at the Solo Flight Academy <http://www.obap.org/solo-flight-academy> next year that will take about two months to complete. Once she's done she will be able to train to solo in smaller aircraft. But her eventual goal is to be an airline pilot. Captain Ronald Limes with Alaska is her mentor in the program.

"She will learn the pattern, how the pattern works and of course how the aircraft works. The instructor will go up with her

for 15 or 20 hours and then get out and says 'Go!' and she does it on her own." To get from there to be airline pilot takes roughly 3000 Flight Hours which takes "years," said Limes, "It's one thing to be co-pilot it's another to be making the decisions. You have to have some Pilot In Command time." Limes is also a Flight Operations Duty Officer for Alaska and is the Chairman of the Michael P. Anderson program. The program was created at the Museum of Flight to honor the memory of Anderson, a Washington native and astronaut who perished in the Space Shuttle Columbia disaster in 2003. The nine year old program teaches students about science, engineering, flight dynamics and navigation in hands-on, state-of-the-art labs and simulators and provides mentors like Captain Limes. "What he did," Limes explained, "was engage with kids. He talked rockets and space and more. We took his name and built an education program around it." There are more than 200 scholars signed up this year. Limes has tremendous faith in his protegee Kaur. "I don't have any doubt."

Women in aviation make up only about six percent but that number is growing and programs like this are helping to encourage more. At a special presentation she was given four round trip tickets to anywhere Alaska flies.

Careers ranging from aerospace engineer to professional pilot were part of the show and tell during the event.

Participants were able to explore how flights are planned, scheduled and exe-

cuted. Training facilities were open and engineers guided attendees through the construction of aircraft. Several light aircraft and pilots were on-site including King County Sheriff's search and rescue Huey UH-1 and Bell 407.

Guided by Alaska Airlines and volunteers from the other sponsors, participants were able to:

- Tour Alaska jets and "kick the tires," see wheel wells and engines with mechanics.
- Visit the flight deck of a Boeing 737 with line pilots.
- Fly a 737 simulator
- Explore the complex world of jet airplanes with the Boeing engineers who design them.
- Check out and kick the wheels of Boeing's new 737 MAX 9 test plane
- Peek into the flight deck of the U.S. Navy's electronic warbird, the EF-18 Growler
- Tour Teen Flight Puyallup's student-built Vans RV-12 airplane
- See Blue Origin's model rockets and space capsule
- Sit in the flight deck of two Alaska Airlines 737s and a Horizon Air Q400
- Learn to pre-flight a Piper J-3 Cub, Kenmore Air Express, and Cessna Caravan
- Learn to fix a jet engine from skilled Alaska mechanics
- View a demonstration of how Boeing engineers attach a 737 winglet
- Experience a Boeing 737 simulator
- Meet with recruiters from 16 of the country's premier aviation trade and technical colleges
- See local high schools compete in Aviation Day robotic wars.

# Ballard High School robotics teams secure honors at international competition

The Ballard High School Viking Robotics team made school history last month by taking top honors at the FIRST Robotics world championship competition in Houston, Texas, marking the first time the school or any team from the Pacific Northwest secured a trophy.

The competition was held on April 20-22 and 400 teams were invited from all over the world, which included Canada, China, Israel, Mexico, and Turkey.

The competition is known as “Varsity Sport of the Mind™,” for students grade nine through 12. During a six-week period teams raise funds and engineer a robot to performs a series of tasks; Teams have limited resources and time to organize their own “brand” of robot with the capability to perform the competition tasks. FIRST Washington reported that the average cost for a robotics team is \$24,000 and team sizes are between 15-150 with no limit to member size.

In a main competition of the event robots compete in a game much like basketball or soccer while students operate them remotely.

Mentors and real-world professionals from company’s like Microsoft volunteer their time, training and guidance to help teams along as they navigate through scenarios designed to simulate real world applications.

“There is absolutely no question being in a robotics club and getting students involved for one, two, three or four years of their high school gets them interested in science technology, engineering and math,” said Microsoft mentor Dan Rosenstein at a previous competition.

During January and February the 27-student team organized and designed their brand/robot to compete at Mount Vernon High School and Glacier Peak High School, eventually moving on to the PNW District Championship at Eastern Washington University last April. They then moved on to Houston where they were awarded World Championship trophy.

“These past four years on Viking Robotics have taught me so much, from how to wire a robot, to working on a team, to leadership skills,” said student Cecilia Kalthoff. “Getting to compete at the World Championship seemed like the best way to cap off my senior year, but I didn’t imagine it could get more amazing. Winning was

just so unbelievable! This was one of the most incredible experiences of my life.”

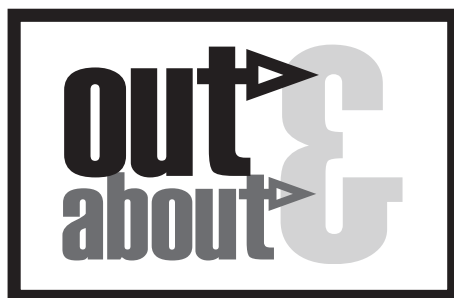
FIRST Washington, a nonprofit, has offered free mentor-based after school educational programs since 2011. The programs are designed to hone life skills like teamwork and leadership through educational competitions. According to FIRST Washington there are currently 11,000 students ages six to 18 participating in their programs across the state with

over 4,500 mentors. With the addition of FIRST Robotics Competition, the organization offers three other competitions, which includes FIRST LEGO League Jr., FIRST LEGO League and FIRST Tech Challenge.

“FIRST Washington strives to alleviate the growing problem of a shortage of skilled professionals in STEM and the need for an innovative workforce by using strategies that promote STEM in-

terest, knowledge, and learning and that inspire students to pursue post-secondary education/training in STEM,” the non-profits states.

“We are so proud of Viking Robotics for making history as the first Pacific Northwest team to win the world championship,” said Erin McCallum, president of FIRST Washington. “It was truly a pleasure to see what this group of talented students was able to achieve this year.”

She was recognized for her work with Fauntleroy Church, the West Seattle YMCA and Seattle University—but accepted the award on behalf of all the volunteers who have stood by her side.

Now, Groen said her mission is to recruit others.

"We want people to be active change agents in the world," she said. "There are

countless ways to be a do-gooder. You could be a tutor, peer-mentor, door-beller, committee member, diaper packager, donation pick-up driver, meal maker and food helper, park and trail maintainer, campaigner, shelter pet sitter, sponsor, blood donor, troop leader, beach cleaner, charity 5K runner, desert baker, group facilitator, auction donator, youth sports coach, search and rescuer, board member and fund raiser, to name a few."

The most important step is agreeing to help, Groen added.

"When someone asks you to volunteer, just say yes," she said. "Start somewhere, say yes and it will lead you to a wonderful experience."

Other award recipients at the breakfast celebration shared Groen's can-do attitude and positive spirit.

Patricia Throop, founder of Eldercare Consulting, won "Westside Business of the Year." She spoke about how she was inspired to start a company helping families find solutions for elderly care after helping her aging mother Sara relocate to Seattle 11 years ago.

Peel & Press, a spot for pizza, pasta and cocktails in Morgan Junction, took home the "Westside Emerging Business of the Year" award.

Owner Dan Austin spent 18 years managing businesses for others before taking off on his own. He was also recognized by the chamber for his willingness to help those in need in the community by hosting benefit events.

Austin announced that he plans to open a second location in Burien.

Southwest Youth and Family Services won the honor of "Westside Not-for-Profit of the Year." The organization offers programs for youth development, family support, mental illness and education.

Laura Ware, board of directors chair, said the award will help the nonprofit get the word out into the community about its mission to help youth and families have a successful future.

"We're known, but we're not that well known," she said. "There are a lot of kids in our community that are scared. They need a safe place to learn, to go after school if their parents aren't home. Southwest Youth and Family Services provides that."

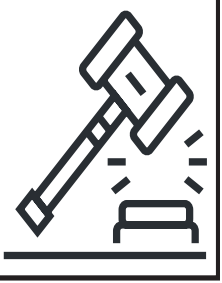

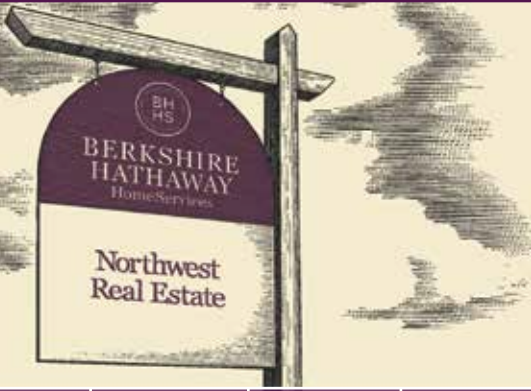



I won't ever look at Seattle the same way again—not after reading “Too High & Too Steep: Reshaping Seattle's Topography,” a book that's just now available in paperback.

What I had not realized before stumbling onto this remarkable volume was how much Seattle's features have been changed. No other major city in the world has had such extensive man-made remakes in a comparatively short history. The city we see today looks vastly different from the one that Midwestern settlers found when they landed at Alki Point 165 years ago.

The author, geologist David B. Williams, chronicles Seattle's amazing transformation. He begins with a quick thumbnail account of the region's geology, taking us back 17 thousand years when glacier-driven forces carved the troughs we call Hood Canal, Lake

Washington and Puget Sound.

What nature left behind was the terrain that greeted those early settlers. They huddled first at Alki, but made the decision to relocate along Elliott Bay, our deep saltwater harbor. The adjacent landscape presented the settlers with challenges. The site came bordered with steep slopes, high bluffs, vast tidelands and marshes. It offered hardly any flat level land on which to build.

No question that it was a strange place—a crazy place—to build a city. However, it was only a brief time before residents began remaking their chosen land. They started by improving access to Elliott Bay, their primary connection to other settlements along Puget Sound and to San Francisco and Portland beyond. They trimmed the bluffs, graded and regraded the steep streets and began wharfing out, extending the historic shoreline, block by block into the bay.

The settlers and those who soon followed filled in the tidelands. They created new ground by dumping materials (garbage, sawdust, charcoal, ash and random detritus) into areas historically covered with water. They hammered in pilings and bridged tidelands with trestles. At the mouth of the Duwamish, they created 350-acre Harbor Island, once the world's largest artificial island.

When a hill got in the way of transpor-

tation, they simply lopped it off. Two of the seven hills on which Seattle was originally built—Denny and Profanity hills—were sluiced away. Denny Hill, considered too steep for horse-drawn wagons, was regraded not once but five times, lowered from 232 feet to 122 feet. Profanity (so named by lawyers who climbed the steep hill to reach the county courthouse) was reshaped, using hydraulic “giants,” high pressure hoses, supplemented when necessary by dynamite.

One of the city's largest megaprojects occurred early in the 20th Century when Thomas Mercer's vision of a canal connecting Lake Washington and Puget Sound became reality. Constructing the ship canal and the Hiram M. Chittenden Locks (second only to the Panama Canal in this hemisphere) led to the replumbing of Lake Union, Lake Washington and Salmon Bay. That massive endeavor required lowering Lake Washington by nine feet and caused the Black River, once the lake's outlet, to dry up and totally disappear.

These man-made changes in topography were fueled by Seattle spirit, the belief that Seattle was destined to become a world-class city. Cities that have drastically altered their land, among them Boston, San Francisco, New Orleans and Chicago, also were driven by concern about the future, the desire to rise above

the natural setting.

But Seattle, far more than most, has demonstrated this relentless approach to alter the cityscape. “Too High” author Williams underscores the enormous size of retrofitting in an appendix showing the volume of dirt moved in Seattle's reshaping. When one totals multiple regrades, carving out the ship canal, filling of the Duwamish waterway and tidelands and the railroad through Interbay, the aggregate comes to 75 million cubic yards of dirt moved.

Williams quotes an early-day Seattle Post-Intelligencer reporter who wrote, “This would mean a total of 605,000 carloads, which in 40-foot cars would reach from here to Broadway, New York, and more than half way back and at 20 miles an hour would take the great trainload ten days to pass any given point on the route.”

Williams has produced a record of activity that kept me turning pages, examining maps and photos and forever seeing this city anew. I am stunned when I realize how dramatically we have reshaped the land and continue to do so.
